### Space to Discover God's Love in Our Lives

It is no secret that we are living in a time of significant change and uncertainty. This may be related to the pandemic we experienced. Perhaps the change was happening already. The events of the last three years brought this change into view for us. We may never know. Regardless, we do know life is different now.

This is true for nearly every aspect of life. Businesses have had change. The education sector has adapted. Healthcare, transportation, the service industry, public safety; every aspect of our lives has changed significantly since early 2020. It is also true for the church. Communities of faith from all traditions, practices, and denominations are adjusting. We are all figuring out where we go from here and what the church may look like going forward.

The times have changed. The technology has advanced. Even so, God's instruction to us remains the same. "Love Me and love one another." Easy, right? For me, this has been a struggle. I imagine it is for you and all who have followed Jesus. As humans, we strive to advance, to get better. Technology advances out of a desire to be better and to improve life. As it relates to faith, hope and love, technology has delivered a mixed bag. In some ways it has made it easier for us to love and in other ways it is easier to do harm to others and ourselves.

As life changes one thing continues to reveal itself to me; my need for God's grace, mercy and love and others' needs for it as well. Jesus' mandate to the disciples on the night he was betrayed was to "Love one another as I have loved you." (John 13:34) We are called to love in ways that do not make sense. Jesus asks us to love in ways that have others in mind first, in ways that don't benefit us at first glance, in ways we haven't loved before. How will we do that?

In the Acts of the Apostles, the believers of early church make space for God's Spirit and for people. Acts 2:43-47 says, "Awe came upon everyone, because many wonders and signs were being done by the apostles. All who believed were together and had all things in common; they would sell their possessions and goods and distribute the proceeds to all, as any had need. Day by day, as they spent much time together in the temple, they broke bread at home and ate their food with glad and generous hearts, praising God and having the goodwill of all the people. And day by day the Lord added to their number those who were being saved."

We love one another by making space for God's Spirit and others. We make space in our schedules, our hearts, our generosity, our minds, our homes, in all our lives. There is space for you and all in God's kingdom. Matthew's Gospel holds the Sermon on the Mount. This sermon includes the Beatitudes in which Jesus makes room for and blesses the poor in spirit, those who mourn, the meek, the ones who hunger and thirst, the merciful, pure in heart, peacemakers, the persecuted and us when we find ourselves being reviled, persecuted, and slandered on account of Jesus. It doesn't sound like blessing, just the opposite. Still, Jesus makes space for all.

At Holy Cross, our vision is to "Provide strength for the faith journey." To grow in strength requires space, space to experiment and try things out, space to learn and train, space to make mistakes and space to forgive and be forgiven. With the end of Epiphany and the beginning of Lent before us, I hope we discover together where God is being revealed in our lives and have space to grow into that.

### Astounded & Amazed

For the past several months I have been engaged in an email conversation with an individual who has been watching our online worship services. Initially, the comments were very inquisitive in their nature. It felt like there was a "back story" to their questions. I admit I was operating more from intuition than any actual facts. Finally, we developed enough "trust" capital that the conversation changed. It deepened and now there is this exchange between us that is uplifting and rich. I don't think we will ever meet in-person and while they know who I am and where I work, I know very little about their specifics. And, I am OK with that. I am still very careful of where these exchanges might be going. I don't think it is because I am suspicious but more about being curious.

Recently, they asked me... "If you were to make a list of the "hard things in life" that you have struggled with what would you put on your list?" My first thought was that this is very personal and unique to each of us. I must admit that this particular question astounded and amazed me and I actually said that to them in my reply. I sensed the time was right to engage on a deeper level and I asked them to share what they were thinking of.

For several weeks there was no response and I began to wonder if I was wrong in my assessment of where our conversation was going. Recently we have been exchanging emails again. We talk about how people can needlessly complicate the Christian life. We have exchanged ideas about how we struggle to know: What God wants us to do? What is God's will? How shall we hear God's voice and discern God's plan? We disagreed about moments in scripture and what they might mean and teach us. Like: Do justice. Love mercy. Walk humbly. Pray, listen, learn, and love. Break the bread, drink the wine, bear the burden, and share the peace. Love the Lord your God with all your heart, soul, mind, and strength. Love your neighbor as yourself. We agreed that the work of forgiveness is some of the hardest work we can do in our lives while it is at the same time some of the most important work we can do in this world. Hand-in-hand with forgiving is loving. It is equally hard to do. We have decided that you can't have one without the other.

I appreciate moments like these. I consider it an honor and a privilege to be invited into conversations like this. They are life giving and they help me appreciate that spiritual maturity requires movement from certainty to faith, from light to shadow, and, from power to vulnerability. Can you relate? And if you can, then, when was the last time God astounded and amazed you? Can you recall a time in the recent past when the presence of God in your life caught your attention and held it? When a sacred moment, encounter, word, image, or experience brought you to your knees? Were you astounded and amazed?

### A Year of Holy Days - Candlemas

I'm willing to bet most of us have never celebrated Candlemas before. This holy day comes from the Catholic tradition and it's a day to bless (you guessed it) candles. All the church candles for that year are prayed over, and families are invited to bring their own candles from home to be blessed as well. This might seem kind of silly today with everything running on abundant electricity; but remember that we are just now beginning to emerge from the darkest part of the year.

It's no coincidence that Candlemas is observed on February 2, the day after Brigid's Day—Lá Fhéile Bríde—the feast day of Ireland's only female patron saint on February 1. Historically this marks the beginning of spring and honors sacred flame, even before Christianity arrived in Europe. For us, this is the time of year to contemplate the statement of faith: "The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness does not overcome it." (John 1:5) In the Lutheran tradition, this brings to mind the liturgy for Holden evening prayer.

It's important to know that Candlemas is the same day as the Presentation of Our Lord. Taking place forty days after Christmas, this is when the infant Jesus was brought to the Jewish temple along with offerings to God. This was done according to the Torah for the purification ritual of Mary after childbirth as well as the redemption of the firstborn son. Think of it like a mother and child returning to the worshiping community after a maternity leave. We actually have historical practices like this in the Lutheran tradition. If you look up "churching of women", in Lutheran practice it would have been forty days after the birth when mother and child would return to church worship to give thanks—specifically for their survival of the birthing journey.

Matching this theology with the turn of the seasons, the beginning of February is when the church gives thanks for Christ, the one who ushers in eternal life and thaws our frozen hearts with God's eternal love—a gentle springtime for the soul as the sunlight returns. Think of Simeon, the priest of the temple holding the infant Jesus in his arms and calling this small child "a light to the world".

One last fun connection—February 2 is also commonly known as... (drumroll, please)... Groundhog Day. Thank you to our Pennsylvania Dutch siblings for this uniquely American tradition. Whoever looked at a marmot and thought "I can use that to predict the passing of the seasons" sure was industrious.

May your season be blessed, your candles trimmed, and your shadows grow shorter.

### Pastor Bob's Sabbatical Leave

The sabbatical leave is the final phase of the "Path Forward" transition plan at Holy Cross. It is a three month period beginning March 1, 2023 and concluding on May 31, 2023. What is a sabbatical? It is not a vacation. A sabbatical is an extended period of time away from work that allows for a different pace/rhythm from work responsibilities and a time for study and reflection. During this time, the individual is still employed and paid. While Pastor Bob is on his sabbatical leave, he will not be available for pastoral responsibilities. He will return on June 1, 2023 and move into a part-time role as Pastor Emeritus at Holy Cross through May 31, 2024.

Here is a historical overview of how we got to this moment. A great deal of thoughtfulness and conversation went into the pastoral leadership transition plan. In 2019 Pastor Bob began a conversation with the Staff Support Team and the Church Council about the future leadership needs of Holy Cross. The conventional approach when pastoral change occurs is for the current pastor to resign from the called position and then leave the congregation. The expectation is that the pastor would no longer be a member of the congregation or provide any pastoral support. The church leadership began exploring other options and proposed a different transition plan. After consultation with the Bishop's office of the Metropolitan Chicago Synod the idea was presented to the congregation in January 2020. The Covid pandemic impacted the process in March 2020 and we took a pause. A Call Committee was formed in the first quarter of 2021. The church council and call committee updated the position description and began working with the Bishop's office. Rev. Chris Neptun started his tenure as the new senior pastor at Holy Cross in June 2022. ### The Refreshing Gift of a Meal Together

There are over 860 passages in the Bible that reference a meal or eating, highlighting how important food is to our existence. It would be a mistake though to think that these passages are only about people addressing their daily need for sustenance. When Jesus mentions hungering and thirsting no more, he isn't just alluding to our physical appetites, but also our spiritual cravings, human frustrations, and discontent.

Soon after we are born, most of us are blessed to receive the first gifts of life: love, a smile, a hug, eye contact, and food. While simple, these gifts satisfy on many different levels that are not just physical. In some respects, we spend the rest of our lives yearning for these same basic things: unconditional affirmation of who we are, belonging, and heartfelt connection to others.

What is it about eating together and sharing a meal that promotes bonding and wellbeing? When we take in food in the presence of another person, amazingly we seem to take in something of that person too. Not surprisingly, mealtimes were when Jesus chose to communicate some of his most important teachings to his followers. Of all the things Jesus could have been doing with his disciples the night before his crucifixion, eating supper is what they did. The sacrament of Holy Communion is derived from that Last Supper, tapping into the mysterious relationship between Jesus, food, community, and salvation.

Perhaps it isn't a shock what social science tells us about the value of eating together with our children? Kids who regularly eat dinner with their families have lower probabilities of drinking, smoking, drug use, pregnancy, suicide, and eating disorders. It's profound that many of the things we worry about as parents can be positively affected by something as straightforward as preparing a meal, and then sitting down and eating together. Most likely these benefits are not just reserved for kids but are there for adults as well.

I hope this year affords you more chances to be blessed by sharing meals with others. Please watch the Holy Cross newsletter and calendar for opportunities for table fellowship including men's breakfasts, soup suppers, and more.

## Lutheran School of Theology at Chicago....Community Learning

Members from Holy Cross joined with others from around the country in the Fall 2022 for a class on ecumenical and interfaith relationships led by Dr. Mark Swanson. Another session is being offered beginning in February 2023. There is no cost involved.

The next offering is: **Martin Luther on the Holy Spirit and the Christian Life** by Dr. Candace Kohli, Assistant Professor of Systematic Theology at the Lutheran School of Theology at Chicago.

Do Lutherans shout justification and whisper sanctification? This question suggests an over emphasis on Christ and justification in Luther's theology and its reception in modern Lutheranism. Luther actually had much to say in the final decade of his career about the third Person of the Trinity, the Holy Spirit, and the Spirit's role in the Christian life. In many ways, in fact, Luther's late "discovery" of the Spirit helped him to answer unresolved questions inherent in his doctrine of justification alone by faith alone, such as the ongoing role of the law in the Christian life, ethical and moral foundations for a life lived in community, and what really happens to the soul in justification. For Luther the Christian life was a life lived in and with the Spirit in thought, word, and deed?

Week 1: A Trinitarian Pneumatology: The Spirit as divine agent of the law and gift of the gospel

Week 2: Did you say "sanctification"? The Spirit as Christ's healing medicine for the soul

Week 3: Fanning Spiritual Flames: The role of prayer in the Spirit-soul relation

Week 4: Christians Do Good Works! The role of the Spirit in supporting the Christian life





The importance of reading is crucial in the early years. There are so many benefits that come with children being exposed to books as well as being read to. Included in the benefits of reading with children are: developing a bond with them, improving their language skills, creativity and imagination, supporting their cognitive development, and creating a lifelong love for reading. Within our book study, children will learn to ask "what's next" questions and make predictions. Children can learn important life lessons and relate to characters and situations. Reading at school and home will also help our children to be more prepared for kindergarten. Jessica Logan, a member of Ohio State's Crane Center for Early Childhood Research and Policy\* said that children who are exposed to reading early on "are likely to pick up reading skills more quickly and easily."



### Composting\* A Way of Renewal

Last month's article highlighted different types of home gardening projects to consider. Soil is an important aspect to the health and success of gardens and composting is an effective way to add to the soil's health as well as to reduce the



amount of waste going to the landfill. Here is information about composting to help you start or expand composting at home.

- Composting is a process of microorganisms breaking down food scraps and other organic materials into healthy soil.
- Food scraps and yard waste together make-up about 30% of what gets thrown away and sent to the landfill. According to a 2020 report by the Natural Resources Defense Council, only about 6% of food waste is composted in the United States.^
- Composting keeps materials out of the landfill and uses those materials to make good soil and helps to eliminate the need for chemical fertilizers.
- There are a few ways to compost. The most common way is to set up at-home composting. If you are not able to set up home composting but want to keep food scraps and other organic material out of the landfill check with your local municipality to see if local compost pick-up services are offered.


