Showing Up

My mother would often offer words of encouragement to us when we were younger. There were days when I may not have wanted to climb out of bed at the beginning of another day. She would often say to me



"Showing up is part of living." Her point was that if you don't show up for the day then who knows what you might miss participating in. In her way of framing her life she realized that each day is a gift and that in some way perhaps any given day may turn out to be one of those pivotal moments for your future.

Jesus seemed to value each day. He was open to the building of relationships and the effort that goes into developing trust. He had a spirit of gratitude for the simple moments that reminded him of the beauty of God created days. He embraced an appreciation for the joy that comes from being curious and willing to entertain the mystery of those moments in life that may go beyond our ability to understand.

In other words, Jesus showed up. Jesus showed up for the Samaritan woman at the well, for the healing of the ten lepers, for blind Bartimaeus, for the man who was lame and whose friends lowered him through the roof, for the 5,000 who were nurtured with the sermon on the mount, and, for the conversation with the rich young ruler. There was Nicodemus, the woman who was to be stoned to death, the conversations with the disciples, and, there was that first Easter. Of course there were many others whose lives intersected with Jesus in ordinary moments through the course of a day. What does it mean for us to "show up" each day?

I don't believe it is a waste of our time to reflect upon those intersections in our life. I remember the lessons I have learned from those moments when I made a mistake or maybe didn't choose as wisely as I might have and the individuals who helped me navigate through them. I think about those voices of grandparents, aunts and uncles when our extended family would come together to celebrate. I observed as my parents practiced their version of hospitality and compassion towards others. I think my parents had the humble belief that wholeness in life comes largely from the fact that we "show up" for people, causes, helping a neighbor, and, always ask ourselves the question, "What else can I do?" I am grateful for the educators and mentors who have walked with me at critical moments and gifted me with their clarity. I am blessed with friends who are willing to have those kinds of honest conversations that define us beyond our limited perspective.

I realize that these people and experiences still influence my thinking and guide my moral compass. "Showing up" is a simple enough concept. It may not seem to be that profound on the surface of life. Here's the good news: no matter how discouraged or distracted we may get, Jesus walks with us. As the Emmaus experience revealed, we can improve our faith journey by looking for Jesus in the past as well as the present. The Gospel narrative radiates with the good news of the power and the presence of Jesus. Jesus leads. Jesus restores. Jesus provides. Jesus anoints. Jesus' goodness and mercy are with us always.

We can live in a new way when we are both aware that Jesus is with us and we can trust our very lives with Jesus' guidance. In his book *Resident Aliens: Life of the Christian Colony*, Bishop Will Willimon wrote that "this story demands an offensive rather than a defensive posture by the church. The world and all its resources, anguish, gifts, and groaning is God's world, and God commands what God has created. Jesus Christ is the supreme act of divine intrusion into the world's settled arrangement."

In Christ, God refuses to occupy a prescribed space. Jesus calls us out where we are buried, buried in our fears, our pain, our grief, our worries, life's pressures. Thank God Jesus is still showing up...



A Whole Lot of Weird

"That's weird." Recently I found myself thinking that - I may have even said it out loud. I can't even remember why. Has that ever happened to you? As you reflect internally or externally, the only thing that can sum up that experience is - that's it's just weird. Not good or bad, just weird.

I wonder how many times the disciples gave each other side glances which implied, "that's weird." Was it when the water was turned into wine? When the lady touched Jesus's cloak and was made whole again? When he walked on water? When they stayed in houses of sinners?

While I am convinced that weird isn't either good or bad, I do believe that "weird" feelings inspire growth. When we have an experience, big or small, positive or negative, that we self-determine as "weird," we make a value and judgment call that leaves us convinced "there has got to be a reason" for that weird thing to have happened. Weird makes us wonder, weird makes us reflect and evaluate, weird keeps an experience or moment at the forefront of our minds as a constant reminder of the reconciliation we are doing with ourselves to make the situation, well, less weird. The human mind can rationalize just about anything, but "weird" makes us pause, stop and wonder.

By pausing, stopping, wondering and reflecting, we are invited into a space of introspection and interior work. That sounds a lot like faith work to me. Or prayer work. Or discernment. It sounds to me like the Holy Spirit is active in a way that may be new for us to discover God's presence with us in a new way, even in the weird. It seems to me that the weird is a sacred space of renewal and insight. This summer we are offering an Intergenerational VBS (see page 2) that may be a little weird for some, simply because it is new and different. When was the last time you used a prayer bracelet, a piece of art or walking a path to intentionally spend time with God?

What might those "weird" moments be calling you to pause, stop and wonder about in your own life? Perhaps some of those "weird" moments are really "God Sightings" in disguise? (see page 11) What weird moments in your life have been transformative? Perhaps they aren't as weird as you once thought, or perhaps they're still unexplainable and just a whole lot of weird . . .

From a recent CNN article:

"It's not because we think about how we'll be remembered. We would be delighted if someday diseases like polio and malaria have been forgotten, and the fact that we worked on them has been, too.

We do this work because it's important, it's rewarding and it's in line with how we were raised. We both come from families that believe in leaving the world better than you found it. Melinda's parents made sure their children took the social justice teachings of the Catholic Church to heart. When Melinda was in high school – at Ursuline Academy of Dallas – she volunteered in the public schools, tutoring students who were falling behind in math. Bill's parents advocated for a dizzying number of important causes and local organizations in Seattle, everything from United Way and the University of Washington to school levy campaigns.

Of course, these values are not unique to the two of us. Millions of people give back by volunteering their time and donating money to help others. We are, however, in the more unusual position of having a lot of money to donate. Our goal is to do what our parents taught us and do our part to improve the state of the world.

The two of us have been doing this work, more or less full time, for close to two decades. That's the majority of our marriage. It's almost the entirety of our children's lives. By now the foundation's work has become inseparable from who we are. We do the work because it's our life.

We've tried to pass on values to our children by talking with them about the foundation's work, and, as they've gotten older, taking them with us on trips so they can see it for themselves. We've spent thousands of hours learning together, meeting with scientists, educators and world leaders. Where we go, who we spend our time with, what we read and watch and listen to – these decisions are made through the prism of our work at the foundation.

Maybe 20 years ago we could have made a different choice about what to do with our wealth. But now it's impossible to imagine."

The Language of Music

Since my Poulenc program last November I have learned two pieces of music that are new to me. One is the English Suite #6 of Bach and the other is the Sonata #28, Opus 101, of Beethoven. Both men had huge hurdles to face in their music making. Although the powers that be do not like to talk about it, the truth is that Bach was miserable much of his time in Leipzig. The city fathers were not that all accommodating to him and he was not much of a politician. In a word, Bach did not suffer fools gladly, while he was functioning on a creative level of which few people have even dreamed. Beethoven had no "people skills" whatsoever and rarely took a bath. And, of course, there is the detail that for much of his adult life, he was deaf. I have read that he fell down at age 27 and got up with ringing in his ears. From then on his hearing degenerated into total deafness and he died at age 57. All the same, he transformed the piano sonata, the string quartet, and the symphony, In music history one has eras known as the Renaissance, the Baroque, the Classical, Beethoven, the Romantic, and the modern. Beethoven was that distinctive.

In truth, it is humbling to attempt to play the music of Bach and Beethoven. One never plays a complex Bach piece the same way twice. One just tries anew to play it each time and hopes the result can be perhaps as good as or even better than the previous effort. With a complicated Beethoven sonata, one is just in awe that Beethoven never heard a note of much of what he had composed, except within his head.

I have been studying German, the language of Bach and Beethoven, for quite a while now. My initial motivation, which is still relevant, was to attend a BACHFEST in Leipzig and understand much of what is said there, in addition to comprehending the music. This summer, starting on July 9, I will be studying German at a language institute in Freiburg to give my German study a boost. I will be living with a family in Freiburg who I hope will speak German to me and not want to try out their English on me. In short, my music making has provided the impetus for my language study to such a degree that the two experiences are now intertwined.

Alex and Daniella Würfel, a delightful couple from Germany who attend Holy Cross with their two children, have arranged for me to play two Sundays in July at their home church in Wiesbaden. For better or worse, I will be able to try out my German on their friends. And, of course, the whole reason I will be able to immerse myself in this arena of German speakers in the first place is because I can play the organ. When I play a church service conducted in Germany, the organs and the music in question are not a huge challenge. My biggest task is to keep track of what place we are at in the service. I recall last summer at the church in the village of Westheim when the pastor announced after the sermon that he was skipping the offering and going straight to the closing hymn. He then looked at me as if to say, "Did you get that?"

The good news is that I did indeed realize what he was doing and proceeded accordingly.

To put all of this another way, music itself is its own language. And it is the language the members of the Holy Cross Choir and I use to enhance the Word of God as we worship. Before I leave for Germany, I hope to have set up a schedule of the choir's singing for the months ahead. The unusual aspect of next season is that Epiphany has 9 Sundays. Easter, April 21st, 2019, is one day short of coming as late as it can be. I will be compelled to find music anew that celebrates the twin Epiphany themes of light and missions.

I practice piano just about every day and study German daily. My ultimate motivation is to keep my brain going in high gear in this autumn of my life. The conundrum, of course, is that the more one learns, the more one realizes there is to learn. One of my fantasies about the next life is to be able to talk to Bach, a fellow church musician, about how he managed to do all that he did here on earth. I would not want to bother Beethoven, who I trust is busy listening to all of the music he could not hear while dwelling among mere mortal men.

Reducing Plastic Pollution

Reusable Grocery Bags

Holy Cross and the Care of Creation team members have been fostering the initiative to use reusable bags and reduce the use of single-use plastic bags for at least 10 years. Since 2008, Holy Cross has added approximately 745 reusable ChicoBags into circulation within our congregation. If we assume these bags are all still in use and are used even just twice a week, these reusable bags are keeping 77,480 plastic bags out of the environment. Quite an impressive total!

Of course the most important thing is to remember to put the bag back in your purse or pocket after unloading whatever it was holding! (If you forget your reusable bags in the car and are using a shopping cart, consider putting your groceries back in the cart and pack your own groceries at your trunk!) Did you miss the opportunity to purchase ChicoBags on Earth Day? Bags are available to purchase for \$5/each during office hours.

Say "No Thank You" to the Straw

There is another single-use plastic item that we can also try to eliminate to help God's creation - plastic straws. Some of us remember when straws were made of paper, and yes, they did get a bit soggy if you left them in your drink too long, but the plus was they disintegrated in the landfill. Plastic came along and straws never got soggy. They were cheaper to manufacture, and plastic straws took over. However, plastic straws do NOT break down.

The Shedd Aquarium is promoting a "Shedd the Straw" campaign to encourage all of us to decline a straw with our drinks. This spring, Starbucks started offering customers a "sippy lid" that doesn't require a straw for iced drinks.



Fun Fact: Recently the Chicago White Sox became the first team in Major League Baseball to serve drinks during games without an accompanying plastic straw for nearly an entire season! Let's all #SheddTheStraw.

TOP 3 REASONS TO #SheddTheStraw



- 1) Roughly 19 BILLION POUNDS OF PLASTIC wind up in the oceans annually.
- Because plastic straws don't biodegrade and are nearly impossible to recycle, it's likely that EVERY STRAW EVER USED still exists on our planet.
- 3) Americans use an estimated 500 MILLION STRAWS A DAY roughly the same weight as 1,000 cars.



Welcome Summer!


Reading and playing with young children is one of the most enjoyable activities for parent and child alike. We all know the value of exposing children to books (for prompting their own literacy), but it seems there is an even greater benefit to engaging in these activities with young children. Dr. Alan Mendelsohn conducted a study on the subject, and the findings were recently published in the journal Pediatrics in April, 2018. The study, "Reading Aloud, Play, and Social-Emotional Development," followed children who were part of a parenting intervention to see if the intervention had any impact on the children's development. The researchers gave parents toys and books to use when interacting with their children. These interactions were videotaped and then shown to the parents. A parenting coach helped parents see what kind of interactions were valuable for their children and which were not. The results were remarkable, in that not only did the children who received the intervention show greatly diminished occurrences of aggressive and hyperactive behavior as compared to the control group, the effects were long lasting. The conclusion Dr. Mendelsohn arrived at is that positive parenting activities, such as reading and playing with their children, make a huge difference in cognitive, social, and emotional development.

CrossWays engages in these valuable activities with our students every day, and we encourage our parents to be active partners with us in their child's growth and development. I encourage you to make these activities a priority for you and the young children in your life. The coming of summer is a great time to try to include this in your daily schedule.

CrossWays Preschool ended a very successful year on May 24. We celebrated the end of the year with an all-school picnic. It was wonderful to come together and rejoice in all that our students have accomplished over the past school year! We wish the best for our students who are moving on to Kindergarten. Please come back and visit us! We want to hear all about your success in your new school!

Although we will see some of our two year old and three year old friends over the summer, we are looking forward to seeing them all next fall when school starts back up again! We will be closed for a few weeks while we rest and prepare for summer camp, and then we will be back in full swing mid-month. 
