A Lenten Kind Of Grace

For me, the scriptures inform an image of a God with open arms ready to receive us in a loving embrace. This image is constant and unchanging. We compose lives of faith in the eternal presence of God's embrace: God is always waiting; God is always willing to take us in; God does not look back to our own miserable past, but God offers us the possibility and the immediacy of love.

The Rev. Whitney Rice tells the story about a Franciscan priest who when the terrible war in Bosnia and Herzegovina ended in December 1995 began a revolutionary project. He recruited singers from across their country, people who were gifted in music. They were people who were known in their towns and communities for their voices. He brought them all together, Muslims and Christians, Serbs and Croats, some literally fresh off the battlefield, and asked them to begin singing together. But not just any songs. He asked them to sing the most traditional and well-known and deeply rooted religious songs of the Bosnian people, both Christian songs and Muslim songs. He asked them to sing the songs of their enemies. Some immediately understood the healing potential of the project and plunged into singing all the music, both their own songs and the songs of their enemies. Others' pain was so deep that they could not imagine singing the music that had been the battle cry of people who had shot and



shelled and killed their comrades, their loved ones, and their families. But even those who could not sing at first stayed in the room and listened, some of them sitting silently with tears of anger on their faces through months of rehearsals before they could voice a single note. But eventually they all sang, and the choir is still doing their reconciling work.

This story reminds me that people of faith have options. We can stand still. We can go backwards. Or, we can choose to move forward. The scriptures assigned for the Sundays in Lent remind us again and again that Jesus encourages us to move forward by God's grace. Jesus is in the business of breaking through obstacles and tearing down barriers. Jesus acknowledges the presence of barriers between people and between us and our Creator which prevent us from moving forward.

Jesus names those barriers that enter into our relationship with God, with others and with our own true self. Some of the obstacles are imposed from outside by our society and our culture... many are imposed from within. We're afraid that if God really knew us, God wouldn't like us very much, so we build our own walls. We create the distance in our relationships and we construct those barriers to protect us. We often end up putting energy into maintaining the status quo or living in the past and ignore the option of moving forward and leaning into a life practicing forgiveness, kindness, love and operating from the gift of God's grace.

Lent asks us to consider that even when we feel lost we remember that God directs our path. Jesus insists on breaking through and when that happens, hopefully we recognize it as a moment of grace. It's the kind of grace that comforts us when we are restless and in great pain. It's the kind of grace that accompanies us when we walk through the dark valley of a meaningless and empty life. It's the kind of grace that confronts us when we feel that our separation is deeper than usual, because we have violated another life which we loved or from which we are estranged. It's the kind of grace that challenges us when our indifference, our weakness, our hostility, and our lack of direction and composure have become intolerable to us.

I would hope that as people of faith, we realize that we are living in a moment in history that is bitterly divided, at a time when hatred seems to be winning over love and where hostility works against reconciliation. As people of faith, let us move as children of God to spread the good news of God's embrace for all of God's creation and created beings.

Calming Down for Lent

This month we are delving into the season of Lent.

Historically, the mood of Lent has been a period of 40 days of fasting and penance. Seeing as we're wrapping up a solid two years of pandemic, 40 days honestly doesn't sound that impressive anymore. I'd take 40 days without meat without batting an eye, who knows, maybe it's just the latest supply shortage.

But think back to the "before" times: could you imagine voluntarily giving up in-person schooling, childcare, and playdates for your kids for 40 days? Remember, that was just three years ago. This Wisconsin bred dairy lover is more willing to go vegan for the sake of fighting climate change than take childcare for granted ever again.

So, long story short, I'm not going to further emphasize reflecting on our mortality or repentance here. I find myself thinking "maybe in a few years"—maybe after a few years of genuine stability my heart and mind will calm down enough for it to feel like Lent again. Maybe.

I'm going to go out on a limb here; if it's effective enough for a volatile three-year-old, maybe it'll work for a thirty-year-old too. God knows I'm tired, busy, and very pregnant. I'm not in the mood for Lent and I don't have time to slow down. And let's be honest, if I try to reflect on anything I'm just going to fall asleep. Maybe I'm the only one here, but in case you are feeling as contrary as I am, might I suggest turning to God and saying "I need help calming down".

May God pick us up and hold us, and may we remember to take deep breaths.

Journey faith, discipleship, generosity

Faith and Friendship by Steve Oelschlager

Over the years, one of the things I have appreciated most about my involvement at Holy Cross and other congregations I have belonged to is the friendships I have formed. As a child, I looked forward to seeing my best friend at church on Sunday morning, just as I look forward to seeing all of you from week to week. It is a blessing to have friends who can accompany each other on the journey of life, and I'm grateful for all the ways you enrich my life.

I wonder how many of us think of Jesus and God as our friends? Perhaps that is a different way to think about our relationship with the divine, but maybe it is helpful. In her new book Freeing Jesus, Diana Butler Bass explores this dimension of Jesus as our friend who connects us with his friend God. She writes:

"Indeed, Jesus instructed his friends to pray to 'Abba' (as we can assume he himself prayed), a term most often rendered as 'Father' in English, but one that contains shades of meaning denoting intimacy and familiarity, including that of fraternal relations like 'brother' or 'companion,' and is related to the Hebrew word for 'friend' (ahab), used to describe Abraham.

Thus, Jesus introduces his friends (the disciples) to his other friend (God) in the daily prayer known as the 'Our Father,' perhaps the spirit of which is better captured by 'Our Father-Friend' or just 'Our Friend.' This idea of 'Our Friend in heaven' was a revolutionary one, as Jesus, acting as a mediator of divine companionship, collapsed the sacred distance between God and us. That thread of insight is found scattershot in the tradition, appearing in comments of theologians like St. Gregory of Nyssa, who linked the tradition of Moses as God's friend with Jesus when he wrote, 'Christ is our true friend.'

Friendship is contingent on love—real love: compassion, empathy, reaching out, going beyond what we imagine is possible. That is the command: love. And if we reach out in love, friendship is the result, even friendship with God. Friendship is mutual, a hand extended and another reaching back... Friendship is an eternal circle, the ceaseless reaching toward one another that strengthens us and gives us joy."

The real issue for men is that we don't like troubling other people with our problems. And being lost seems like a real problem. And asking someone for directions feels like troubling them.

Do you remember the first time you ever used a GPS? It can be exciting to remember feeling very high tech and how dependent we become on that technology. We become accustomed to simply typing in our desired destination and this seemingly all-knowing, gentle, reassuring voice would turn-by-turn safely guide us there.

There may have been moments in life when we longed for a GPS: Spiritual Version. We may wonder how it might be if God worked that way. Wouldn't it be nice to be able to tell God exactly where we want to go and exactly when we want to get there and have God's all-knowing, gentle, reassuring voice guide us safely there turn-by-turn?

But life doesn't work like that. And God doesn't work like that. And truth be told, life would be pretty boring if it worked like that; if all we ever did was follow the exact instructions of "the great voice in the sky." No one likes to be told what to do all the time. It is important that we be free to explore, and free to make mistakes, and free to go on an adventure every now and

March & April: Inspired: Slaying Giants, Walking on Water, and Loving the Bible Again by Rachel Held Evans


If the Bible isn't a science book, instruction manual, or position paper, then what is it? New York Times bestselling author Rachel Held Evans (1981-2019) invites readers on a journey of rediscovery as she explores the magic of the Bible, engaging the old, familiar stories in new ways that honor the past and enlighten the present. Drawing upon recent scholarship and literary analysis, Evans creatively retells our favorite Bible stories, explaining their contexts and possible interpretations, and then connects these ancient stories to our present-day ones. Using her well-honed literary instincts and experience in both evangelical and mainline Protestant traditions, Evans discovers a way of understanding that avoids noncommittal liberalism on one hand and strident literalism on the other. Readers are invited to fall in love with Scripture all over again without checking their intellect—or their imaginations—at the door.

May, June, July: The Color of Compromise by Jemar Tisby

The Color of Compromise is both enlightening and compelling, telling a history we either ignore or just don't know. Equal parts painful and inspirational, it details how the American church has helped create and maintain racist ideas and practices. You will be guided in thinking through concrete solutions for improved race relations and a racially inclusive church. This book is not a call to shame or a platform to blame white evangelical Christians. It is a call from a place of love and desire to fight for a more racially unified church that no longer compromises what the Bible teaches about human dignity and equality. A call that challenges black and white Christians alike to stand up now and being implementing the concrete ways Tisby outlines, all for a more equitable and inclusive environment among God's people. Starting today.

Each month we pray with each other—for those wounded by racism and prejudice as well as for the strength to examine our own biases, privileges, experiences, words, and actions. 
Please join us this lenten season for our next 6-session study series.

In her book and video series titled Witness at the Cross, author Amy-Jill Levine shows how the people at the cross each have distinct roles to play. Each Evangelist presents a distinct picture of the death of Jesus. Each portrays different individuals and groups of people at the cross, each offers different images and dialogues, and so from each, we learn how those meanings and messages cross the centuries to any who would come to the cross today. Each Gospel has its own story to tell, all the witnesses have their own memories, and every reader comes away with a new insight. The story of Jesus's death is not something we just read: we think about it, and we experience it; we hear the taunts of the soldiers, the priests, and the passersby even as we hear the famous "seven last words" from the cross. The witnesses at the Crucifixion watch Jesus die, and we watch with them, and we watch them. And we come away transformed.

Experience Holy Friday from the perspective of those who watched Jesus die: Mary his mother; the Beloved Disciple from the Gospel of John; Mary Magdalene and the other women from Galilee; the two men, usually identified as thieves, crucified with Jesus; the centurion and the soldiers; Joseph of Arimathea and Nicodemus. Jews and Romans, friends and strangers, the powerful and the powerless, the hopeful and the despairing.

This series will be offered on the following Tuesday mornings: March 8 & 22, April 12 & 26 and May 10 & 24. The videos for Witness at the Cross are available on Amplify media for free through our congregational subscription. See the February newsletter for details.





The phrase "pull together" has become a frequently heard term in businesses, families, and society in general. It can certainly be heard—and seen—in our Early Childhood Ministry (ECM) programs at Holv Cross.

Two years ago, March 2020, we were faced with the challenge of putting our ECM programs "on hold" until further notice. We had no idea when we could resume our services to the ECM children and families but we began to prepare for the day we could welcome the students back to CrossWays Preschool and Celebration! Childcare. We wanted everything to be ready to go when it was safe to resume our programs.

A team of teachers and administrators worked together to design protocols and procedures that we could present to staff and parents, assuring that everyone would know what to do to keep our programs safe. This team truly *pulled together* to make this task doable. Celebration! Childcare students returned in June and CrossWays Preschool students followed in September. Parents and staff were wonderful in following the protocols and everything seemed manageable.

Because the pandemic continued into another year, we still needed to adhere to expectations and deal with continuous shifting of rules and mandates. Everyone was becoming weary of masks, vaccines, cleaning, exposures, testing, and quarantines. But there was still the sense of pulling together, particularly with our staff, to keep the programs in operation and to continue to provide a safe environment for our students.

The pandemic, although looking a bit different, is now continuing into a third year. We are seeing new challenges and difficulties as we continue to navigate through Covid. In the last few months, we have seen several cases of Covid among our students and staff, causing quarantines and staff absences. In response to teachers and assistants needing to be absent, the remaining staff *pulled together* and worked with the director to rearrange schedules, add hours, and do whatever was needed to keep our classes open.

Pulling together is more than a cliché. It's a force that accomplishes a common goal. It's a work ethic that is seen in a variety of groups. And, it is business as usual within our ECM programs.

Thank you, ECM staff, for your continued efforts in making our programs an excellent place for children to learn and grow—and to be safe!

Columbarium Ministry

To the right of the main entrance to the sanctuary is the Holy Cross Resurrection Garden. It is an important ministry of ours that often goes below the radar.

Why does Holy Cross have a Resurrection Garden? As people of faith, the promise of the resurrection brings comfort at the time of death. Just as each individual constructs their life in a unique way, our attitudes towards death are also unique. Our Garden consists of a Columbarium, Remembrance Wall, and Meditation Garden. The Columbarium is a dedicated structure containing niches for interment, while the adjacent Remembrance Wall contains plaques to memorialize those who are interred elsewhere. The Garden provides a quiet courtyard for prayer, reflection, and meditation.

Our Columbarium currently houses 144 niches, with room to expand to up to 400. Current and former members of Holy Cross and their families may be interred, while others may also be interred upon request.

Think and Act Locally

Environmental issues and problems can be overwhelming, especially when we see and hear about them in context of the entire globe. If you feel that way, you are not alone. So, let me suggest this approach. I have listed a couple of the top environmental problems according to earth.org Think about each from a local and regional lens; what is being done for the good as well as the ill. Talk to your family and friends. How are these two problems interrelated? Think boldly together about creation restored. Isaiah 65:17 says, "For I am about to create new heavens and a new earth."

Food Waste and Food Insecurity

1.3 billion tons of food is wasted or lost each year (that's about a third of the food produced for human consumption). This is enough to feed 3 billion people. It also took energy (lots of emissions) to produce the food, only for it to go to waste. Think about where our food comes from, how we eat and how supporting local and regional food systems can help to reduce food waste and get fresh food into the hands of those in need. The food "system" can include the home gardener, participating in and supporting local community gardens, family farms and farmer's markets, knowing what communities are dependent on food pantries and why, and as always, caring for the soil and the land.

Biodiversity Loss

Humanity is using more of Earth's resources than it can replenish naturally. It is reported that population sizes of mammals, fish, birds, reptiles, and amphibians have experienced a decline of an average of 68% between 1970 and 2016. This loss is a result mainly of land-use changes that include development and converting habitats (forests, grasslands, and mangroves) into agricultural systems. Ways to keep things "wild" and to "re-wild" our environment include planting native gardens, advocating for restorative land use practices and protecting open, natural spaces from development.


