Sunday, January 29, 2023

Call to Order

Holy Cross Church Council President Andy Eidson called the meeting to order at 10:48 am. Andy explained he would lead the meeting and Pastor Chris and Steve Oelschlager, Harold Sargent, Jen Christensen, contributing at various moments.

Opening Prayer - Blessed are those who comes to the annual meeting

Pastor Chris led the Congregation in an opening prayer.

Approve Agenda/Appointment of Tellers

- Meeting will be conduct following Robert's Rules of Order according to our Constitution.
 - We do this to promote discussion yet follow a productive and efficient process.
 - For each issue, Andy will ask for motion, provide time for discussion, and conclude with verbal yay or nay from congregation.
- When Andy refers to the "Annual Report" it is the 2022 Annual Report distributed in paper copy last Sunday and this
 morning. It is also available on the Church's website at HolyCrossChurch.org/resources
- Today's meeting is not being recorded, so Terry Berger, Council Secretary, will take minutes.
- Amy Sekili, Bill Miksch and Darin and Peggy Chartier have volunteered to act as Tellers for the meeting.
 - They will help distribute materials and facilitate ballots if needed.
- Harold Sargent was appointed as Parliamentarian.
- Andy presented the Agenda for approval, which was shown on the screen and was available in handout.
 - Ralph Freye made a motion to approve the agenda as presented. Jeannine Phillips seconded the motion. The motion was approved unanimously by the Congregation.

Approval of Congregational Meeting Minutes

- Andy asked the congregation to review the 1/30/22 Congregational Meeting minutes found on page 3 of the Annual Report and 4/24/22 Special Congregational Meeting minutes included in the handout.
- Congregation was reminded that if they saw typo's or slight corrections please contact the church office they do not need to be raised today.
- Carole Kenney made a motion to approve the 1/30/22 Congregational Meeting minutes and 4/24/22 Special
 Congregational Meeting minutes approve the as presented. John Villani seconded the motion. The motion was
 approved unanimously by the Congregation.

Approving New Business and the Election of New Council Members

- Thanks to outgoing members Amy Sekili, Mick Garrison, Bill Miksch for their time, energy and commitment to serving on Council
- Andy reminded the congregation that the Church Council has 12 members, each serving a 3-year term
 - Each year 4 terms expire. Members cannot serve more than 2 consecutive terms.
 - If a member resigns during their term, the Council appoints a replacement to complete the remainder of the term.
 - The replacement must be elected to complete the term at the next congregational meeting.
- Four individuals are being considered today
 - Identified by a Nomination Committee, consulted, agreed to serve
 - Information about each nominee can be found on page 9 of the Annual Report
- Candidates are
 - Wendy Brewer (Seeking first term)
 - Karen Karris (Seeking first term)
 - Jeannine Phillips (Current member, seeking second term)
 - Joe Taylor (Seeking first term)
- Andy asked if there were any other Nominees, none were provided
- Wayne Luplow made a motion to close the nominations for Council Members. Dave Kenney seconded the motion.
 The motion was approved unanimously by the Congregation.
- Harold Sargent made a motion to approve the election of 4 candidates. Jen Christiansen seconded the motion. The motion was approved unanimously by the Congregation.

Presentation and Approval of the 2023 Proposed Budget

- Steve Oelschlager provided a Stewardship message and discussed the 2023 budgeting process.
- Andy reminded the congregation that the purpose at this time of the meeting was to approve the 2023 budget.
- Steve walked us through the highlights of the budget.

- 2023 budget includes the transition of Pastor Bob to pastor emeritus and addition of a full time Director of Youth and Family Ministries. This has been identified as a high priority for congregation
- 2022 ended very well with record giving from the congregation members
- Thank you to Tom Miller for the generous commitment of his time reviewing financial matters
- Jen Christensen made a motion to approve the 2023 Proposed Ministry Budget. Nicole Drake seconded the motion. The motion was approved unanimously by the Congregation.

Informational Discussion about Church Constitution

Terry Berger and Harold Sargent have volunteered to review and propose amendments to our 20 year old constitution. Harold informed the congregation:

- Current Constitution was written in 2000, and has not been updated since then
- Church Wide Assembly occurs every three years, with the "model" constitution (which is the basis of our constitution) being updated at each assembly
- There have been 10 updates since our congregation last updated our constitutions
- Important updates need to be made regarding things such as remote meetings, simplifications of amendment process, etc.
- The "Model" constitution will be compared side by side with the Holy Cross Constitution, to determine where updates are needed
- We will present proposed updates to the Council and congregation
- A meeting will be held with the congregation for approval of the changes, with the updates being ratified at next year's Congregational meeting
- All of this will be done in partnership with the Bishop's office

Approval of Ministry and Administrative Reports

- Reports from church staff members as well as administrative reports and results are included on pages 10 through 45
 of the Annual Report
- Ministry reports make up the largest portion of the Annual Report, and illustrate the strength of our congregation.
- Wayne Luplow made a motion to approve the Ministry and Administrative reports as found on pages 10 thru 45 of the Annual Report. Judy Frank-Gonwa seconded the motion. The motion was approved unanimously by the Congregation.

Path Forward and Transition Committee Update

- Jen Christensen provided an update on the Path Forward and Transition Committee
 - A vear ago we were in the middle of the non-traditional path forward
 - Thank you to everyone who participated in the Path Forward
 - The effort has brought the congregation a long way in the last year
 - God has graced and blessed us with the ability to have this transition process
 - We will be a benchmark for other congregations to follow a similar transition
 - We wish Bob all the best as he begins his sabbatical and look forward to hearing about the experience when he returns

Innovation Team

- · Steve Oelschlager presented the concept of the Innovation team
- Innovation is not new to Holy Cross
- This team will seek opportunities to see what/how we can continue to grow as a congregation

Adjournment and Closing Praver

Andy asked for a motion to adjourn the meeting.

STAFF REPORTS

Pastoral Ministry Rev. Christopher P. Neptun, Senior Pastor

A great deal happened at Holy Cross in 2023. In 2022, the focus was calling a new senior pastor and beginning the leadership transition. This year, the transition continued, although with a different focus.

The year began with Pastor Bob and me as Co-Senior Pastors. Pastor Bob then left on a three-month sabbatical in February. I assumed the role of Senior Pastor. Pastor Bob returned at the beginning of June as Pastor Emeritus. This change of titles was a milestone. Still, the work of living in these new roles has continued for both Pr. Bob and me. I continue to assume the role and call of Senior Pastor with all its blessings and responsibilities. Pastor Bob has increasingly and thoughtfully stepped back to allow me to achieve this.

Other transitions and additions to the staff occurred in 2023 as well. Darrin Rose was hired part-time as Holy Cross' Choir Director in August. Darrin has resumed weekly rehearsals for the choir, performed many anthems at both Sunday services, and orchestrated opportunities for our choristers to participate in music events beyond the walls of Holy Cross. Darrin has involved new and invited long-time singers to join in the choir.

Beginning in 2024, Dale Tippett Jr. will assume the role and title of Director of Worship Arts. He will lead our contemporary music ministries and technical worship arts, coordinating music, worship planning, and scheduling musicians. This expanded role will also require Dale to lead, delegate tasks, and equip others to share the ministry of Worship Arts at Holy Cross.

Edwin Andrade joined us in September from Tucson, AZ, to become Holy Cross' first full-time Director of Youth and Family Ministries. As a result, Holy Cross is experiencing shifts in ministering to our youth and their families, specifically ministry to middle school youth. The structure of confirmation has changed from three years of instruction to a six week intensive course focusing on the teachings of Luther's Small Catechism. Our commitment to teaching the Bible as the Word of God has led to the start of Emerge, a middle school youth group that meets weekly, much like our High School youth group, Crossroads. Deaconess Katie and I will help Edwin take on a more significant role in confirmation instruction while she focuses on other areas of ministry.

In 2021, Deaconess Katie began to partner with Holy Cross as the Director of Children and Family Ministry. While she is a consecrated Deaconess with the Lutheran Deaconess Association, she is also an ordained minister of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America. She is currently "On Leave from Call" with the Virginia Synod of the ELCA. As you might imagine, ministry can be challenging. It requires a pastor to continue discernment and give attention to the needs of the churches they serve and their personal, physical, and emotional needs. Over the last three years, Deaconess Katie has taken time to rest, heal, discern, and assess her calling while serving the church in a role other than pastor. Having done so, she realizes she remains called to ordained ministry as a pastor in the ELCA. To return to the "Active" roster, she must receive a call from a congregation.

Deaconess Katie has completed her mobility papers and worked with the Virginia Synod to prepare what she needs to do to return to the "Active" roster. She could begin interviewing with churches and accept a call if such a church extended it. If Katie were to accept a call to another congregation, Holy Cross would suffer a significant loss for the leadership of Sunday School, Milestone Ministries, and Early Childhood Ministry Chapel.

There is possibly an opportunity for Holy Cross to discern a call for an associate pastor, allowing Deaconess Katie to return to the "Active" roster and continue to partner with Holy Cross as a pastor. I have discussed this possibility with Katie, the staff support team, the church council, individuals who have worked closely with her, and Pastor Bob, asking for their thoughts. While it is an opportunity to be explored and discerned, it is the power of the congregation to vote to extend a call to a pastor. The leadership of Holy Cross Lutheran Church is in the beginning stages of discerning the possibilities to know if this is what God is calling us to do. As more develops, we hope the events benefit the Kingdom, Deaconess Katie, Holy Cross, and the larger church for ministry.

Holy Cross has called associate pastors in the past, allowing the senior pastor more time to focus on ministry opportunities, leading to more significant opportunities to share the Gospel of Jesus Christ. An associate pastor can preach and preside at worship, offer pastoral care to individuals, and lead other areas of ministry. As a pastor, Deaconess Katie could also be a pastor to the care and growth of families with young children, not just of our congregation but also as a resource for our daycare and preschool families in collaboration with Sam Cooper-Tuttle, Director of CrossWays Preschool and Celebration! Childcare.

Steve Oelschlager and Beth Ann Koenemann continue to partner in ministry through their gifts of administration and management of our finances, human resources, facilities, and IT needs and through their heart and passion for ministry. It is sometimes difficult to recognize where the roles of individuals as church staff and members (partners in ministry) begin and end. I am grateful for the passion and commitment of Steve and Beth Ann as they perform their roles with the care of a ministry partner and lead as ministry partners with the staff's dedication. In 2024, Steve will take on less time as a staff member and become a finance, facilities, and IT consultant. Beth Ann will take on more Finance and HR responsibilities as he transitions.

No changes in our organization affect just one individual. Any change for one is likely to impact the role of many. Our Administrative Coordinator, Administrator of Congregational Activities, and Administrator of Congregational Communications are most aware of this. I am grateful and humbled by the grace and persistence of Sarah Accettura, Janet Carr, and Ellie Rautenbach for their continued professionalism and care to meet the needs of the staff, the congregation, and the community we serve through the ministry of Holy Cross.

One of my responsibilities as Senior Pastor is to discern and share direction and vision for the congregation. I have laid out part of that vision in the paragraphs above related to the staff and my hopes for the partnership we will share in the coming year and beyond. Our ministry for the Kingdom goes well beyond the work of our staff. The ministry of those who gather at Holy Cross involves every member or PARTNERS IN MINISTRY. The church's ministry is for people of faith to gather and then be sent to the world week after week to share the good news of the Gospel of Jesus Christ. We gather to be strengthened and sent out again to INVITE more to gather in Christ's name. As we gather, we NURTURE one another by caring for our needs. Having been nurtured, we can then EQUIP one another to share the gift of God's love through the unique skills, talents, and gifts God has given each of us. Equipped, we go out to SERVE all people and creation using these gifts to share the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

This past year, I wrote five articles for The Cross Connection that focused on growing faith in four movements: INVITE, NURTURE, EQUIP, and SERVE. In his ministry, Jesus modeled this pattern with his disciples. He INVITES them to follow. Then, they are NURTURED and cared for by him. Next, Jesus begins to EQUIP them for ministry. Finally, Jesus sends the disciples out to SERVE others, and the cycle starts again when they INVITE others to follow Jesus.

These four movements have continued across the centuries and are still at work in the church today. We continue to gather as Holy Cross Lutheran Church because the saints before us participated in these actions. You are a follower of Jesus because you are INVITED, NURTURED by others, EQUIPPED by parents, friends, teachers, and pastors to learn what it means to be the church, and then SERVE to invite, nurture, and equip others to serve as well.

In 2024, Holy Cross will focus on putting energy into EQUIP us for ministry to others. My goal for myself is to seek leadership coaching intentionally and to collaborate with other leaders to grow in my ability to equip the STAFF and the leaders of Holy Cross to partner together in ministry so they, in turn, can provide you with what is necessary to grow in your ability to INVITE, NURTURE, EQUIP, and SERVE.

As I speak with staff, volunteer leaders, and members we ask to serve, many are serving or would like to serve but feel they need to be better taught to do what we ask. By intentionally investing time and resources and being relational, we will support and empower one another to answer the invitation God extends to all to participate in the continuing event of creation! I hope to equip you with the skills and knowledge you need to participate in the church's work. I sense many of you are waiting to act.

Pieces of the vision have been falling into place. At the end of 2024, I hope each of you has a sense and realization of being invited to participate, nurtured by a loving community, better equipped for ministry, and serving in ways leading to abundant life in Christ Jesus.

2023... A Year of Transitions

It has been a few years ago, but I still remember when a group of us from the campus ministry at University of Iowa decided to do a canoe trip into the Boundary Waters in upper Minnesota. We decided to go after finals and before we dispersed to head to our summer destinations. It was the first time for many of the group and I think it is accurate to confess that we didn't know entirely what to expect. We were to be out for six days and preparations had been made. For those of you who might be unfamiliar with the Boundary Waters park, it is a series of lakes and river systems. There are specific camp sites to minimize the impact on the environment and limits to the size of the group and how many people can be in the Boundary Waters at any given time. The lakes are connected by a series of portages that are not always clearly marked. These trails provide access for you to take a route that will bring you back to your original starting point. Some of the portages are easy and others are extremely demanding. Either way, after a while, the aluminum canoes get heavier and so does all the gear that you packed and thought was so essential once upon a time.

We were two days in and had a very difficult portage that took the collective will of the group to complete. People were tired and people were complaining and whining. The outfitter provided us with two guides. At the highlight of the complaining, one of guides asked this question: **When I snap a picture, does the film weigh more because there's an image on it?**

It seemed like a silly question! What a nonsensical notion! I must admit, there were no digital cameras or even mobile phones for that matter at this time. After the guide asked this question we started in what seemed like a meaningless exchange of ideas. We realized later that the question served a deeper purpose. It inspired conversations and reactions, and therefore caused us to stow away our own perceived troubles for a few moments and move beyond our weariness and finish the day's journey.

Of course film stock or for that matter a memory card won't weigh more after capturing scenes of lakes and friends grinning around a campfire. Or... would it?

Which leads me to wonder... How much do words weigh? How much do memories weigh? Can an anguished memory weigh you down, a tender memory lift you up? Does the depiction of a sublime sunrise expand a soul while the snapshot of a burned forest shrinks the heart? Pictures and memories. Some are overloaded luggage dragging you down, others lighter than feathers. And what about the very words spoken or written to convey our experience? Do they add or subtract weight? I believe that our words matter... our behavior matters... our beliefs matter... and, in whom we place our trust matters.

We have shared many words and many moments together during the past 32 years. We have more to share as we move into the future.

Holy Cross gifted me with a three month sabbatical leave (March – May 2023). It was a time to reflect and refresh. It was also a time for study and reading. If you have interest please refer to the attached addendum highlighting some of my discoveries and thoughts.

During 2023 I participated in some major transitions. I transitioned from the role as Senior Pastor (1991-2022) to Co-Senior Pastor (2022-2023) and, to Pastor Emeritus (June 2023 to present). Rev. Chris Neptun was called as Holy Cross' Senior Pastor following an intentional transition strategy that was stewarded by Holy Cross' Church Council beginning in 2019 and culminating in a congregational meeting to extend a letter of call to Pastor Neptun in April 2022. Pastor Chris has been extremely gracious throughout this journey and he is both a valued colleague and a wonderful friend. His leadership and gifts will continue to serve Holy Cross into the future.

My new position as Pastor Emeritus has afforded Nancy and me some wonderful opportunities. We are able to continue to call Holy Cross our spiritual home and enjoy our treasured relationships with the people at Holy Cross. I continue to preach, teach, provide pastoral care and participate in pastoral acts, e.g., Baptisms, Weddings & Funerals. I average 15-20 hours a week and am able to provide leadership for special initiatives.

I count my blessings and am grateful for the opportunity to continue the ministry partnership with Holy Cross. I celebrated in 2023 my 43rd year of ordained ministry and my 40th wedding anniversary with Nancy. She has accompanied me throughout my years of service to three congregations and has been a true partner in the ministry we have shared with all of you.

I look forward to what the future will provide in the years to come and continue to put my trust in God's unconditional love and grace.

Addendum: Rev. Davis' Sabbatical Leave

I saw the news release in 2022 from the Episcopal Church that stated: "Most Americans see Jesus as an important spiritual figure. More than 30% of Americans have decreased their participation in religious activities during the COVID-19 pandemic." Those are some of the findings of a national study commissioned by The Episcopal Church and conducted by the polling firm IPSOS. The results of the "Jesus in America" study, highlights the wide-ranging faith perspectives of a diverse cross section of Americans, including those who identify as nonreligious. The study points to both the popularity of Jesus' teachings and the ways Christians are often perceived as failing to live up to those teachings.

The study piqued my curiosity. I wanted to learn more and initiated some conversations with individuals who provided leadership for the commissioned study. After those initial conversations it was suggested that I do some additional reading about the shift that has taken place in our culture and how it impacts our life together in community. I was particularly interested in how this shift impacts organized religion in general and more specifically how it is redefining congregational life in the 21st century. This shift is identified by some as the movement from an "age of authenticity" to an "age of association". This concept is associated with the sociologist and cultural critic Charles Taylor. Charles Taylor is a Canadian philosopher and social theorist who has written extensively on issues related to modernity, secularism, and the nature of contemporary societies.

In his book "The Ethics of Authenticity," Charles Taylor explores the cultural shifts that have led to what he terms the "ethic of authenticity." He discusses how modern Western societies have moved away from traditional frameworks and have increasingly emphasized individual self-expression and the pursuit of authentic personal identity. While the specific terms such as an "age of authenticity" and an "age of association" may not be explicitly coined by Taylor, his work has been influential in shaping discussions about these concepts, particularly in understanding the dynamics of identity, individualism, and community in contemporary societies.

The term "**Age of Association**" refers to a time in history or a societal phase where people primarily identified with or associated themselves with certain groups, ideologies, or cultural movements. It may suggest an era characterized by strong collective identities and group affiliations.

The term "**Age of Authenticity**" implies a cultural or societal shift towards valuing individualism, self-expression, and genuine personal experiences. In such an age, people might prioritize being true to themselves rather than conforming to external expectations

I believe that within the context of organized religion, the concepts of the "age of association" and the "age of authenticity" can help us to understand the changing attitudes and dynamics within religious communities and assist us in positioning congregations to be more relevant.

For example, in an "age of association" within organized religion, people may be more likely to identify strongly with a religious group or community. The emphasis would be on collective beliefs, rituals, and shared practices. Individuals may find a sense of belonging and identity within the larger religious organization or community. Loyalty to established religious institutions and adherence to traditional doctrines might be more pronounced during such times.

In an "age of authenticity" within organized religion, there might be a shift towards a more individualistic approach. People may seek a personal and authentic connection with their faith, focusing on their own spiritual journey rather than conforming strictly to institutional norms. This could manifest in a more personalized interpretation of religious teachings, diverse spiritual practices, and a questioning of traditional authority within religious institutions.

The tension between the age of association and the age of authenticity in organized religion can lead to various dynamics, including debates over doctrinal interpretation, the role of institutional authority, and the balance between communal and individual expressions of faith.

The concept of the "age of authenticity" has significant implications for organized religion in the 21st century, influencing the ways in which individuals engage with their faith, religious institutions, and spiritual practices. Here are some key considerations:

Individualism and Personalization: In the age of authenticity, there is an increased emphasis on individualism and personal experience. People may seek a more personalized and authentic connection with their faith, moving away from rigid, traditional structures. This can manifest in diverse interpretations of religious teachings, eclectic spiritual practices, and a focus on subjective experiences of the divine.

Questioning Authority: Individuals in the 21st century, influenced by the age of authenticity, may be more inclined to question traditional religious authority. The hierarchical structures of many religious institutions may be challenged, and there may be a desire for a more egalitarian and participatory approach to religious practices and decision-making.

Diversity of Beliefs and Practices: The age of authenticity contributes to a diverse religious landscape, with individuals choosing beliefs and practices that resonate personally. This diversity may extend beyond denominational boundaries, leading to a more pluralistic understanding of spirituality. It can also give rise to the blending of religious traditions or the exploration of alternative spiritual paths.

Technology and Global Connectivity: The 21st century's technological advancements and global connectivity play a role in the age of authenticity within organized religion. Access to information allows individuals to explore various religious perspectives, engage in online spiritual communities, and access alternative sources of religious knowledge, contributing to a more individualized approach to faith.

Challenges for Traditional Institutions: Established religious institutions may face challenges in adapting to the age of authenticity. The demand for more inclusive, flexible, and personally relevant religious experiences may challenge traditional structures and prompt a reevaluation of how religious communities engage with their members.

Spiritual Seeking Outside Institutional Boundaries: The age of authenticity often involves spiritual seeking beyond the confines of organized religion. Many individuals explore spirituality independently, drawing from a variety of sources, including mindfulness practices, Eastern philosophies, and eclectic spiritual traditions, rather than exclusively aligning with a specific religious tradition.

Impact on Community Dynamics: While the age of authenticity emphasizes individual experiences, it also raises questions about the role of community in religious life. Balancing the pursuit of individual authenticity with the desire for communal connection remains a challenge for religious communities adapting to these changing dynamics.

In summary, the age of authenticity shapes how individuals approach and engage with organized religion in the 21st century, impacting the authority structures, practices, and overall dynamics within religious communities. This trend reflects broader societal shifts towards individualism, personal autonomy, and the quest for authentic spiritual experiences.

The goal of the 'Jesus in America' research project was to identify the most compelling themes and narratives about Americans' attitudes and perceptions of who Jesus is, his enduring importance and impact on society, how recent events have shaped how people pursue and find spiritual and religious fulfillment, and how Christians are currently perceived by non-Christians. The study examined common perceptions of Christianity and Christians in the United States and the disparities between what religion says and how we act. One of the more significant questions of the study asked respondents: What they thought was Jesus' most important teaching. More than a third said "love your neighbor." Perhaps the only thing left to do is to compose a life where we live into Jesus' teaching.

Director of Early Faith Formation Ministries Deaconess Katie Freund

This has been a fruitful year. Our staff has been living into the long anticipated "path forward" and there has been a lot of good work done. Since I was first brought into the Holy Cross family we've known that our community was at the threshold of transition. With a church as large and active as ours, we're going to keep growing and changing for years to come.

For me specifically, this has been a year of professional development and long term planning. Some of you might recall I came to Holy Cross straight from years of rural ministry where limited resources demand creativity and nearly all responsibilities are fielded by the pastor alone. This year my work habits have shifted away from "one person show" to bringing in, equipping, and supporting others in the work of the community. That's no small task; but navigating this change in work style has honestly been a (hard-worked for) pleasure. Both our Senior Pastor and Pastor Emeritus have been supportive, but I want to specifically lift up one of our congregation members, Val Maxwell, for volunteering to coach me in project management. Without a doubt the richest resource we have as a church is the high caliber of skills our people bring to the table. Val is a perfect example of this. Working together we were able to bring some much needed structure to our Sunday School program. Looking ahead, the skills she has (and still does) teach and model for me are ones that will continue to transform what I can offer when serving our community.

Some of the sacred work done this year has been independent of any "big" programming, such as cleaning up and reinstating the church's Bible cart (did you know we had one of those?). Another large project was developing our approach to hospitality for families in worship; this includes putting together busy bags, setting up the new prayer ground, and evaluating what families need to feel supported and comfortable on Sunday morning. Some of you may have heard me talk about this by using the phrase "spectrum of hospitality", assuming that this is not a single universal approach that will work for all families. Additionally, we continue to grow our children's library to be utilized by families from Holy Cross and our Early Childhood Ministry program alike. This year there have been multiple children in our daycare program who have experienced the death of family members, and having resources like children's books on grief is invaluable.

This past year has also gifted me the joy of preaching for the congregation as well as attending the annual meeting for the Lutheran Deaconess Association in Valparaiso, IN. Both reminding me why I felt the call to ministry in the first place.

Director of Youth and Family Ministry Edwin Andrade

Can you believe it has only been several months since we have been at Holy Cross? Colleen and I packed up and gathered our stuff and moved cross country and headed out for Chicagoland. I suppose I could say all roads led to Holy Cross, right? At any rate, it has been a wild, challenging, and joyful season. When people ask me how it has been so far, my answer is: all of the above. And I can't wait to see what God has in store this upcoming year.

Change is coming to Crossroads. The high school student Nurture Events will shift from Sunday evening to Sunday morning. We will meet following our Sunday worship service. The reason behind the time change is to encourage families, both parents and students to attend worship together. Having a space for different age groups on Sunday can cut through the idea of 'separateness' and create an intergenerational space for worship and faith formation on Sunday morning.

Crossroads, along with our eighth graders from Emerge are raising funds to attend the 2024 ELCA National Youth gathering this summer in New Orleans. For our first fundraiser, we offered gift wrapping at The Cookie Walk and the following Sunday during service. We were able to raise over \$500 and we're hoping to raise more with some additional upcoming fundraising ideas. I am grateful for Nikki Spencer's and Becky Sawle's support during our fundraiser and for helping me plan for our summer trip.

We were able to partner with the students from First Presbyterian Church of Libertyville, and we went Christmas Caroling. One of my hopes as we continue to grow and develop the program is to collaborate with other churches in our local community. I believe a sign of a healthy church is not only a church that serves but also a church that partners with others. As I am building relationships with other youth leaders, I am encouraged and inspired by their respective ministries. I can't wait to see how God will work through our relationships with others to better equip and serve our students.

This last year during confirmation, we had one of the larger groups in recent memory. Pastor Chris, Deaconess Katie and I will be back at it this February. Each of us we be leading two classes. One of my hopes for our students being confirmed is for them to become more involved in the life of our community. Be it youth group, Sunday morning, or other ministries at Holy Cross. As I highlighted on Reformation Sunday, faith isn't an individual pursuit. Our faith grows best in community. Confirmation is one of the first steps on the journey and not a means to an end.

Several moments stood out for me these last few months. The first highlight was the confirmation classes in the fall. Although the classes were hectic at times (i.e., dodgeball), it was a privilege to be able to teach and learn alongside Pastor Chris and Deaconess Katie. In one of the classes, we covered a variety of creeds concerning our faith. I asked the students to write and share some of their beliefs. One of the students shared that they believed in miracles, at first some of

the other students chuckled, but I asked them to say more about their belief in miracles. They shared that had witnessed God intervening and transforming lives. When things seemed hopeless, God turned it around.

I have also enjoyed the meaningful discussions we have shared at our Nurture Events for Emerge and Crossroads. Youth ministry isn't glorified babysitting. It must be more than just entertainment. As I listened and learned from our students, one of the things that impressed me was their desire for something meaningful. One of the questions I am holding is: 'What is youth ministry for?' I found the answer to be joy, not fun. Joy is the bass note. Joy is the meaning behind our students' questions and curiosity. Fun comes and goes, but joy sustains. As our students ask questions and wrestle with their identities, joy will see us through and lead to an encounter with God.

Another highlight for me was having the opportunity to meet and know the parents of our students. It has been a privilege to listen to them share their vision for their children and personal stories. One of the things that sometimes gets lost in youth ministry is that relationship-building happens not only with the students but also with their parents. Faith formation happens in the church and the home. When families can grow together, a community is transformed. I am grateful to have had the opportunity to build a solid foundation as we move forward into this new season at Holy Cross.

Finance, Facilities, and IT Consultant Steve Oelschlager

One of my highlights in 2023 was working with Council President Andy Eidson. Andy and I would meet over Zoom every other Wednesday to talk through the various projects, opportunities, and challenges that I was either working on or tuned into in one way or another. Andy brought his years of experience in the corporate world around leadership and project management to help me gain clarity around solutions, paths forward, and priorities. It was a brilliant concept that Andy initiated and invested in, not just with me but also separately with Pastor Chris. As I experienced it, I realized every congregation would benefit immensely from having this kind of partnership between staff and elected leaders.

This past fall, Andy and I met at Grainger headquarters, where Andy has worked for over 20 years, for me to experience as a case study how Grainger systematically prepares itself for relevancy in the marketplace. There are all sorts of "organizational technologies" that help companies and non-profits thrive as they bring people together as teammates to focus on initiatives and goals. I don't believe that churches are businesses, but they share many things in common, and it is fascinating to me what churches might learn and coopt from ethical and impactful business practices.

As Andy prepares to step back from being president of this congregation, I want to thank him for his servant leadership and for being a model of better ways to lead. I know Andy has invested tons of his time into Holy Cross while he has been president for the last two years, and we are indeed very fortunate to have received his generous gift. Please make sure to thank him!

I also want to thank and call out our talented and committed office staff: Pastor Chris, Pastor Bob, Deaconess Katie, Edwin, Dale, Beth Ann, Sarah, Janet, Ellie, Samantha, Roxanne, Tania, Manny, Carmen, Abel, Paul, Darrin, and Carrie. Please see the reports from these colleagues in this annual report that cover their incredible work, from communications to managing our Early Childhood Ministry, our faith formation, video, and pastoral and music ministries.

People and relationships are central to what I referred to above as organizational technology and are how we do what we do at the magnitude we do it. So, without naming everyone, we are exceedingly grateful for all of you, for who you are, and for your contributions to the whole. Thank you, thank you!

Financial Items of Interest

- In 2023, Ryan Young stepped into the role of financial secretary, getting up to speed on what that entails. Thank you to Ryan for learning and handling those critical tasks. Thanks to Beth Ann Koenemann for taking care of our bookkeeping, payroll, and HR needs, among many other things, and her attention to detail, and Tom Miller for stepping in during the last quarter to tie up the year, including preparing the financial statements in this annual report. And, thanks to our audit team of Chuck Boucek, Nancy Ryan, and Tim Skelton for their work reviewing our records and processes.
- In June, Holy Cross was fortunate to renew our mortgage with Thrivent Financial and keep our interest rate of 4.25% intact for another ten years. We were negotiating with Thrivent and the ELCA Mission Investment Fund and were breathtakingly surprised at the result. Holy Cross pays \$26K monthly on an outstanding balance of about \$3.4 million.
- Holy Cross agreed to partner with *Freewill.com* this past year as we expand our options to receive donations. If you visit our online giving page *at HolyCrossChurch.org/giving*, you will see new options for gifts of stock and appreciated assets, donor-advised funds, IRAs, and legacy gifts, including estate planning and wills. I encourage you to consider extending your life's impact beyond the years you are alive. Please put in place a plan that takes care of your family's needs and lifts up the causes that have been important to you during your life. I know at least five households that named the ministries of Holy Cross in their estate plans. You probably also noticed that we redesigned the giving cards we use during the offering to refer to all the ways we can give now. Thanks to Ellie Rautenbach and her creative flair and design skills on our new giving cards.

Property Items of Interest

- Our buildings are a tremendous asset but require continual care and upkeep. I'm grateful for Carmen and Abel Cervantes, who work incredibly hard and lovingly care for our buildings as custodians. I'm also thankful for Manny Rivera and his broad expertise as he fixes various problems that emerge weekly. And thanks to all of you who participate in all the different building and property-related chores.
- Part of our fire-safety system is a network of pipes in the attic that can spray water should there ever be a fire. Because the attic space is not temperature-controlled, these pipes cannot contain standing water, or they would freeze. Instead, they hold pressurized air that is quickly replaced by water should there be a sudden pressure drop, like what would happen if a sprinkler head melted due to a fire. All this to say that the network of "dry" pipes has not been holding the compressed air due to leaks. In 2023, we substantially invested in replacing problematic pipes and adding a nitrogen generator to replace compressed air with compressed nitrogen to stop pipe decay and extend our pipes' life.
- With the expansion of our staff, we reconfigured the office to eliminate clutter and expand the number of workspaces. The key was taking one of our larger offices and making it a place with three desks instead of one. We did this without building new walls or doing construction work. We also hauled many banker boxes of old financial records to the shredder as part of our decluttering. We also added windows to the inner office doors to cultivate safe spaces.
- You probably noticed the loft we used during early COVID for parking lot worship is no longer standing. Thanks to the demolition crew who came together in the fall to take down and move those materials over by the fire pit on the south end of our property for future use.
- There are a variety of other building improvements that you might have noticed, including new vanities with auto-sensing faucets and soap dispensers in the main bathrooms, new coat racks in the southwest corner of the Fellowship Area, two new A/C condenser units for our Crossways Preschool area, parking lot banners, painting, etc. We are fortunate to have a capital replacement fund and a building fund to pay for this vital work. Thank you for your gifts!
- In 2024, we are looking to replace much of the lighting infrastructure in the sanctuary due to aging hardware that is becoming impossible to fix. Watch for more details, or contact me if you are interested in learning more.

Other Items of Interest

- Holy Cross is blessed to have CrossWays Preschool and Celebration! Childcare as part of our ministry as it brings energy and vibrancy to our congregation. I'm grateful to the visionaries in our congregation who, years ago, put the plan in place to create these ministries from scratch out of nothing. Many people have invested significantly in these ministries over the years to take them to where they are today. We are also fortunate to have Samantha Cooper-Tuttle and her leadership team of Roxanne Lamont and Tania Zombolo to lovingly lead that ministry on behalf of Holy Cross.
- In 2023, we worked on refreshing the Early Childhood Ministry bylaws concerning governance. As you might imagine, many things have changed since the early days, including more internal staff resources to assist with planning and decision-making. The new structure calls for three groups:
 - A parent group for parent/teacher relations
 - A staff governance group for operational decisions
 - A strategic group for big-picture strategy, visioning, and marketing work

Council approved the changes, and we started implementing them in the fall. Thanks to Sam Cooper-Tuttle, Matthew Sargent, Val Maxwell, Carly Thornberry, Judy Frank-Gonwa, Beth Ann Koenemann, Andy Eidson, and Pastor Chris for working through these changes.

Lastly, I wanted to share that beginning in 2024, I am scaling back my role at Holy Cross to work less and create more time for healthier rhythms. I will continue managing finance, facilities, and IT issues as a part-time consultant while that makes sense for Holy Cross and myself. I look forward to continued involvement in our remarkable congregation and all the valued relationships I have with all of you. Thank you for the opportunities you have and continue to provide me to serve at Holy Cross.

Director of Early Childhood Ministry (ECM) Samantha Cooper-Tuttle

CrossWays Preschool and Celebration! Childcare had an incredible year full of support, kindness, learning and growing. We started the year off right with healthy students and staff, decent winter weather, and blessings of a Happy New Year. We continued the good feelings into February by celebrating Love and Friendship. For the first Dine and Donate event of the year, we partnered with Rocky Mountain Chocolate Factory for a sweet treat just in time for Valentine's Day. The event was a success, raising over \$300 for the ECM programs. I attribute our success to the adorable commercial Dale Tippet created with the help of Carly Thornberry and her family! We continued to have two additional Dine and Donate events, one with Suzy Swirl and the other most recently with Cards for A Cause. While Suzy Swirl was less successful, bringing in \$162, Cards for A Cause was a HUGE success. With purchases from our families and the congregation, we raised over \$600!

In addition to Dine and Donates, we held our largest fundraiser in October. Fallin' Into Fun 2023 was an amazing testament to our staff, families, and the community. We had over 200 guests during the event who ate, shopped, played, and socialized. Guests of all ages enjoyed what we had to offer, from the silent auction to the puppet show. Due to the support and contributions of everyone who attended, we raised over \$2,000 for ECM. As we advertised, the proceeds from the fundraisers, including WISHES, will go towards building an outdoor Infant/Toddler play space this spring. Located in the old Garden, we will be fencing in the area to provide our younger students with a sensory-enriched environment where they can play safely with materials and equipment suitable for their age group. We cannot thank enough those who helped make this dream a reality. This new addition will be the perfect area for our littles to improve their relationship with the natural environment.

The staff of CrossWays Preschool and Celebration! Childcare has our unending gratitude for their dedication and commitment to our students and families. Day in and day out, our staff shows up, ready to help our students grow and learn. Watching personalities develop, new skills emerge, and seeing the moment when a learning lesson clicks is inspirational. Our staff works tirelessly to find ways to help each student thrive within the classroom. Whether that is teaching a child their alphabet or finding the best method of potty training, our staff goes above and beyond for the students in our programs.

During the summer, we had the opportunity to educate our students about bunnies in a live action, hands-on environment. A mother bunny decided to make her nest right on our playground! We discovered the baby bunnies hiding out under one of the climbing walls. Instead of moving the bunnies, we took the opportunity to fence off the area, and allowed the students to visually interact with the bunnies within their space. The children were thrilled to see the bunnies each time they went out on the playground. The experience opened their minds and expanded their curiosity. Our staff spent time with their students talking about bunnies: what they eat, where they sleep, where they go when they leave... continuous questions asked and answered because of a special learning moment such as this one. Our staff supported this week-long adventure to give our students an educational experience they won't soon forget.

The impact we have on our community is one of the many reasons I find value in what we do. Walking in the Libertyville Parade and setting up a table at the Farmer's Market not only keeps us current and seen, but gives us the chance to interact with families; both from the present and the past. Communications

The Cross Connection Newsletter

Our monthly newsletter is an integral part of Holy Cross communications. It includes letters from the pastors, staff and group leaders, early childhood and youth ministry details, and news beyond the congregation informing the congregation and larger community of upcoming events, activities, and opportunities to connect with others here at Holy Cross. All aspects of curating content, layout and design, printing, and the mail prep process occurs in-house by the office team. Once mailed, the newsletter reaches almost 1,000 households and partner organizations via U.S. mail. Our mailing addressing service continues to provide a mailing list that verifies each address and provides a bar code unique to each destination. This process helps keep our mailing list accurate and up-to-date, and it also eliminates a step at the post office in order for newsletters to reach homes more quickly. Staying Connected Email

In addition to *The Cross Connection* newsletter mailing, an abbreviated version is sent electronically via Constant Contact at the beginning of every month. This email serves as an overview at a glance and a quick reminder of upcoming events. For convenience, it contains direct links to additional information on our websites and access to signups, if requested. We also utilize this email list to notify the congregation of changes or updates to scheduled events or memorial information.

Websites

The Holy Cross Lutheran Church website, *HolyCrossChurch.org* connects our members and the community to up to date information about our church and various events, activities, and opportunities. All aspects of the website's design, production, updates and maintenance are completed in-house.

We continue offering livestream worship services on most Sundays at 8 and 10 am. Livestream worship includes all of the music, scripture readings, a sermon message, hymns and announcements as the in-person worship experience offers with the added benefit of the ability to tune in from anywhere in the world with an internet connection. Livestream worship services at 10 am on Sundays are archived and made available to view on demand within 24 hours. On average, about 150 users per week tune in to livestream or watch an archived worship video. View livestream services and videos on our website at *HolyCrossChurch.org/sermons*

CrossWays Preschool and Celebration! Childcare have their own individual websites at *cpreschool.org* and *cchildcare.org* respectively. CrossWays Preschool and Celebration! Childcare follow the same curriculum but one consists of a half day preschool and the other a full day preschool. Prospective families can view information about each school and what they have to offer and even take a virtual tour of each entity! The integration of Brightwheel management software to the websites of CrossWays Preschool and Celebration! Childcare continues to be a success.

Church Community Builder (CCB) is utilized as Holy Cross' member management system. Users can register or sign in to their accounts from the Holy Cross home page navigational menu. This management system allows us to more effectively target communication, maintain group participation records, create and schedule worship volunteer opportunities and affords each user the ability to connect easily with others. Church Council meets monthly supporting our Congregation, Clergy, Staff and "Who We Are" document (see page 5).

I encourage you to read this Annual Report and reflect on impacts we make individually and as a congregation. Please consider how Holy Cross can help "Compose a Christian way of life" for you and your families.

I will dedicate a major portion of this report to recapping our 4-year pastoral transition process named A Path Forward. Following is a thorough, but incomplete list of our Path Forward milestones:

2020

Pastor Bob announced his request to transition from a full time Senior Pastor to a part-time pastoral role.

Council supported and involved Chicago Metro Synod in planning a "non-traditional" transition.

Staff Support and Pastor Bob developed a process for the transition named "A Path Forward".

2021

Congregation focus groups and a survey were conducted.

Sr. Pastor Executive Search was conducted.

Four candidates were presented to the Call Committee and participated in an all-day interviews.

2022

Call Committee conducted second interviews.

Call Committee made selection, created compensation package, and presented to Council.

Council conducted a special session, met candidate, debriefed, and voted to accept recommendations.

Special Congregation meeting held (outside in the rain), met quorum, and voted to approve selection.

Pastor Chris Neptun began co-Sr. Pastor duties on June 1, 2022.

Transition Team Committee formed to support Pastors, staff and the congregation.

Installation Service held on October 9, 2022 – Bishop Curry presided.

2023

Pastor Bob left for sabbatical (March 1).

Pastor Chris Neptun assumed sole Sr. Pastor duties (March 1).

Pastor Bob returned from sabbatical as Pastor Emeritus, assuming a part time role (June 1).

We thank the members of the Transition Team for their service: Jen Christensen (Chair), Jeannine Phillips, Dave Klein, Sarah Accettura, Susan Beck, Sarah Grayer, Tim Jackson-Skelton, and Gary Johnston.

We are updating our constitution to align with the Synod model. A final congregation ratification vote will be taken during the Annual Meeting 1/28/24. Many thanks to Harold Sargent, Terry Berger and Eric Christensen for leading this effort. Visit our website at *HolyCrossChurch.org/constitution* for details on content and process.

Auditors Report

The Holy Cross Audit Committee completed its independent internal audit for the financial year 2022. The audit scope included a review of the congregation's revenue and expenditure processes and related financial controls, as well as an examination of deposits, donations, giving statements, expenses, payroll, general ledger records and more. The Audit Committee concluded that appropriate controls governing the financial operations process appear to be in place and operating as intended, and that the 2022 books and records of the congregation appear to be materially accurate in all respects. In addition, Holy Cross' financial systems and platforms were found to be modern and transparent. The Audit Committee is grateful for the work of Tom Miller and Beth Ann Koenemann for their attention to detail and professionalism on behalf of our congregation.

The 2023 statements found in this annual report are unaudited. Holy Cross will conduct its audit program and review its 2023 financial statements during the first half of 2024. An audit report will be available to the church council and the congregation by July 1 with the results of that activity.

Mission Endowment

In 2000, Holy Cross created the Mission Endowment Fund, seeded by a gift from the Paul and Irene Bruggemeier Family. This fund supports ministries beyond the operating budget of the congregation. An initial gift of \$75,000 established the Endowment. Additional donations from Holy Cross members have been added since 2000 and designated to scholarships. These funds are invested with the ELCA Foundation Pooled Trust, with the earnings being distributed each year in the following categories:

College Scholarship support for congregation members The Holy Cross Music Ministry Ministry opportunities beyond the congregation Discretionary Needs determined by the Pastors

The concept of this fund is to preserve the original amount, only distributing the dividends each year. Our Mission Endowment Funds are invested with the ELCA Mission Investment Fund (MIF). These investments are utilized across the ELCA to assist in areas of new mission development. Holy Cross benefited from such investments when it was first organized in 1979.

With the distributions this year, we have distributed cumulatively since the inception of the endowment fund the following amounts:

In 2023, the Holy Cross Mission Endowment fund earned \$3,369 in dividends.

In accordance with the Fund #1's guidelines, one third of the dividends (\$1,123) supplemented by additional gifts of \$1,177 (for a total of \$2,300), were awarded in scholarships to the following recipients:

One third of the earnings (\$1,123) were distributed to the Holy Cross Music Ministry.

Two thirds of the remaining third of the fund's earnings (\$749) were distributed to ministries beyond the congregation, and the remaining portion of the earnings (\$374) were distributed for Pastor's Discretionary needs.

A second fund has been established with a generous gift from Brad and Lana Meyer to benefit housing ministries. To date, \$70,150 has been donated.

Principal has been preserved for both funds making a combined market value with the ELCA Mission Investment Fund, as of November 30, 2023, of \$164,214. Including recent gifts not yet invested with MIF, the end of year balance for 2023 is \$164,214.

Staff Support

Staff Support is one of four committees mandated by Holy Cross Lutheran Church's constitution. Duties of the committee are to "develop job descriptions and compensation proposals for any persons employed by the congregation for Congregation Council approval" and to "perform other duties as the Congregation Council may direct". This committee initiated the pastoral transition process, A Path Forward, more than three years ago and has continued this involvement throughout 2023. Members of Staff Support in 2023 were Eric and Jenifer Christensen, Andy Eidson, Mark Fedyk, Katie Ormson, Mark Remissong, and Harold Sargent.

I want to thank Katie Ormson for her service, as she resigned during the year.

The committee was active throughout the year. Highlights include:

- 1) Supporting Ralph Freye, who led creating and filling the Choir Director position. Thank you, Ralph! Darrin Rose started August 20—Welcome Darrin.
- 2) Supporting and guiding the process to fill the Directory of Youth and Family Ministries position. Thank you Amanda Komaschka for co-Charing the recruiting team with Pastor Chris. Welcome to Edwin Andrade who started September 1.
- 3) Supporting the Senior Pastor Transition Team as an advisory council supporting Pastor Bob, Pastor Chris, Deaconess Katie and the Congregation. Members of that team were Jen Christensen (Chair), Jeannine Phillips, Dave Klein, Sarah Accettura, Susan Beck, Sarah Grayer, Tim Jackson-Skelton, and Gary Johnston.
- 4) We paused and are restarting the Innovation Team approach in January 2024. We intend to review meeting ministry needs in perhaps nontraditional ways that better match lifestyles of our members.

Transition Committee

Church Community Builder Software

Holy Cross regularly connects to more than 3,500 people through physical mail, email, texting, and phone calls. We do this to keep members, friends, and guests aware of worship services, faith formation opportunities, small groups, and ministries to serve those beyond our congregation. Between phone numbers, email and home addresses, family members, donations, and your tastes and preferences, we try to keep track of tens of thousands of data bits, no easy task by any means.

Since June 2020, we have been using a church management system called Church Community Builder (CCB) with this challenge in mind. Accessible through the internet and the Holy Cross website, we hope you might help us keep current on what we need to know about you to serve you best. Using CCB and setting up an account is not a requirement, only an invitation for a better link between Holy Cross and you and your family.

You can request an account to CCB at any time by going to the Holy Cross website at *HolyCrossChurch.org* and clicking on the "Sign In" link at the top right corner. When the login window appears, click the "Request Account" link in the screen's left-middle. You will receive an email from the Holy Cross office, usually within one business day, with additional instructions.

Holy Cross Smartphone App

In early 2021, we launched a new Holy Cross smartphone app (Android and iPhone) that integrates with CCB. The app provides many conveniences and efficiencies, from the latest worship videos, access to the church calendar and upcoming events, information about your Holy Cross groups, links to Church Community Builder, online giving, and more.

Adult Ministry Reports

Adult Education: Senior Living Lunch and Learn

In June, Pastor Chris was joined by Vicky Nicholson, Certified Senior Advisor, for a program on how seniors and their families can receive the support they need most to help seniors' quality of life.

Adult Faith Formation: Sunday Morning Visual Faith Process

This conversational model led by Pastor Bob and Pastor Chris begun in September 2022 continued through April 2023 on Sunday mornings weekly between the worship services for post confirmation age people of faith. The Visual Faith Process utilized Scripture as the basis for topic-explorations to generate natural, vigorous conversations about what it means to follow Jesus today.

Adult Faith Formation: Community Learning

In partnership with the Lutheran School of Theology at Chicago (LSTC), Holy Cross participated in a four session program during February and March utilizing *Martin Luther on the Holy Spirit and the Christian Life* by Dr. Candace Kohli, Assistant Professor of Systematic Theology at the LSTC. Dr. Kohli led the sessions which were offered live remotely on Sunday evenings, with recorded sessions presented on Wednesday evenings including a live closing recap from Dr. Kohli. In October, Rev. Wayne N. Miller, Bishop Emeritus, led a four-part series via Zoom exploring *Faith, Work, and Economics*.

Adult Faith Formation Opportunities

"The Chosen"

On selected Thursday evenings from June through August, Pastor Chris led a watch party and discussion of season one of "The Chosen" drama television series about the life of Christ, portrayed through the eyes of those who met Jesus.

"Fostering Healthy Christian Relationships"

This transformative one-day training session led by Pastor Chris in September offered essential tools and insights necessary to nurture and strengthen our community through a deepened understanding of Christian relationships.

Book Club

The book club at Holy Cross has existed since 2000 and over the years, the members have enjoyed selecting monthly books and get together for lively discussions generally about the book. The volunteer host/hostess selects the discussion location which may be via Zoom or small groups gathering to Zoom together, then leads the discussion of the book. Reading group guides with discussion questions are often available in the book or online.

During 2023 we read *The Woman They Could Not Silence* by Kate Moore, *The English American* by Alison Larkin, *The Island of Sea Women* by Lisa See, *The Body in the Clouds* by Ashley Hay, *Where the Red Fern Grows* by Wilson Rawls, *A Place Called Home* by David Ambroz, *Beneath a Scarlet Sky* by Mark Sullivan, Quiet Until the Thaw by Alexandra Fuller, *The Midnight Library* by Matt Haig, and *The Silent Sister* by Diane Chamberlain.

As you can see, the subjects vary widely, often exploring other cultures—including non-fiction, biographical, historical, fiction as well as classics or something just for fun. The upcoming book is always listed in the newsletter, and new participants are welcome to drop in at any time. Check out the December newsletter for the 2024 selection and schedule.

Care of Creation

This group focuses on local land use and ecological regeneration awareness. In 2023 this was done through monthly newsletter articles, a pollinator education table hosted by the Care of Creation team on Mother's Day, the planting of fifteen native bushes and the installation of three grape vine trellises (Eagle Scout project) on the church property. Additionally, a roadside cleanup of Saint Mary's Road was completed by members of the Care of Creation team and the Saturday morning men's group.

Outlook for 2024 includes the planting of grape vines, additional assessment and planning for another land restoration project, and additional education opportunities.

Columbarium Ministry

The Christian faith offers a perspective on the way we construct our lives and offers a perspective about the end of our life. The Columbarium Ministry is about some of those end of life decisions that need to be made. The columbarium is identified as the Holy Cross Resurrection Garden and is a dedicated structure on the south side of our building containing niches for the interment of cremated human remains. There is also a Remembrance Wall available for members to honor their loved ones even if their remains are elsewhere.

A special task force and the church council developed documentation that provides clarity about the protocols and procedures associated with this ministry. We are operating with documentation that meets legal standards while

representing the conditions of what will be provided if one chooses to become involved with Holy Cross' "Columbarium Ministry." If more information is needed or a conversation is desired to discuss specifics pertaining to the columbarium ministry, view the Resurrection Garden brochure at *HolyCrossChurch.org/resurrectiongarden* or contact the church office.

Common Threads & Prayer Shawl Ministry

The Prayer Shawl Ministry includes shawls and lap blankets made by those in Common Threads and others. These prayer shawls and blankets are blessed during a worship service and passed on to someone in need of comfort and prayer. In 2023, Holy Cross dedicated 25 prayer blankets and shawls to individuals. All shawls and blankets were crafted by participants in this ministry. The group meets monthly, and those who participate in Common Threads may work on personal projects, learn new stitches, and create prayer shawls. Common Threads is always looking for those who will contribute their gift and talent for this ministry, and if you are unable to attend meetings, you may still work on prayer shawls. Patterns can be provided. If you, or someone you know would be comforted by the receipt of a prayer shawl, please contact the church office. The group also appreciates donations received in the form of gift cards to craft stores or cash donations so they may purchase yarn and supplies for this ministry.

Green Thumbs

Many plant-savvy volunteers shared their time and gardening talents with the congregation this year. The Green Thumbs team is instrumental in design, planting and maintaining the planters on the patio, at the entrances and in the beds by the Columbarium and at the main entrance. Men's Ministries

In 2023, men at Holy Cross participated in the following events and groups:

Saturday Morning Men's Group

One of the ways we keep our faith "on the front burner" is to come together with others to share in fellowship, conversation, mutual support, and learning. The Saturday Morning Men's Group provides one such opportunity at Holy Cross. The group regularly has about 15 participants who connect in-person and over Zoom for 90 minutes on Saturday morning. Men interested in attending should opt into the group through Church Community Builder or check the monthly church calendar and join us starting at 7 am.

In January, the group continued discussions based on Rachel Held Evans' book "INSPIRED... Slaying Giants, Walking on Water, and Loving the Bible Again." In March, April and May, discussion focused on Falling Upward by Richard Rohr. From July through October, the book Faith After Dark by Brian McLaren provided discussion topics, and in November the group began discussion of 'A' is for Alabaster: A Preacher's Alphabet by Anna Carter Florence.

Men of Purpose, Principle, & Prayer (MP3)

MP3 is a men's group that began meeting in October of 2018. The theme begun in 2023 was "sacred moments," with the plan being to deconstruct the idea of "sacred" into six components, with the three components for 2023 being "S" for sanctuary/refuge/safe place; "A" for ancient philosophies/lessons passed on from previous mentors; and "C" for ceremony/milestone moments/rites/traditions. In 2024, the components of "R" for relational, "E" for emptiness and "D" for deeper will be covered. Meetings including fellowship, dinner, music and a program were held on July 11, September 19, and November 7. Steve Oelschlager, Phil Kirschbaum, Dale Tippett Jr., Pastor Chris Neptun, and Pastor Bob Davis coordinated MP3.

Music Ministries

Worship Arts

Happy New Year, Church! As I look back on this year I am proud to bring you some highlights of the exciting and varied worship opportunities that the music and AV departments have been involved in. While the year started with some small enhancements to familiar practices, the opportunities to get more and more ambitious began to take shape and it's been an absolute pleasure to be a part of this team here.

During Lent, our midweek worship took on some more texture with more soloists and musicians joining me in leading the Holden Evening Prayer liturgy, and instead of preaching, Pastor Chris was having great dialogues with many of our ministry partners, which gave us as a community an opportunity to put faces to the names we hear about on Sundays when we hear what services we've been supporting as a community.

This year instead of having the Easter Sunrise service, we had an Easter Eve Festival with decorated sets and special music at most of the stations. We had teams that created a Garden of Eden, Noah's Ark, the valley of dry bones—Darin Chartier built a forty foot whale in the atrium to help tell the story of Jonah, played by Marshall Jowers! It was a huge event, with more than two hundred attending. The ladies of LIFT hosted an ice cream social at the end. Astounding.

We had our last drive-in worship service this year. This is not the end of outdoor worship, just the beginning of a new evolution. We'll have other outdoor worship opportunities this year, and not only on the patio. So stay tuned!

The Around the Cross season has been so much fun. We kicked off with a Beer and Hymns event that Darrin Rose was gracious enough to join us at. It was a really great chance to sing all the famous-and-greats alongside some hidden gems and personal favorites. Rob and Mike from Mojo Daddies did a stellar storytelling-style performance featuring music from their album "A Long Road", which was one of the best Mojo Daddies performances that I've had the pleasure of seeing. The Christmas Party Hop was a blast, with a 9 piece band! Bill Miksch, Mike Dikelsky, Rob Twardock, Emily Young, Karen Kobeck, Darrin Rose, Lisamarie Keskar, Dennis Lieding and I made for a wall of sound and a joyful room full of singing, dancing, and even a couple conga lines!

The end of the calendar year was very exciting indeed, with Elizabeth Davis and Carly Thornberry singing a special piece of music at a service that I was privileged to roll the church's tympani out to accompany Paul on a very exciting piece of organ music.

For Advent we used a liturgy sourced from hymns that haven't seen play for many years—the intention was to bring out some old times music that maybe your grandparents grew up with, while introducing them as "new" to a younger generation. Choruses like "Thank You, Lord", and songs like "Lord Speak To Us That We May Speak" sung alongside the more familiar "Let Us Break Bread Together On Our Knees" was hopefully a nostalgic experience and a welcome update to our liturgical repertoire.

The Sunday School program with music led by Carrie and Jamey Mack was great, and the children who read from the pulpit did a fantastic job. The Bell Choir joined the Adult Choir in a great performance of "Can You Hear the Christmas Bells", which was a request I made of Darrin Rose and Elizabeth Fashimpaur, so my thanks go to them! I was sick with Covid for that Sunday, and Paul stepped in to cover for me, and our AV Club ran the livestream expertly. That same day, Rob Twardock and Emily Young stepped up to support our Blue Christmas service in my absence, which was a resounding success. It's a powerful and beautiful worship experience and I was very sad to miss it.

The Christmas season was beautiful and our singers and musicians deserve another round of applause. Prayer Ministry

The Prayer Ministry was formed to lift up the prayers and concerns of all who come in need of prayer. These ministry members pray during the week for people listed on the prayer concerns shared with the Church Office.

Quilting & More

This creative group meets on most Wednesday mornings from 9 am to noon in the resource center in the basement of the west wing. Ten twin-sized quilts were made and given to families at COOL Family Housing in December, and during the summer two smaller quilts were donated to the organization Quilts Beyond Borders, a charity providing quilts to children in underserved areas of the world. Donations of 100% cotton quilting fabric, either pieces or yardage, are always appreciated. New members are always welcome. Strength and Core (formerly Pilates)

Physical and mental health are crucial to one's well-being. This class is designed to improve physical strength, flexibility and posture while enhancing mental awareness for everyone, male or female. Instructor Rhoni Ross-Bast leads those who attend class on Monday nights at 6 pm at Holy Cross. The sessions are organized by Jodi Zombolo and are open to all. A floor mat is required for all in person classes and participants should also have a stability ball and small hand weights. Not sure if this is for you? Try a class for free! This past year we had an average of 10 participants and we would love to have more!

Women's Ministries

Grounded in Grace: Women's Friday Night Group

Grounded in Grace is a social opportunity for women of faith to gather monthly for fun and fellowship. This group of both members and friends meets one Friday evening a month, with a brief summer hiatus. The group met throughout 2023 and continued its pilgrimage through a variety locally owned restaurants and breweries. In 2024 we will be partnering with other Holy Cross ministries to add a variety of activities and outings.

LIFT (Living In Faith Together)

This new women's ministry program began in March 2023 with a "Spill the Tea Party." Additional events throughout the year included a movie discussion night (Wild), a volunteer night at Feed My Starving Children, a Ravinia concert outing (Kenny Loggins), and the Women's Retreat. More than 30 women met for the Women's Retreat at Lutherdale in Elkhorn, Wisconsin on October 20-21, to explore the theme of "Women Talking." Deaconess Katie Freund led discussions about the ways women of faith can talk, care, and support one another and themselves. Women's Discussion Group

This group of women traditionally meets on the 1st and 3rd Tuesdays of the month for fellowship, fun and learning. Discussion topics in 2023 included the books *Wholehearted Faith* by Rachel Held Evans and two books written by Anna Carter Florence, *Rehearsing Scripture: Discovering God's Word in Community* and "A" is for Alabaster: A Preacher's Alphabet.

Worship Participant Ministry

The primary responsibility of the Worship Participant Ministry is to support the regular schedule of services for our church, including all Sunday morning services, mid-week during Lent, and festival observances such as Christmas, Holy Week and Reformation. Worship Coordinators, Readers, Greeters, Communion Assistants, Ushers, Acolytes and Altar Care volunteers all help to make worship a welcoming, inclusive, seamless experience. Holy Cross utilizes our database, Church Community Builder, to provide the vehicle for volunteering to help with worship. Therese Delli Paoli has volunteered to supervise and oversee this sign-up process by sending reminder emails to our pool of volunteers and confirming service dates and times. Volunteers are always welcome, and training for any position is simple and quick. Faith Formation at Holy Cross

One way to understand life and reality is to believe that it is as simple as what you see is what you get, that there is nothing more to our world than what we perceive through our primary senses. A different way to engage with existence is to know that there is something more: In addition to the material world, there is also an underlying spirit and energy and life that animates everything behind the scenes. As Christians, our faith is that there is something more going on, that God is the source of the hidden power of creation, and that Jesus Christ reveals who this God is and what this God loves and intends for us.

Faith is the glue that holds together everything we do at Holy Cross. When we talk about faith formation, we refer to the process that allows people to trust this fuller, more spirited reality. This kind of faith is something we can intuit at times, but it is also something we need to work at to increase our awareness.

Therefore, at Holy Cross, we take seriously the need to form faith in people of all ages. We do this through experiences of worship, learning, service, and shared testimony. Intergenerational relationships are particularly effective at "passing faith" from one generation to another. Sunday school, confirmation, Crossroads High School Youth Group, Emerge Middle School Youth Group, adult education, relational groups, initiatives to serve, and leadership development are a few of the many ways we attempt to help people grow in their faith. Please keep this in mind as you read through the annual report and think about how you can grow in your faith and help others, especially our young people, to mature as followers of Jesus.

Stewardship

Stewardship is integral to our spiritual journeys and life together at Holy Cross. Each Wednesday during Lent, a representative from one of Holy Cross' hunger ministry partners joined us to share how their organization has worked to address the needs of those who hunger in our community, country and across the globe. The organizations represented included COOL Ministries, Feed My Starving Children, ELCA World Hunger, Northern Illinois Food Bank, and PADS.

Ash Wednesday worship was held on February 22, with midweek Lenten worship services on March 1, 8, 15, 22 and 29, Maundy Thursday worship on April 6, and Good Friday worship on April 7.

In 2023, we were once again able to offer family-friendly fellowship opportunities with Lenten soup suppers before the midweek worship services.

An Easter Eve Festival was held on Saturday, April 8 that allowed us to explore the traditional Easter Vigil in a completely new and contemporary way. Bible stories were brought to life through interactive storytelling and song. The event finished with an ice cream social.

Blue Christmas - December 17

A worship service of lament and hope, anticipation and longing, restoration and renewal. The service is structured around three distinct movements of "hearing us," "healing us" and "sending us." We provide space for personal and communal reflection. The worship experience provides generous amounts of silence that are woven throughout.

Global Leadership Summit

Saturday Evening Worship at Holy Cross

We enjoy a rich worship life at Holy Cross. We utilize liturgical seasonal themes, a variety of styles and music, rich prayer

and confessional traditions, and time with God's Word. In addition to Sunday morning worship, the major festivals, seasonal Advent and Lenten worship services, ecumenical and interfaith worship opportunities, we also offer Saturday Evening Worship at 5:30 pm. In 2023, we were able to worship on the first Saturday of the month during the academic year (September through May) and every Saturday during the summer months of June, July and August. We celebrate the sacrament of Holy Communion at all of these services.

Saturday Night Live on the Patio

Three Saturday Night Live on the Patio events were held on June 24, July 15, and August 19. Worship on the patio was followed by dinner and fellowship. The entrées were provided and attendees were invited to contribute sides and desserts. Val Maxwell and Manny Flores again provided their famous brisket dinner for the July event, which is always a highlight of the summer schedule.

Community Ministry Partners

Boy Scouts of America Troop 194

Troop 194 is in the Aptakisic District of the BSA's Northeast Illinois Council. Our district serves the communities of Highland Park, Highwood, Ft Sheridan, Lake Forest, Lake Bluff, Green Oaks, Libertyville, Rondout, Mundelein, Vernon Hills, Deerfield, Bannockburn, Lincolnshire, Riverwoods, Mettawa, Kildeer, Long Grove and Northeast Buffalo Grove. Troop 194 holds meetings from 7 to 8:15 pm on Mondays at the church. We have successfully moved beyond the impacts of Covid-19 transitioning back to in-person Troop meetings with scouts and adult leaders. Monthly committee meetings are virtual, held on the 2nd Wednesday of the month from 7 to 8:30 pm.

Highlights from 2023 calendar year include:

- Our Scouts earned 138 merit badges, a 24% increase from 2022. The Scout BSA merit badge program allows scouts
 to examine subjects to determine if they would like to further pursue them as a career or vocation. Scouts can learn
 about sports, science, trades, business and future careers with more than 135 merit badges currently in the program.
- We had three scouts earn scout's highest honor, Eagle Scout. One of those scouts chose to do his Eagle Project for Holy Cross, constructing three grape arbors on the west side of the property. We understand that Holy Cross is excited about populating those arbors with grapes next spring and recommended this project as an opportunity to enhance and build the church community. One additional scout has completed his Eagle project and is on-track to achieve the rank of eagle with-in the first quarter of 2024. We have many scouts progressing toward Eagle and look forward to seeing many of them be added to the ranks of Eagle Scout.
- As a Troop, we participated in six different service projects. These included food preparation with a local charity at Feed My Starving Children, Road cleanup along Winchester Road in Libertyville, fence repairs for an EPA federal grant on public land, invasive species removal with-in the lake county forest preserve and honoring our veterans during Memorial Day flag placement at Lakeside Cemetery in Libertyville.
- We conducted nine camping/overnight weekends. Additionally, 22 Scouts attended a week of summer camp at Ma-Ka-Ja-Wan Scout Reservation in Pearson, WI. Troop 194 inducted seven scouts into the honorary society of the Boy Scouts of American known as the "order of the arrow". The honorary group is composed of scouts and scouters who best exemplify the Scout Oath and Law in their daily lives as elected by their peers. We had three scouts attend and complete the Okpic cold weather training program in Trevor, WI. The Okpic program serves to build confidence in the scouts' ability to camp during cold weather.
- The Troop participated in a High-Adventure Trek this year. Over summer break, six Scouts and three adult leaders completed a rugged 12 day trek at Philmont Scout Ranch High Adventure Camp in Cimarron, NM. The scouts backpacked over 70 miles of adventure starting at basecamp with an elevation 6,700. The challenges of the northern New Mexico wilderness afforded the scouts the opportunity to peak the summits of Mount Phillip (elevation 11,742 ft) and Tooth of Time (elevation 9,003). The midwestern scouts quickly adapted to the change in elevation from the customary 699 ft elevation of Libertyville, IL. The legendary experience from camp continues to leave an enduring legacy as Troop 194 strives to develop the next generation of leader.
- We had four Scouts attend and complete the Scout BSA National Youth Leadership Training (NYLT) course in June. The six-day program is the premier training opportunity across the Scout BSA program sponsored at the council level in northern Wisconsin. The course centers around the concepts of what a leader must be, what a leader must know and what leader must do. The key elements are taught with a clear focus on the "How to..." The leadership fundamental skills are reinforced over the week-long course as the scouts learn and practice leadership.
- We welcomed new Scouts into the Troop during Cub Scout crossover in March and continue active recruitment
- Heading into 2024, our Troop will be 28 Scouts strong and is actively supported by more than 20 civic minded adults. We have planned numerous camping outdoor adventures to include Ma-ka-jaw-an, and a high adventure trek at the Northern Tier base camp in Ely, MN.

Our program and its success would not be possible without the support of Holy Cross Church! We appreciate the church's role as our charter organization and support for our fund-raising efforts, especially the bake/pumpkin/ firewood sale in the fall. We would like to thank Pastor Chris for his continued support of Scouting and Troop 194. We look forward to continuing our great relationship at Holy Cross with Pastor Chris. Christian Outreach of Lutherans (COOL Ministries)

The COOL mission is to give comprehensive assistance to families in need, by reducing hunger and homelessness while encouraging personal growth and self-sufficiency. This year COOL Ministries celebrated its 40th anniversary. The COOL pantry in Waukegan provided meals supporting over 70,000 individuals and distributed just under 1,000,000 pounds of food in 2023. The transitional housing provided a home to 16 families, including 21 adults and 36 children. COOL ministries also provided additional support for our local veterans.

In 2023, Holy Cross was again able to organize and participate in the 24th Annual Spring COOL Plant & Flower Sale. Members supported the annual golf outing and assisted our local veterans with extra donations during the month of November by providing additional toiletry items that were distributed. In December, the Giving Tree collected and distributed more than 120 gifts purchased for families in COOL Transitional Housing program. Additionally, Holy Cross raised funds in November and December toward the purchase of COOL Holiday Meal Boxes for Thanksgiving and Christmas. We are thankful for and appreciate your ongoing support and prayers for COOL ministry in our local community. Overall, Holy Cross distributed \$21,865 in 2023 to support COOL Ministries.

ELCA World Hunger and Disaster Relief

The first Sunday of each month we provide our members the opportunity to support the ELCA World Hunger Effort. Additional informational materials are inserted in the bulletins throughout the year. For more information, visit *elca.org/Resources/ELCA-World-Hunger*. In addition to supporting ELCA World Hunger, Holy Cross also offers special offerings for ELCA Disaster Relief to help those affected by wildfires, hurricanes, or other natural disasters. This year, HCLC contributed \$13,501 to the ELCA World Hunger Effort and \$3,000 to ELCA Disaster Relief.

Feed My Starving Children

A Feed My Starving Children ministry was reestablished in November 2023 with monthly packing sessions scheduled several months out. The sessions have been successful service and fellowship opportunities for the participants thus far, with 10 participants joining in the November pack and 8 in December. Packing sessions have been at varying days and times to accommodate all schedules, including daytime, evenings, and weekends. Participants of all ages have found meaningful ways to serve, from food packing to seated labeling to joining the "warehouse crew".

There is room to grow in 2024. We will continue to advertise opportunities to serve throughout all the church's communication vehicles, look to create partnerships with other ministries (starting with an event with LIFT in February), and establish a spare change collection station in the Fellowship Area. Each month's opportunity will point potential participants to register by emailing Emily Young at *emily.young@allstate.com*, who will continue to manage the registration for the group events.

Lake County United

Lake County United (LCU) is a non-partisan alliance of institutions that brings together Christians, Muslims, Jews, and secular organizations to address pressing issues impacting our communities.

As an LCU member institution, Holy Cross is working to bring about:

- Reduction in gun violence through increasing gun safety technology
- Creation of affordable housing for individuals and families
- Mental health resources for communities and individuals

Gun safety:

Lake County United is working locally, regionally and nationally on a market driven approach to gun safety: recruiting law enforcement to test gun locks and other security devices and providing feedback to the developers, as well as encouraging law enforcement and the military to use their buying power to promote good corporate practices among gun manufacturers. LCU representatives meet regularly with Lake County State's Attorney, Eric Rinehart, Highland Park Police Chief Lou Jogmen, president of the Illinois Association of Chiefs of Police, and a number of other elected officials to build support for this strategy.

Waukegan Affordable Housing:

LCU has formed a partnership with a local developer and an architect to design and build 25 apartments and 60 townhouses with an emphasis on community space and sustainability on Waukegan property owned by US HealthVest. Of the \$7 million of donations and loans we have raised, State Senator Adriane Johnson is directly responsible for \$3 million and is seeking an additional \$2 million. A portion of that money will be used for demolition of existing buildings. LCU leaders have met with more than half of the Lake County Board Commissioners regarding the use of American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds allocated to the County to supplement construction costs.

Libertyville Essential Housing:

Lake County United continues to work for essential housing on the Winchester House property owned by Lake County. The housing team is doing research and conducting relational meetings with citizens, business leaders, and County Board members.

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Mental Health:

Lake County United remains firmly engaged in expanding non-criminal justice interventions in mental health incidents. One goal is to expand hours of a daytime crisis center in Waukegan (Independence Center). We continue to press for use of Medicaid funds for this, as well as establish locations to serve the entire county as an alternative to jail or hospital emergency rooms (ER). It costs five times more to house a person in jail than it does to provide adequate mental health services. Yet jail and ER are often the only options for people in a mental health crisis.

Lake County United (LCU) is affiliated with 65 independent organizations around the US as part of the Industrial Areas Foundation. Collectively, we have a powerful impact. To learn more, go to *metro-iaf.org* and *swiaf.org*

Lutheran Campus Ministry Dinner

Lutheran Campus Ministry at Northwestern (LCMNU) is a welcoming community experiencing, living, and sharing the love of God through scholarship, service, and faith. LCMNU is a student-led ministry that welcomes all of God's people regardless of race, color, national origin, religion, age, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity and expression, parental status, marital status, disability, citizenship, or veteran status. As one of 180+ campus ministries of the ELCA, LCMNU shares in the mission "to invite people in academic settings to engage more deeply with the teachings of Jesus Christ and the community that bears his name, so that they can discover and fulfill their vocation as disciples." LCMNU currently has one student member with connections to Holy Cross.

In 2023, Holy Cross members hosted dinners in April and November for students at the LCMNU Center in Evanston. These dinners are wonderful opportunities to talk with students and learn how they live out their faith on campus and in the community. We hope to be able to host another dinner or two in 2024 and continue our tradition of hospitality and fellowship for both students and Holy Cross members. Lutheran Social Services of Illinois (LSSI)

Holy Cross members supported the LSSI Backpack Drive this year by providing almost 100 backpacks filled with school supplies. LSSI will provide these backpacks to students in need in Chicago for the 2023/24 school year.

Olivewood Project

Holy Cross again held in-person sales of olive wood products from The Olivewood Project in November and December 2023. Sales at Holy Cross in 2023 totaled \$687. This money is sent to a cooperative of Christian carvers in Bethlehem, headed by Michael Zoughbi, to help the carvers earn a living amid difficult circumstances. Special thanks to Holy Cross volunteers who helped with olive wood sales and everyone who generously supported the Olivewood Project with their purchases.

PADS (Public Action to Deliver Shelter)

PADS of Lake County serves about 400 individuals and families experiencing housing insecurity. It is important to know that over half of these clients are below the age of 18. 2023 began much like 2022.

The Holy Cross PADS Ministry team along with confirmands and their parents packed lunches and provided breakfast items to the PADS client's monthly from January through April. The Ministry team also prepared, delivered and served monthly meals to the clients staying at Shepherd of the Lakes Lutheran Church in Grayslake, until the end of the church hosting season in April. In March we were able to collect and provide PADS central with microwaveable bowls and can openers from our generous congregation. We also presented Eric Foote, the acting PADS Director at the time, with \$1,000 in gas gift cards and \$500 in Jewel grocery cards. September brought a great gift of government and private grants that enabled PADS to house all clients and families in area hotels. This changed the landscape tremendously. PADS can now directly address all the aspects that contribute to homelessness without having to address where people will be sleeping. This model will hopefully expedite clients transitioning into housing and job security.

Holy Cross has partnered with Shepherd of the Lakes and Joy Lutheran Churches to provide 50 warm individually packaged meals to the Super 8 in Mundelein (where over 60 children are staying) every Monday. Holy Cross covers the 2nd and 5th Mondays each month. We are also finding our footing when it comes to supporting and stocking the PADS pantry being housed at First Presbyterian in Libertyville. We have requests going out to our members monthly via the newsletter with a bin placed outside the church office to collect donations. We then coordinate delivery on Wednesday evenings when First Presbyterian has volunteers to collect and sort items.

The PADS Ministry team is working hard to try and meet the needs PADS of Lake County in this ever evolving season of change. All support is welcome and all support is appreciated. Whether it be with your time, pantry donations, meal prep and delivery, or monetary contributions, we will continue to serve those wanting to leave homelessness behind and move forward into our communities. Project Healing Waters Fly Fishing - North Chicago Program

Year in Review - 2023

As of mid-2023, most US military bases have relaxed their covid-19 protocols compared to earlier phases of the pandemic, except for ongoing testing and vaccination requirements. Base Commanders still monitor the situation in case of outbreaks. Project Healing Waters North Chicago Program has still experienced intermittent Covid protocols being implemented due to outbreaks at Lovell Veteran's Health Center.

Since its inception in 2016 the North Chicago Program was essentially an "Inpatient Program", However with the easing of the Covid-19 protocols, North Chicago Program has experienced a steady increase in the number of participants and volunteers.

This past January the Evening Program began to take a shift. A therapist from Lovell who treats veterans on an outpatient basis began referring her clients to the North Chicago Program. We continue to grow from two Participants to twenty-four. This re-invention has been realized by many programs across the country and hopefully this triggers a significant growth in Participants locally and nationally. February 2023 marks the seventh anniversary of our Project Healing Waters Fly Fishing- North Chicago Program. The North Chicago Program, which works in conjunction with the Recreational Therapy Department at the James A. Lovell Federal Health Center and is the only program in the Chicago-land area and the state of Illinois. North Chicago is part of PHWFF's Midwest Region which features 18 Programs in the states of Minnesota (2), Iowa (1), Illinois (1), Wisconsin (2), Indiana (2), Michigan (3), and Ohio (7). As many as four new programs could join the Midwest in 2024. The Midwest Region continues to see growth in Volunteers and Participants and leads the nation in this category. The following is a summary of events from this past year:

Program Overview - Nationally and Locally

North Chicago's Day and Evening Program Sessions

Beginning in January 2023, North Chicago runs two program sessions, one in the day and one in the evening, and again, due to the pandemic and the inpatient based veteran population we serve, some of these sessions were cancelled as part of the Covid-19 protocol implemented by Lovell Federal Health Center. Both Day and Evening Sessions are aligned with Lovell's Recreational Therapy Department. The Day Program is attended by disabled Veterans from WWII to the Cold War in age. They reside on Lovell's Campus in their Community Living Centers known as "The Greenhouses". This session has grown steadily to 20 participants, who regularly attend fishing outings. Amy Lefstadt and Tricia Stewart lead this part of the program.

The Evening Sessions attended by veterans of all ages from Lovell's Outpatient Program, Elizabeth Lacombe leads this program and has been an amazing resource to the Veterans connectivity to Lovell. These Participants will engage in all five-core program activities; fly tying, casting, education, rod building and fishing outings including both day and overnight outings.

Program Growth and New Offerings

2023 also ushered in a new logo. It was decided that a new logo would be created that would reduce printing costs and also reflect our mission.

In addition to the 69 active registrations in North Chicago, the program saw steady growth in both participants and volunteers. It is hoped that participation in the day sessions will hold steady at 20 veterans during the day.

Volunteer growth has steadily increased with approximately three new volunteers per quarter. This influx of talent will help to provide technical skill levels and a broader level of leadership in the organization. Many of these new volunteers came to North Chicago through spot ads and the growing popularity of the PHWFF.

Volunteer Hours

This past year program volunteer hours have increased with the addition of planned float fishing trips, such as the Kishwaukee River and White Pines State Park in Rockford, IL. Project Healing Waters has partnered with Oak Heart Lodge, a private lodge located in Newago, Michigan. As many as eight participants and two volunteer trip leads (chaperones) attend a 5-day fishing trip. This year we sent four participants and two trip leads. All expenses are paid except for fishing licenses. Fuel reimbursement is available.

This year we had two participants build fly rods. Rod building is taught by a professional, the finished fly rod builders are awarded an Orvis reel, backing line and new fly line. A certificate of completion is provided, and it is suggested that the finished rod be entered into the national competition. Fly tying and fly-casting competition programs are also being encouraged for the National competition. We hope that the Veterans of North Chicago will participate in future competitions. Rewards for participants that take part in the competitions will be invited to Freedom Ranch in Montana. Requirements for the invitations are completion of the 3 categories of rod building, casting and fly tying.

The outgoing Project Healing Waters North Chicago Program Lead/Midwest Regional Coordinator Jeff Reinke wore many hats, and his shoes will be hard to fill. Jeff logged countless dedicated volunteer hours with additional responsibilities at the regional and national levels. Jeff Reinke continued to serve as Midwest Regional Coordinator while

bringing Jay Dzik Assistant Program Lead up to speed before Jeff transitioned out of his role as Program Lead.

Leadership Changes and Growth

After 7 years of leadership in North Chicago and increased responsibilities at the Regional and National Levels Jeff Reinke turned the North Chicago reins over to new leaders on October 1. Jeff's term as Field Advisory Council Chair was also completed (now just an Advisor). The organization will be undergoing significant changes toward improving processes and our impact on helping veterans in need. With this change in Jeff's leadership the North Chicago Program will have new leaders with the following roles as we move forward in 2023:

Jeff Reinke – Midwest Regional Coordinator (RC), Field Advisory Council (Advisor) and Board Trustee Jeff will remain connected with the North Chicago Program in its transition and as a Volunteer.

Project Healing Waters North Chicago Program Leaders:

Jay Dzik - Program Lead (PL)

Jay will be leading the fly-tying program in addition to his duties of running the program. He will be the face of North Chicago and the main point of contact.

Sam Sides – Assistant Program Lead (APL)

Sam is now the formal APL who will assist Jay with meetings, scheduling, communication and running the program.

Darwin Adams – Outings and Casting Lead (APL)

Darwin will lead the fishing outings and continue as the casting director.

Todd Radek and Tal Kisner – Rod Building Lead (APL)

Tal Kisner will teach rod building going forward as Todd Radek relocated to Florida. Tal will teach our vets how to build their own fly rods and have them enter the PHWFF National Rod Building Competition.

Jackie Levernier – Holy Cross Hospitality (APL)

Jackie leads and organizes the Holy Cross Hospitality Team.

Dina Lissner Nanberg – Public Outreach (APL)

Dina will be helping with public relations.

Amy Lefstad – Lovell Liaison (APL)

Amy will be our eyes and ears at Lovell and will work to connect us to veteran's programs.

John Psomas – VAVS Representative for North Chicago (APL)

John will be our Programs VAVS representative. We have not had one in the past and john will work with Kenneth Lick at Lovell.

Networking, Public Relations and Fundraising

Since 2020 North Chicago hasn't fundraised except for efforts made through Facebook Birthday Fundraisers. It is hoped that we can reconnect with our major supporters from the Gary Borger, Elliot Donnelly and Lee Wulff Chapters of Trout Unlimited as well as a donation from the Veterans of Foreign Wars (VFW) post where volunteer Scott Roane is a member. Orvis – Chicago is a yearly donor through their corporate share program. We are grateful for the generous support of Holy Cross Lutheran Church which has been foundational to the success of North Chicago. Going forward the outlook for North Chicago Program in 2024 is solid.

Summary

As we come out of essentially a three-year period of challenging times, we have great optimism as we look forward to our new Outpatient Venue (Evening Vets) and reconnecting with our legacy Vets in the Day program. With fresh new leaders and a positive outlook, we look forward to the continued support from our partners at Holy Cross Church, the James A. Lovell Federal Health Center, Troop 194, and Trout Unlimited.

Rosebud Indian Reservation The Cookie Walk 2023

Rosebud, South Dakota is one of poorest Indian Reservations. Holy Cross Church has supported this reservation through mission trips and fundraising. The 15th Annual Cookie Walk was a huge success because we had so many bakers returning to help support our friends on the Rosebud reservation by preparing and sharing their specialty baked goods. This Rosebud fundraiser was established to provide the Sioux (part of the Lakota heritage) with resources they desperately need daily. Our team's goal is to bring Christmas joy to every girl and boy (age or at heart!) at the Rosebud reservation.

To our congregation: Thank you so very much for your ultra-generous support! You are part of a Christmas miracle! Our team thanks you for caring so much for our Lakota friends. God always finds a way and it is our team's intention to assist the people of Rosebud and, YOU helped us to do just that. Your donations this year totaled over \$4,500 which will be used

for 2024 projects in Rosebud. Along with carryover funds from last year, we were able to make an impressive impact.

The Cookie Walk team chose three valuable ministries to support: The Tree of Life, the Panther's Clothes Closet and the Boys and Girls Club of Rosebud. We are thrilled to be able to work with these ministry partners to help bring hope and light to those at Rosebud! The beauty of our choices is that all three of these organizations work collaboratively in the Rosebud community for the survival and success of all. The Cookie Walk Team believes that we made the best decision to benefit our Lakota families by choosing these organizations.

- 1) **The Tree of Life** is an organization serving Lakota families located on the Rosebud Reservation with food, clothing, and love. Linda Garriott, Pastor and Director of Tree of Life, and her team serve 300+ lunch meals per day. They are blessed to have enough food and clothing donations; however, they do not have enough food containers to serve the meals to those in need. The Cookie Walk team agreed to send \$4500 to support Linda and her staff to obtain the disposable containers they need. She stated that "Holy Cross' gift for disposable containers is the best news of the day. We are so excited to be receiving containers which will hold our warm meals for so many! Most people do not understand that it is the small things that make such a huge difference to others."
- 2) **Panther's Clothes Closet** is located in and operated by the Rosebud Elementary School. They provide clothing and supplies **anytime** to all of their students. The motto of this organization is "If the basic needs of their students are met, they are more successful learners and this is why the Panther's Clothes Closet is so essential." We donated \$2,000 to purchase boys' clothing and essentials as they requested.
- 3) The Boys and Girls Club of Rosebud. Their mission statement is to enable all young people, especially those who need them most, to reach their full potential as productive, caring, responsible citizens. This Club has three locations that they support: Rosebud, Mission and Parmalee. Rachel Kocek, Executive Director, oversees and manages the needs for their students. The best news she shared is that they were able to purchase an abandoned school building and it is large enough for them to offer many programs such as providing afterschool tutoring, teaching outreach through community involvement, providing transportation for students, and mentoring. They also furnish snacks and meals for their youth. Their hope is to expand services to all ages at their new location. Holy Cross sent \$2,000 to the Boys & Girls Club of Rosebud to assist them with startup of their building as well as their normal operations.

In addition, we financially support our mission liaison, Dorothy Peterson, by sending her a check for \$1,500. Dorothy is extremely instrumental in identifying the needs of the Rosebud community. She continues to counsel families and provides them with many everyday items that we may take for granted such as blankets, food vouchers, and clothing. When we thanked Dorothy, she told us it was the "work of the 'Holy Spirit' that helped guide us to assist the people of Rosebud".

A special thanks goes to Kris DeGregor for once again creating her beautiful and delightful Gingerbread House for us to raffle. Congratulations to all—the winners of the Gingerbread House and those who won one of the many fabulous gift baskets.

Special thanks to Pastor Chris, Pastor Bob, Deaconess Katie and Dale Tippett for their continued support and direction. Additional thank you's go to Ellie Rautenbach, Sarah Accettura, Janet Carr, Beth Ann Koenemann, Greg Kveton, Steve Oelschlager, and Tom Miller. Your valuable talents and support are greatly appreciated.

Rosebud Ministry Report

Mission Statement: Proverbs 29:18 "Without a vision the people perish." We continue to share Christ's Gospel with the Sicangu Lakota people with the goal to develop in Word and Sacrament a relationship that builds on established Ministry and relationships on the Rosebud Reservation.

Thank you, Holy Cross ELCA Congregation, for your continued prayers and support for this ministry on the Rosebud. A special thank you: Thank you for your gifts to the people and to me which allowed us to be more actively involved in the community. They are gratefully received. Some of you have special relationships with the families through Facebook, letters, telephone calls, and gifts throughout the year.

Accomplishments for 2023

Holy Cross made it possible to reach people from the Rosebud Elementary School which includes Two Strike families by working through the school's Help Needed fund created by the teachers at the school. We worked through the school counselor and secretary to identify those in need to facilitate providing aid. A friend from Two Strike who works at the school helped us find this avenue to provide gifts of clothing and school supplies to these students. The Boys and Girls Club also received funds from this source. Holy Cross donated money to this fund and Styrofoam food containers to Tree of Life which helped facilitate their meal deliveries to the communities. Thank you to the cookie walk at Holy Cross which provides such a great source of income for the Rosebud ministry.

With adequate funding, we were able to provide meals for children and the homeless in the Two Strike and St. Francis areas. This happened with the help of friends from Two Strike who prepared and delivered the meals.

We held a day camp in July for the Two Strike families where, along with fellowship, there was a fun day of food, Bible study, and games. Pastor David Marshall led the families with worship, song, and prayer. Russ and Delaina Salamun, along with the Trinity Lutheran Church mission team from Rapid City, SD, brought this summer ministry to Two Strike families.

Goals for 2024

- We hope for our mission team to go to Two Strike frequently with a more concentrated ministry consequently with a more effective outreach to the community.
- Strong emphasis on prayer and Bible study.

Our Lakota friends and neighbors say "Thank You." They continue to struggle against poverty and the violence that comes from alcoholism and drugs. Suicide is still a huge problem. Education and the contacts that come through Christian ministries are helping in combating this problem. The effective AA groups and the jail ministry continue to be an effective benefit to the community. Thank you to everyone who supports these ministries with your prayers, your gifts, and your presence. You bring strength and blessing to the Lakota people and to those who serve. In times of discouragement, it is often your prayers that help all the people at Rosebud. The face of a child or an elder, a hug, and the call of God on our hearts moves us to continue going forth in Christ's name. A basic need is someone willing to be a support person. A prayer, a phone call, a visit, bring encouragement that we may never realize. Holy Cross Lutheran Church continues to be a good friend to people on the Rosebud Reservation. You are well known as friends with a strong spiritual emphasis in your relationship. God sees your outreach and the people feel your love. Please continue your prayers. They are the most powerful gift we can share and receive in God's work.

Waukegan to College (W2C)

Waukegan to College supports first-generation college students (meaning their parents didn't attend college) to follow their dreams by attending and graduating from a 4-year university. Our ultimate goal is to build a college-going culture among the students and families of the Waukegan community. Waukegan to College partners with the school district to provide tutoring, mentoring, advocacy, scholarships, and onsite programs in the middle schools. We begin working with students as young as the fifth graders and support them through their college journey. This past May, we celebrated our graduates, and to date, 87 Waukegan to College alumni have graduated from college. This fall we started the school year with about 232 students total.

Holy Cross members have provided volunteer support to Waukegan to College, and Holy Cross has contributed more than \$27,500 over the years. Members serve as tutors to build proficiency across many subjects, and others provide personal mentorship for the college readiness and application process. As we grow, so do our needs for volunteer support. Willow House. . . Where Hope Lives

Children, Youth and Families Ministry Reports

Milestone Ministries - Deaconess Katie Freund

Our church has a legacy of fostering faith formation through milestone events. These sessions are labeled for particular grade levels, but that's a general guide rather than a limitation. We've had friends, cousins, and siblings join us regardless of age or grade level.

Baptism

For most of us the formal beginning of our faith journey occurred at the baptismal font. Through the waters of baptism, we are publicly claimed as a Child of God and become a part of God's family. The congregation, parent(s) and sponsors of the individual promise to support this person on their faith journey as they grow in age and wisdom through God's love. By appointment with a pastor.

Toddler Playdate

This milestone helps build community among families of small children. Rather than a "milestone" where learning or development is implied, this is a chance for our church to open our doors and provide open play, storytime, and a craft to families with children age 2 and under. We want to give families an opportunity to connect to each other and offer up resources for raising a child that knows they are loved by God. We know the first words of faith in a child's life are lived out in the joyful praise in play

Blessing of the Backpacks

To kick off the 2023/24 school year we provided and prayed over backpack tags for students in our congregation as well as prayer squares to bless all teachers and especially lift up our Early Childhood Ministry workers. Additionally, we raised money to buy backpacks and school supplies that church members packed and sent out for children in our community through Lutheran Social Services of Illinois.

Second Grade: Holy Communion

In this milestone, we learn about the mystery and gift that is Holy Communion. Class includes making bread, learning about the Passover, the events surrounding Jesus' institution of the Lord's Supper, what happens in Holy Communion and the general "how-tos" of receiving Holy Communion. Two sessions are offered each year with the fall class celebrating First Communion on World Communion Sunday (first Sunday of October) and the spring class celebrating First Communion on Maundy Thursday. This year, during the fall 2023 session our students had a blast squishing grapes as we talked about how wine and bread are made.

Third Grade: Bible Basics

At baptism, parent(s), sponsors and the congregation promise to place the Holy Scriptures into the hands of each baptized person. At Holy Cross, we do this in third grade with a class for parents and children to learn together. We cover how to use a Bible, how it is organized, and share favorite Bible verses. The next day we invite families to come to our 10 am worship service as the congregation presents gift Bibles to the students and pray for their continued faith journey. This year we were also able to source a Bible that matches the translation we use with our grade schoolers in an extra large print to adapt for those with visual impairments.

Fourth Grade: The Ten Commandments

This fourth grade milestone teaches life application for one of the most iconic traditions of our faith. The Ten Commandments are one of the things that parent(s), sponsors and the congregation promise to place in each baptized person's hands. But what does that mean? How does that apply to your family or the life of a fourth grader? We incorporated visual aids from "Godly Play" (a Montessori style curriculum) to show how the laws given to Moses in the Hebrew scriptures are reflected in the teachings of Jesus.

Fifth Grade: Live Your Faith

As people of God, we're told to follow Jesus, but how? What do you do? This year we chose a service project for kids to participate in that focused within our congregational family. Holy Cross has a vibrant prayer shawl ministry, we opened this ministry up for children's participation with a flannel blanket craft to be given to a child in our community while discussing how church members show care for each other.

Other Duties - Deaconess Katie Freund

There is never a shortage of opportunities in ministry, especially here in our congregation. During 2023 I was able to represent Holy Cross at a run/walk (I definitely walked) to support Fellowship of Christian Athletes, an organization that is very important to a number of our high school students. Additionally, I had the good fortune to chaperone for our summer high school mission trip to Indiannapolis along with Pastor Chris and Pastor Mark from Joy Lutheran. Then in the fall I had the chance to once again be the keynote speaker for our women's ministry retreat, this time at Lutherdale focusing on appreciating our voice as a sacred gift.

Faith Formation - Deaconess Katie Freund

Chapel

We're excited to now be offering chapel every Wednesday for our littles at CrossWays Preschool and Celebration! Childcare. Our schedule aligns with the local school calendar on a three-year rotation through the lessons. Throughout the school year children learn Bible stories as well as lessons from the curriculum's storybooks that focus on social emotional learning (SEL). These SEL lesson themes include making new friends and telling the truth. We use the *Frolic* curriculum paired with the "First Bible" from Sparkhouse.

Messy Church

For summer programming we reprised Messy Church, a unique ministry approach developed in Great Britain that we integrated into our monthly summer drive-in worship. This year, we went all in and utilized the full program for our worship services. This was used in scripture selection, sermon topics, musical choices, and special offerings and prayers. Following worship there was a meal and activities coordinating with the theme for adults and kids alike, including things like tabletop games, crafts, prayer stations, conversation prompts for families, and community art projects. Each "Messy Church" Sunday there was also take home resources provided that included activities (like a gratitude scavenger hunt) as well as family discussion guides and devotional prayers.

Sunday School

The 2022/23 Sunday School year wrapped up last spring with an Easter Eve celebration, and it surpassed our expectations! We wanted to put on a family program event that made the "Easter Vigil" accessible to kids. The Easter vigil is normally very "high church" with a lot of formal liturgy and several hours of somber scripture reading. Instead we took our kids through the building reenacting and telling the stories from the Hebrew Bible/Old Testament up through Easter. We had an amazing swell of volunteer support where members of the congregation worked for days (or in some cases weeks) building elaborate sets for our Bible story scenes. There was a whale so enormous I'm certain it could be called life -size, a veritable garden of Eden with towering palm trees, puppet shows and live actors, dancing full sized skeletons in the valley of dry bones, and an ark for Noah fully populated with stuffed animals the kids got to help load on. We had over 125 people come and kids still talk about what they saw a year later.

We kicked off the 2023/24 Sunday School year with Rally day! Registration for our Sunday School program opened and members of our church set up a whole host of lawn games for our children. From the start of rally day, this year continued the volunteerism and strong congregational support from our church.

This year's Sunday School theme has been "Journeying through the Bible", designed for kids from preschool through 5th grade. Held Sundays (following the local school calendars) we start with our Bible lesson all together before dividing into three age groups for games and crafts. This year we've shifted our start time from 9 am to 9:45 am, meaning that children participate in Sunday school during the 10 am worship service. After the lesson, music, and activities, kids are brought to the sanctuary to rejoin their families at the passing of the peace so families can be together during holy communion.

There is a lot of administrative work and project planning that went into fine tuning our Sunday School program this year. Changes were made to most everything, including registration, volunteer coordination, lesson planning, and feedback facilitation—and that's due to Val Maxwell taking on the task of coaching me in project management. Her guidance has made a clear impact on the effectiveness and quality of our Sunday School program. She also continues to teach me (both directly and by example) how to better coordinate and manage while leading others. I'm very grateful that Val was willing to put in so much time and effort in coaching me, and I'm also continuously impressed by our community that is so abundant with talented people.

Continuing that theme of talented people, we have our Sunday School shepherds as well as Carrie Mack (our children's music leader) and Jamey Mack (our volunteer piano accompanist for Sunday School) to thank for our great Christmas pageant this year. The attention to detail, ability to adapt, and intentionality in planning ahead all paid off. We're incredibly blessed to have a music teacher for our children's ministry—if you saw the pageant and the "tambourine" song, you know what I'm talking about. What a treat to have older kids with well rehearsed speaking parts, small children singing bravely from behind their older siblings, and kids who hadn't been able to rehearse still able to join in costume for that morning as background characters. This year our children really gave back to us, the church, by leading us in worship.

At the 4 pm "family service" on Christmas Eve we had a packed house filled with families, and kids were able to see the Christmas story shadow puppet show. What's more is they were given their own kits to take home which induced the supplies to make their own shadowbox theater and puppets, script included!

If you're still reading this you've heard me mention our Sunday School shepherds a few times, but honestly they can't be mentioned enough. These adults have volunteered to give their time and energy. This school year, the shift in program time means they have also given up their own Sunday morning time in church to help foster the faith of our kids. Our congregation believes in the work of ministry, and we step up and support each other. A way we have tried to express our gratitude to our shepherds is by giving them a (pretty short) book titled "Bible Stories for Grownups" and sending them

audio recordings with reflections on chapters within. My hope is not to give anyone "one more thing to do" - but to show that we truly see and appreciate the work they put into making Holy Cross a welcoming place for our kids to grow in their faith.

Family Ministry

Confirmation - Pastor Chris Neptun, Deaconess Katie Freund, Edwin Andrade

The 2022/23 confirmation year ended strongly with a field trip to the Oriental Institute museum at the University of Chicago campus and one night ending class with a game of giant inflatable "human whack a mole". We have closed the book on the three year long confirmation program, and the last class of the "old" format was confirmed alongside the first class of the "new" format. That meant we had over 30 kids who were confirmed on Reformation Sunday this year.

This fall we offered the first session of our "new" confirmation class, which is open to 6th, 7th, or 8th grade students. Confirmation is now seven weeks long with intensive three hour classes of instruction, devotion, and shared meal for seven Sunday evenings. We'll be offering fall and spring sessions, and the coursework includes assigned readings, homework, and weekly quizzes. The commitment is cut down from three years to seven weeks, but our hope is that we can model the expectation of full participation for our students when they choose to go through the confirmation process. But don't worry, we're not getting rid of the fun field trips and game nights. You'll still find these opportunities available to middle schoolers through our middle school youth group.

Youth Ministry

Emerge - Middle School Youth Group - Pastor Chris Neptun and Edwin Andrade

Holy Cross now has a middle school youth group named *Emerge!* Until this fall, middle school faith formation and fellowship occurred with instruction for Confirmation. Because the format for Confirmation instruction has changed and Edwin Andrade is our new Director of Youth and Family Ministries, Middle School ministry looks more like what we offer for our high school students through Crossroads. The idea behind the name *Emerge* is rooted in our commitment to our youth to read, learn, and share the Bible. We know these stories can spark their imaginations and curiosities. We want their faith to grow, shape their lives, and continue as they mature. As it did for the prophet Samuel, God speaks to us even at a young age, and Samuel responds, "Speak, your servant is listening." God is still speaking.

Emerge meets for three event types: INVITE, NURTURE, and SERVE.

INVITE – Come for a fun event and bring a friend.

NURTURE – Learn about Bible stories and how they apply to your life.

SERVE – Share your time and effort to make a difference.

Our students are much like we are, hungry for the more profound things of God. If you are a middle school student or a parent of one, we invite you to join us for the opportunity to discover the God who creates, loves, and walks alongside them.

Crossroads High School Youth Group - Pastor Chris Neptun and Edwin Andrade

The team feels the new governance structure and by-laws are set up to guide the future success of our programs. The updated by-laws were approved by the church council on August 9, 2023.

Fall brought the 2nd annual 'Fallin' into Fun' family fundraiser event. The event was held on Saturday September 30 at Holy Cross and offered food, a bounce house, the opportunity to take photos on a tractor, crafts and games for the kids, as well as vendors and a silent auction for the adults. LUTHERAN DISASTER RESPONSE

Lutheran Disaster Response shares God's hope, healing and renewal to people whose lives have been disrupted by disasters in the United States and around the world. When the dust settles and the headlines change, Lutheran Disaster Response stays to provide ongoing assistance to those in need.

Lutheran Disaster Response collaborates with other disaster response organizations and religious entities in the United States and around the world. This enables the greatest stewardship of resources and maximum impact of response. They are a welcome partner because they respect the perspectives and strengths of others.

They recognize that every disaster is local. Because of this, they believe every response needs to be rooted in the community; they work to accompany that community from immediate relief through long-term recovery. In their international work they partner closely with companion churches and other Lutheran and ecumenical relief agencies to make sure local needs are being addressed and met. In the United States, they work through their extensive affiliate network and other partners to address these same concerns.

Lutheran Disaster Response strives to help the church continue to be church in the midst of disaster—following Christ's call to bring hope and healing to our neighbor in need. Some key areas of work are listed below.

- Providing emotional and spiritual care for people who have been affected by a disaster and for leaders who respond to a disaster
- Coordinating volunteers through our local affiliates
- Assisting refugees in a holistic way by meeting the varied needs of the community
- Promoting disaster risk-reduction by helping communities build their assets thereby reducing the effects of likely disasters
- Providing long-term recovery efforts by addressing the unmet needs months or even years after a disaster strikes

Among the efforts supported by Lutheran Disaster Relief are:

U.S. Disasters

Whether it be flooding, hurricanes, severe storms, tornadoes or wildfires, Lutheran Disaster Response works with its partners to provide immediate relief, such as water, clothing, gift cards, tarps and other needs, as well as communicating with ELCA synods and community-based organizations to provide support on the long road to recovery with disaster case management, construction management, unmet needs, and emotional and spiritual care.

Middle East Crisis

As the conflict between Hamas and Israel continues, the humanitarian crisis in the Holy Land continues to worsen. More than half of Gaza's residents are displaced, and resources such as food, water and medical supplies are in short supply. The death toll has far surpassed those of previous conflicts in the region in recent decades.

The ELCA has a longstanding relationship with partners in the region, including the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Jordan and the Holy Land and Augusta Victoria Hospital. Lutheran Disaster Response has a history of providing support for our partners and will be prepared to answer calls for assistance when the time comes.

Eastern Europe Crisis Response

Millions of people fleeing the violence of Russia's war against Ukraine are moving toward Ukraine's western districts and such neighboring countries as Poland, Moldavia, Slovakia, Romania and Hungary. There are major humanitarian concerns for both internally displaced people and refugees. Many of the Ukrainians fleeing their homes need shelter and such basic necessities as food, water and toiletries. Care for people also includes pastoral and psychological support to address the trauma they've endured. Lutheran Disaster Response is accompanying our companions in Ukraine, Hungary, Poland, Romania, Slovakia, Moldova, Lithuania and the Czech Republic, as well as such ecumenical partners as the Lutheran World Federation and Church World Service, in their humanitarian responses to the crisis created by Russia's war against Likraine
