
The Gift of Another Year...

At the beginning of 2021, here are a few questions to ponder.

When you pray, when you open the pages of Scripture, what are you looking for? When you think about church what are you hoping for? Are we looking for *anything*, or are we just going through the motions of a religious life we inherited from our family of origin? Are we seeking consolation? Affirmation? Belonging? Certainty?

Are you looking to gain power, or to surrender it? Which comes first? Action? Contemplation? Do you start with your heart and mind or in the world? Are you looking to arrive, or to journey?

As you might imagine, there are no 'right or wrong' responses to these questions. There are only the responses that hold truth and have meaning for our life. There is, of



Looking. Seeing. Finding. These are the things we are called to do, not once, but over and over again as people of faith, as children of God and as Christians. This is the heart of discipleship, not to hasten the end of our search, but to pursue it ever more deeply and intentionally. To cultivate a willingness to consider a different perspective and worldview. A willingness to see and be seen. A willingness to tell the truth about what we have found. A willingness to venture forth again, even when we don't know exactly what we are supposed to be looking for.

The invitation of Jesus to "come and see" is an invitation to leave our comfortable vantage points, and dare to believe that just maybe, we have been limited and wrong in our certainties about each other, about God, and about the world. To "come and see" is to approach all of life with a grace-filled curiosity, to believe that we are holy mysteries to each other, worthy of further exploration. To come and see is to enter into the joy of being deeply seen and deeply known, and to have the very best that lies hidden within us called out and called forth.

Honestly, this is a very selective process. We have choices when it comes to what we look for, what we prioritize, what we name, and what we call out in each other. The selves we present to the world are layered and messy, and it takes both love and patience to sift through those layers and find what lies at the core. But there is great power in that sifting, too. Something healing and holy happens to us when we are deeply seen, known, named, and accepted.

What do you suppose Jesus would see if he were to take a look at each of us? Would Jesus see us for who we are and what lies beneath the fumbling, the fear, the mixed motives, and the doubts? I would like to think that each of us would benefit from a second look. To offer that second look, that deeper, kinder, and more penetrating look, is grace. It is the gracious vision of Jesus, and it is the vision we are called to practice in a world that too often judges and condemns at first glance. Is there anything that feels lonelier than the experience of being unseen, misunderstood, and prematurely dismissed? And is there anything more life-giving than the experience of being seen for who we really are, deep down beneath the fragile defenses we hold up out of fear? It is when we have been loved right down to the core of who we are that we find the capacity to embrace other people as Jesus embraced every sinner, every doubter, and every believer who crossed his path.

May 2021 be a year when we gain more clarity about what we are looking for so we will know when we find it.

Introducing the Director of Operational Ministries - Steve Oelschlager

Holy Cross is a significant organization with lots of moving parts. In a "normal" year, we employ 45-60 people and steward a roughly \$2.7 million budget to operate the church and our early childhood ministries. While Holy Cross is not a business, we have many things in common with how companies work, including staff, property, budgets, risk-management concerns, and more. Our members and supporters rightly expect that Holy Cross will make vibrant ministry happen, from



pastoral care to worship, faith formation, as well as external outreach and partnerships affecting the community and larger world.

I'm excited to announce that I will be serving as your first Director of Operational Ministries. As Holy Cross reimagines how we make ministry happen, we are trying to restructure responsibilities so that our pastors can focus less on administrative and operational tasks and more on pastoral/ spiritual duties. This new full-time position is about living into that goal. Our church council approved the job and my hiring in October, and December 1 was my first day.

Why me? I have been a member and active participant at Holy Cross since 1997, served on church council, as treasurer, on the finance team, and most recently as the Director of Generosity and Engagement. For the last eight years, I have also worked for our denomination, the ELCA, in stewardship and resources for vital congregations. Before the ELCA, I was an entrepreneur for over 20 years, working with businesses on marketing, communications, and technology solutions. I have an undergraduate degree in engineering, a master's degree in economics, and a lifetime of experience in the church.

At their best, I believe that a life of faith and organized religion offer something of profound value to everyone. It's no surprise to say that as our world and culture become more secular, smaller percentages of the population are resonating with religion's value add. The challenge is to keep looking for new ways to connect with people, support them spiritually, be relevant, and operate at the highest levels of efficiency and impact.

Jesus: The Source of Our Vision

Our attempts to follow Jesus are primarily about aligning ourselves to his alternative vision, his distinct picture of truth, reality, and existence. Jesus gave his vision a name, "the Kingdom of God," and claimed that it already was present, underway, although still in process. Jesus taught us to pray that his vision might be fully known "on earth as it is in heaven." Why? Because Jesus' vision is the way, the truth, and the pathway to life. Ultimately Jesus reimagined life rooted in love, mercy, grace, hospitality, inclusion, kindness, generosity, non-violence, and justice. Jesus' ministry articulated God's dream for people, for creation that multiplies health, flourishing, and well-being. Jesus' ministry was more than just words, however. He also modeled for us the choices and behaviors that would make this dream come true. And, Jesus believed his vision is not only worth dying for, but it's also worth living for.

Still, it will also be the wisest investment we ever make, full of meaning, purpose, and fulfillment.

Entering this new year, I continue to be excited about our faith community here at Holy Cross and for all of you. We have so much potential to be about the things that Jesus envisioned, to move the needle toward health and well-being through the things we do together, and through all the little ways we engage with life 24/7/365. Holy Cross is at its best when we can ground our vision in Jesus' vision, when we can learn to see the world and life as Jesus saw them, and when we can inspire each other to keep choosing this way of life. I'm grateful to be on this journey with all of you, and I look forward to continuing to invest with you in a vision worth living for.

Access Your Giving Statements in Church Community Builder




Holy Cross will continue to mail out giving statements periodically. Still, if you want to retrieve yours on your own, you can generate one for any period in the last seven years through our new church management system, Church Community Builder (CCB). Using CCB and setting up an account is not a requirement, only an invitation for a better link between Holy Cross and you and your family. Downloading your giving statement is one example of the benefit of getting connected.

If you do not yet have a login and would like to use CCB, you can request an account at this link: bit.ly/HC_CCB_signup Once you submit the form, an email will typically be sent to you within one weekday with a link to activate your login.

When you can log in, click the circle with your picture or initials in the top-right corner to see your profile. Click the link near the top for "Involvement" and then make sure the "Financial" check-box is selected. You will then be able to see a tile further down the page that is titled "Financial." When you roll over the Financial tile, you will see three dots in the upper-right corner that will give you the menu options to generate your statement. Click the menu option for "Giving Statement" and go from there.

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A Look at Epiphany

January is named after the Roman god with two faces, Janus. One of his faces looked forward while the other looked backward, so it was deemed appropriate by a sage to utilize his name for this time when we indeed ponder the year behind us and then look to the one ahead. At the risk of being deemed heretical, I shall submit that Epiphany functions similarly in our liturgical calendar as January does in our secular. In other words, at the start of Epiphany we are recognizing the arrival of Jesus, while by the end of this season, we are anticipating Lent.

We celebrate the start of Epiphany on January 6 by recalling the visit of the Wise Men to the baby Jesus. One way we do this musically is with the familiar carol "We Three Kings of Orient Are," which it may surprise you to learn is not in our "cranberry" hymnal, the ELW, and is not in the old green LBW either. I can only surmise that Lutherans picked up this carol from its straying into the secular world or from visiting an Episcopal church whose present and previous hymnals (1982 and 1940) contain "We Three Kings." I hasten to add that the hymnals of both churches have "As with Gladness Men of Old," the text of which was written in 1860 in England and first appeared in a British hymnal in 1861. The "men of old" here refers to the Wise Men.

Easily my favorite Epiphany hymn is "Brightest and Best of the Stars," whose title, of course, presents the Star over the manger at Bethlehem. In a word, the text is descriptive and the music, at least to me, is grand.

There is a quiet song that appears in the Christmas section of our ELW that we could sing every Sunday during Epiphany and rejoice inwardly at doing so. I refer to "In the Bleak Midwinter," whose tune is lovely and whose text includes my favorite verse in all of Christendom: "What can I give him, poor as I am? If I were a shepherd, I would bring a lamb; if I were a wise man, I would do my part; yet what I can I give him—give him my heart." This is from a poem by Christina Rossetti (1830-1894), born in London. From the John Julian Dictionary of Hymnology, p. 978: "Miss Rossetti's verses are profoundly suggestive and lyrical, and deserve a larger place than they occupy in the hymnody of the church. Her sonnets are among the finest in the English language."

The "lamb" referred to in the third line of the verse just quoted anticipates the singing during Lent of the opening chorus of Handel's Messiah, part II, which declares "Behold the Lamb of God that takes away the sin of the world." And then there is the exquisite anthem by John Tavener simply entitled "The Lamb," which is a setting of a poem by William Blake. A line therefrom: "For he calls himself a Lamb."

The same creative man who used the analogy of "evergreens" to describe texts such as the parables of Jesus, the *Iliad*, and the writings of Shakespeare (which I mentioned in my December newsletter column) declared that Jesus was able to feed the 5,000 people because He "thought differently" than His disciples and the other people around Him. Likewise, I would ask you to think differently about Epiphany. It is not just an indeterminate amount of time between Christmas and Lent during which we can look forward and backward to that which has been and may be. Rather it is a period of blessing during which we can explore His creation like a fawn in a field, curious yet cautious, looking if not seeing, trying not to fall.

Eagle Scout Projects at Holy Cross



The "Sermon on the Mount" is the presentation of Jesus as a new Moses who interprets the Torah, who offers wisdom sayings on how to live the way God wants, and, who provides practical instruction. This work is more than just the beatitudes. When we go deeper into understanding Jesus' Jewish context and Jewish message, we are able to make more sense of Jesus' teaching. Jesus' teaching reminds us that the kingdom of heaven is already available to us and manifested when we live into God's will on earth.

Each Gospel has a signature story. For Luke, it's the synagogue sermon in chapter 4. For Mark, it's the double healing of the blind man in chapter 8, which precedes Peter's confession. For John, it's the prologue, "In the beginning was the Word." For Matthew, the signature story is "the Sermon on the Mount" in chapters 5-7.

DVD support material will be provided by Amy-Jill Levine, the University Professor of New Testament and Jewish Studies at Vanderbilt Divinity School and College of Arts and Sciences. 


Plastic Cap Project Completion

Our Mission:


To build a foundation for life-long faith formation that is grounded in God the Trinity, connected to peers, supported by parents, and nurtured by congregational members.

Quilting News

On November 24, 2020, ten quilts were delivered to the COOL Ministries offices in Waukegan. The quilts were given to families residing in their Family Housing program. The Holy Cross quilting group, completed seven quilts in late 2019 and early 2020 before they stopped meeting to sew in mid-March 2020. Deb Sherrock created two twin-sized quilts during the 'stay-at-home' summer and included another from her stash of completed quilts to help meet our ten-quilt goal. The group also made three smaller quilts that were donated to Project Linus, an organization that provides blankets to comfort children who are seriously injured, traumatized, or in need.

In past years, the quilts would grace the altar and side windows of the sanctuary one Sunday in the fall for members of the congregation to see the beauty this group creates. Since we could not meet for in-person worship, the quilt display did not occur in 2020. Also, the entire quilting group of five ladies usually participates in the quilt delivery to COOL. This year, one person delivered the quilts.

It is unknown when we will gather again to sew as a group (we usually met on Wednesday mornings from 9 am to noon in the resource center in the basement of the west wing). Currently members of the group have sewing 'assignments' to work on blocks for a quilt which will be assembled once the blocks are completed. Others are making entire quilts working alone at home.

If you have quilt tops that you no long want or need, or have sewn a quilt top that you would like to be donated to a good cause, consider giving it to the quilting group. Donations of 100% cotton fabric, either scrap pieces or yardage, are always welcome.

Because we were unable to host our annual Cookie Walk event to benefit the folks at Two Strike, we launched 'Project Reindeer Rosebud' to help us guide our way through the fog of Covid-19 to bring Christmas to every girl and boy (age or at heart!) at the Rosebud reservation in South Dakota.



Project Reindeer Rosebud was an exceptional success. We were able to donate a total of \$4,000 to several ministries in Rosebud. They include: Tree of Life Ministry, where they serve food daily to over 300 families and were in need of disposable food containers to continue their valuable ministry; Panther's Clothes Closet, a part of the Rosebud Elementary School, which provides both clothing and food to every student throughout the year; and because we were so successful, we also donated to The Boys and Girls Club of America in Rosebud, which provides transportation and extracurricular activities to their youth. We also financially support our missionary, Dorothy Peterson, as she continues to support families on the reservation. We are thrilled to be able to collaborate with these ministry partners and bring them joy and hope this holiday season.

From your overwhelming and generous donations, we raised over \$8,000! We could not have accomplished this effort without YOU! Thank you!

Going forward, these funds will be used next year for projects on the Rosebud reservation and for the Lakota people who face many obstacles on the reservation.
