Serve "...not to be served but to serve..."

But Jesus called them to him and said, "You know that the rulers of the Gentiles lord it over them, and their great ones are tyrants over them. It will not be so among you, but whoever wishes to be great among you must be your servant, and whoever wishes to be first among you must be your slave; just as the Son of Man came not to be served but to serve, and to give his life a ransom for many." – Matthew 20:25-28

For the last few months, I have shared an aspect of a pattern for the life of faith: INVITE, NURTURE, EQUIP, and SERVE. This month, I'll share about the part of SERVE.

To review:

- We are called to **INVITE** others to the community of believers who follow Jesus. We long to be invited to something larger than ourselves.
- We **NURTURE** one another in community, being cared for and caring for others with God's help and guidance.
- We **EQUIP** one another to grow into individuals and a community of greater faith and love. Our focus must remain grounded in love and devotion to Jesus.

To SERVE is part of the Christian life. We do so at church for worship and through PADS, COOL Ministries Food Pantry, Project Healing Waters, youth mission trips, church council, etc. Service is for all aspects of our lives, in our homes, at work, everywhere, and always.

This was counter-cultural in the days of Jesus' earthly ministry. It is today as well. Power and success are often measured by how many people we have working "for" us. It may not be as literal as having people on our payroll, but rather how many friends, resources, and acquaintances are available to achieve what we want. Our culture values being served rather than serving others.

In Mark and Matthew, Jesus clarifies what being "the greatest" means in the Kingdom of Heaven. The disciples misunderstand what Jesus has come to do. They are thinking the way the world does. When Jesus is asked if two disciples (James and John) could receive seats of honor in the Kingdom, he explains what it is to be "the greatest." It is the opposite of what they, and we, expect. The greatest are the ones who serve others, not the other way around.

The Kingdom is fulfilled by serving others without considering any gain for oneself. This standard is distinctive because it cannot be definitively measured. Jesus says in response to this request, "... this is not mine to grant, but it is for those whom it has been prepared by my Father." – Mt 20:23. We can never know what indeed is in another person's heart. Only God knows what is in the heart. 1 Samuel 16:7 says, "Do not look on his appearance or on the height of his stature, because I have rejected him; for the Lord does not see as mortals see; they look on the outward appearance, but the Lord looks on the heart." These words are to God's servant Samuel when he is sent to Jesse's house to anoint a new King for Israel. Samuel assumes the tallest, brightest, and best-looking firstborn son Eliab is the one, but God decides based on something else.

If we serve to be the best servant or most outstanding servant, our motives are selfish. When we act in ways that only benefit others, some may think we are doing it to help ourselves. There is no meaningful competition when it comes to serving in the Kingdom. We can't measure or calculate who is giving more selflessly or less selflessly.

Service happens in many ways and forms. No act is too large or small. The spirit of serving as Jesus does involves no personal gain. The heart of serving as Jesus does is to free others to live life more fully and freely. We serve others, trusting that Jesus has done this for us.

The Kingdom is about love, God's love. We invite others to know what we have experienced. We nurture one another to live and trust more fully in that love. We equip and are equipped to love more completely. We serve with love that trusts God's love has already met our needs abundantly so that we can freely help others for a better life.

The relationship with Jesus is the focus of INVITE, NURTURE, EQUIP, and SERVE. Everything done in the heart and spirit of Jesus draws us together to God.

Around the first day of every month, *The Cross Connection* newsletter arrives at your home in the U.S. Mail. Have you ever stopped to wonder how that happens? Many hours of time are devoted by the church staff each month to gathering details from across the congregation on worship and fellowship opportunities, relational ministry, early childhood ministry, youth ministry, activities and special events, as well as information on the organizations we support beyond our congregation. Hopefully you read the newsletter each month to see not only what's been happening, but also to find opportunities to participate in what's coming up in the future.

Once all of the newsletter content is gathered and formatted for printing, we process almost 1,000 copies of each issue by folding, tabbing and labeling them for mailing. This is no small undertaking, and we thank the volunteers who have stepped up to help us with these preparations. While at this time we don't have a set date and time for this process each month, it typically falls within the last three to four days of the month during daytime office hours. We maintain a list of individuals who have offered to assist with the newsletter mailing process and send out a request for assistance by email as soon as we know what the processing date will be each month. There is no obligation to participate every month, but we appreciate it whenever our volunteers can spare a few hours to help us. As with most tasks, more hands make the work more pleasant and efficient.



Columbarium Ministry

To the right of the main entrance to the sanctuary is the Holy Cross Resurrection Garden. It is an important ministry of ours that often goes below the radar.

Why does Holy Cross have a Resurrection Garden? As people of faith, the promise of the resurrection brings comfort at the time of death. Just as each individual constructs their life in a unique way, our attitudes towards death are also unique. Our Garden consists of a Columbarium, Remembrance Wall, and Meditation Garden. The Columbarium is a dedicated structure containing niches for interment, while the adjacent Remembrance Wall contains plaques to memorialize those who are interred elsewhere. The Garden provides a quiet courtyard for prayer, reflection, and meditation.

Our Columbarium currently houses 144 niches, with room to expand to up to 400. Current and former members of Holy Cross and their families may be interred, while others may also be interred upon request.

Finding Happiness in an Age of Affluence by Steve Oelschlager

I think all of us feel something isn't right with the world as we know it. The late Jonathan Sacks, who served as the Chief Rabbi of the United Kingdom, shared his ideas about what has gone wrong in his book Morality: Restoring the Common Good in Divided Times. Sacks writes:

"Ours is the most affluent age in history. Standards of living have risen consistently over the past fifty years. We can travel around the world, be in touch with friends, buy almost anything we like, see our favorite films, read our favorite books, find out the answer to almost any question, instantly and without friction. Even a generation ago, the access to information and freedom of communication we enjoy today, courtesy of smartphones, apps, and the internet, would have been absolutely inconceivable. Life expectancy in the UK in 1900 was forty-seven years for men and fifty for women, and in 2017, seventy-nine years for men and eighty-three for women, an increase of between two and three extra years in every decade. We are, quite simply, better off, better informed, healthier, and freer than any previous generation.

Yet to take one symptom of contemporary dysphoria, in the course of the past decade, the life satisfaction of teenagers has plummeted. Drug taking, from marijuana to opioids to heroin and crystal meth, has rocketed. We noted in the chapter on social media that rates of depression, stress-related illness, and attempted and actual suicide have risen sharply among today's teenagers. More people than ever say that they are lonely. Some of the most affluent societies in the world are way down the list of happiest populations, Britain at fifteenth, the United States at eighteenth. To quote Richard Wilkinson and Kate Pickett in The Spirit Level, their book on market economics, "It is a remarkable paradox that, at the pinnacle of human material and technical achievement, we find ourselves anxiety-ridden, prone to depression, worried about how others see us, unsure of our friendships, driven to consume and with little or no community life." How could this have happened?

The deeper point is that by constantly inflaming our discontents, an advertising-driven, consumer society that ostensibly aims at happiness becomes in the end a system for the production and distribution of unhappiness. As a former director of General Motors Research Lab once put it, advertising is the 'organized creation of dissatisfaction.' Happiness is good for us, but it is bad for business. Hence we have to be induced to see it as always

lying just around the corner, immediately after the next product we buy.

A consumer society, in short, encourages us to spend money we don't have, on products we don't need, for a happiness that won't last. The reason such happiness does not last lies in the fundamental difference between hedonic happiness, a momentary feeling of pleasurable sensation, and eudaemonic happiness, which is the lasting feeling brought by having lived a good, meaningful, and worthy life. Hedonic happiness requires constant stimulation. Hence the idea of the 'hedonic treadmill': getting what we want only temporarily satisfies desire. We almost immediately find new things to desire, so that though we may find ourselves better off materially, we do not become happier psychologically."

As people of faith, Jesus shares parables, asks questions, and invites us to contemplate what really matters and makes life worth living. I hope Holy Cross is the kind of community that helps you to practice this kind of discernment leading to hopeful ways forward.


Anna Carter Florence is the Peter Marshall Professor of Preaching at Columbia Theological Seminary in Decatur, Georgia. She is an ordained minister in the Presbyterian Church (USA) and holds degrees from Yale University and Princeton Theological Seminary (M.Div. and Ph.D.). Before joining the Columbia faculty in 1998, Dr. Florence served as an associate pastor for youth and young adults at Westminster Presbyterian Church in Minneapolis. This year we will be reading from two of her books, Rehearsing Scripture: Discovering God's Word in Community, and her current book project, 'A' is for Alabaster: A Preacher's Alphabet, being released on October 3.

SCRIPTURE. We can study it carefully. We can listen to sermons on it and read what the experts say about it. But in the end, says Anna Carter Florence, Scripture needs to be rehearsed and encountered—and we can do that best in community with others. In this book Florence offers concrete, practical tools for reading and rehearsing Scripture in groups. Suitable for new and seasoned Bible readers alike, Florence's Rehearsing Scripture invites solitary readers to



become community readers, gather around a shared text, and encounter God anew together.

Beloved preacher and writer Anna Carter Florence brings winsome insight to an array of characters and stories in the Bible—some celebrated and some overlooked. From courageous Abigail to Zelophehad's daughters, and from an alabaster jar of ointment to Zacchaeus in the sycamore tree, Florence takes readers on an enchanting tour of the Old and New Testaments with reflections that reveal ancient wisdom and spark imagination anew.





Project Playground

As the years go by, the needs we have change from one moment to the next. For over five years, our beautiful child-led garden has served us well. It started as a small idea and was shaped into a special place for children to engage with the outdoors in a safe and natural space. Our garden has given us ample fruits and vegetables to share with the community, has provided teachable moments, and has taught us valuable life lessons. Children have had the opportunity to explore the life cycle of plants and have watched baby birds hatch from eggs. Although our children's garden has been a joyful adventure, it is time to begin a new chapter at CrossWays Preschool and Celebration! Childcare.

Over the past few months, our staff has been engaging in conversations regarding a safe space for our infants and toddlers to play outdoors. The discussion began with how to make our existing playground more suitable for our younger students. As our brainstorming sessions continued, we thought of a new idea. Instead of reconstructing our current playground, why not create a unique space specifically designed for infants and toddlers? Similarly to how the concept of beginning a child-led garden took off, the idea for an infant/toddler outdoor play space did as well. After exploring different areas outdoors that could be used, we found that our current garden space would make a perfect fit. Indeed, our garden has been beloved and well-used. However, a closed-in area that could be fenced would be highly beneficial for our families and staff.

After a visit from our DCFS Licensing Representative, we got the green light to start planning for an infant/toddler play space in our current garden area. The initial phase is to clean up the space by removing the garden accessories, such as the greenhouse and raised beds. We will use the dirt from the raised beds to level the ground and plant new grass. Keeping grass for ground coverage instead of wood chips will be ideal for our infants, who have limited mobility. The grass will be a sensory benefit that the students can explore. Over the next year, we will continue to remodel the space, install a fence, and purchase infant/toddler outdoor equipment. Our hope is to have the outdoor space completed by the summer of 2024 for our students to enjoy when the warm weather returns.

To finance this project, we have saved funds from our WISHES campaign. Thanks to the congregation's generosity, we had money left over after purchasing all the wish items. We can now put the remaining amount toward this fantastic project! In addition, we will be using the proceeds from our 2023 Fallin' Into Fun Fundraiser. Last year, the fundraiser brought in \$4,000 for our early childhood programs. We are hoping for an even more successful event this year! Individuals can help support this project by attending our fall fundraiser on Saturday, September 30, from 2 - 6 pm (see our flyer!) or by contributing a monetary donation through Holy Cross.

Five Holy Cross youth, Deaconess Katie and Pastor Chris traveled with the pastor and youth from Joy! Lutheran Church in Gurnee. We connected, served, and stayed with youth from all over the country. The Week of Hope staff connected 12 crews that worked across the Indianapolis area with several organizations such as Boys & Girls Club camps, food pantries, food banks, clothes closets, and senior centers. Below are a few reflections from some of the students who took part.



"When I first started out on my mission trip, I thought it would be boring, but it turned out to be really exciting. Just sorting bread was miraculous. There was one moment that I knew God was sending me a message. When I was helping a lady get her groceries into her car, I noticed she dropped her groceries, so I went up to her, but I heard her crying while saying, "Thank you, God." So I gave her the groceries and left. It was really cool to get to help people in need, it really showed me the power that God distributes." - Bella

"My experience with the Forged mission trip to Indiana was full of fun with friends, and important work. I liked my work at the Midwest food bank where I got to help organize and distribute food so that people in need could have access to meals that they might not get otherwise." - Charles

"The mission trip was a lot of fun I was so glad to spend time getting to know Pastor Chris and Deaconess Katie. Meeting new kids and spending time together was awesome too. I think that connecting with other people is a great way to experience God. I worked at a warehouse organizing food and clothing donations. The organization was The Good Samaritan Network. "My week in Indianapolis was amazing! I met so many new friends and made closer relationships with my friends who were there with me. I was assigned to work at a food bank in the area and I loved it. The staff members there were so friendly and helpful, and they made sure we always had something to do. Most of the time we spent there my group packed boxes of food onto pallets and then later helped load the food into trucks to be taken by local food pantries and churches. When the week ended I had to say goodbye to all my new friends, but overall I had a great experience on the trip." - Pierce

"When I was in Indiana, I worked at a boys and girls club which is similar to a summer school, but with more recess. Working there consisted of playing with the kids and making friendships with them. I saw God through Anthony. When I got to the boys and girls club, a 5 year old named Anthony wanted to play with me right away. After the first couple days of me finding him... he found me. On the last day of the trip, one of the counselors said that he had never been as open to anyone there as he was to me." - Connor


