

A congregation of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America In James Thurber's classic short story "The Secret Life of Walter Mitty," the titular character is portrayed as an ordinary, unremarkable man who often escapes his mundane life through daydreams of heroic adventures. Over the years, this character has been portrayed in various movie adaptations, each with its unique storyline. While the adaptations differ significantly from the original story, they all share one common element: Walter Mitty's tendency to dream rather than engage with reality.

Is there a similarity between Walter Mitty's daydreaming and the anticipation surrounding the seasons of Advent and Christmas? In a world filled with hope, joy, love, and peace, we are encouraged to actively prepare for the



Advent marks a time of anticipation and active preparation for the arrival of the Christ child. It is a season filled with hope, where we eagerly await the birth of Jesus, not only in Bethlehem over 2,000 years ago but also within our hearts. This period serves as a reminder that Jesus comes for all of us, and his presence is not limited to a historical event.

As we enter Advent and Christmas, we prepare to experience Christ in tangible ways, not merely hearing and remembering ancient stories only to return to life as usual. Too often, our approach resembles Walter Mitty's, where our expectations and hopes result in little or no change. However, God is inviting us to realize the reality of God's Kingdom.

Reflecting on the world in which Jesus was born, we find that the marginalized, the hungry, the sick, and the poor all yearn for deliverance from their afflictions. The tax collectors longed for honor and belonging and the people under Roman rule dreamed of freedom. Even the shepherds, often viewed as unruly and dangerous in Jesus' time, hoped to be seen without prejudice.


In Luke's Gospel, it is intriguing that the first announcement of Jesus' birth was made to the shepherds. These unlikely recipients of the angel's message were entrusted with the "good news of great joy for all nations." Perhaps God chose the shepherds because their role involved watching, waiting, guiding, and acting when needed. Their response, "Let's go now to Bethlehem and see this thing that has taken place, which the Lord has made known to us," exemplifies their faith's active and immediate nature.

Walter Mitty's tendency to daydream hindered him from living the exciting life he longed for. Similarly, wistfully reminiscing about the birth of Jesus in Bethlehem or fantasizing about some future event of Christ's return can keep us from experiencing the abundant life God intends for us today.

The message of Advent and Christmas is clear: the God who saves has come, is coming, and will come again. Faith, in its essence, requires active preparation. Christ has come, Christ is coming, and Christ will come again. We must be vigilant and ready for His presence in our daily lives.

This Advent and Christmas, my prayer is that we embrace the reality of Christ's presence. Join in worship, not just on Christmas Eve, but at every opportunity. Engage with Jesus by participating in ministries that serve the marginalized and underprivileged. As we actively prepare, we can experience the wonder of Christ's coming in the here and now. Christ has come, Christ is coming, Christ will come again. Amen, amen, amen.

Let us go now and see,

A Year of Holy Days: Santa Lucia Day/Slaughter of the Innocents

It's "that" time of year, and it's pretty much impossible to think of Christmas time without children being somehow involved. There's kids Christmas pageants, nutcracker ballets, toys, and escapades in the snow. Even if you are a total scrooge and hate children, your miniature porcelain Christmas village isn't complete until you have that magnetic frozen lake with kids skating in their hats and mittens. Or, even if you hate all that nostalgia... you can't escape the child at the center of this holiday lying in a manger. There is no season of Christmas without children.

An idyllic example of this is December 13, the feast day of St. Lucia or Saint Lucy's Day. If you were raised in an Italian or Scandinavian religious background, you might be familiar with the image of a young girl playing the part of saint Lucy. Portraying the image of a young girl bringing forth the light of Christ into darkness, during the winter solstice a girl has a winter wreath with lit candles placed on her head (definitely a fire hazard). Some countries say it's saint Lucy who leaves presents, others have a girl voted to be "Lucy that year" and lead a procession and songs in the church service.

In this darkest time of the year, and looking to the brightness of faith our children provide is indeed a blessing. But, relying too heavily on nostalgia can mean blocking out the brutal realities of this world. Realities that even children face. Just two weeks after the feast day of Saint Lucy will come December 28, the day we remember the slaughter of the innocents. The Gospel of Matthew lay bare the terror of Herod ordering the murder of all boys under the age of two in the greater Bethlehem area. Different Christian traditions have different numbers for how many children died by Herod's command, ranging from 20 to 144,000 children (and four other traditions with counts in between).

It's disorienting, looking at abstract numbers to represent the lives of children lost while kids play outside my window all bundled up in the sunshine. This is not a historic drama thousands of years in the past. Just two weeks ago, the number of children who have died this year in Gaza was at 3,700—the pictures and videos that have been shared are horrifying. That number has gone up since I started writing this two weeks ago, and as of November 14 the count has surpassed 4,500 children. What will it be by the time you are reading this newsletter? What will it be by Christmas? More than the number of innocents killed by Herod? Depending on who's counting...

Even if our hearts cannot bear to witness the horrors of the world, a safe way to stretch into this day of mourning would be to look up the original lyrics of "Coventry Carol", written as if a lullaby of another Bethlehem mother (not Mary) who is singing a goodbye to her child before he is found by Herod's soldiers.

It's Christmas time. That means in the midst of this horror, God comes down. God came down to be with us in this heartbreaking world. And we are reminded that "the light shines in the darkness, and the darkness does NOT overcome it"—that doesn't mean we won't feel overcome sometimes. It means we know that it shouldn't be this way. It means we have a source of strength to pull from so we can push back with our own little lights. Hold them dearly, wear them as a crown, just don't let anyone blow them out.





- Use your bank's bill pay system by Friday, December 29.

- Bring your gift to the church office by Friday, December 29. Due to the holiday schedule, if you choose to bring your gift to the church office, please call first to confirm that someone is here, or drop your gift into the locked portion of the brown mailbox.

We thank you for your continued support of God's ministries through Holy Cross. We would not be able to do what we do without people like you who generously give to our congregation.

Multiply Your Impact Through Holy Cross and Minimize Taxes Too

If you are 70 1/2 years old or older, you have even more options to make a difference through Holy Cross while minimizing your taxes. You can give up to \$100,000 from your IRA directly to a qualified organization like Holy Cross without having to pay income taxes on the money. This law no longer has an expiration date, so you are free to make annual gifts, this year, and well into the future.

Why consider this gift?

- You pay no income taxes on the gift. The transfer generates neither taxable income nor a tax deduction, so you benefit even if you do not itemize your deductions.

Perceiving God at Work

Do you see God at work, not just when you are attending worship, but throughout the week, in the morning, afternoon, and evening? Not just today but also in the past, with expectations to see God at work in the future? Not just out there, but at work through each of us including you? In his book Love Wins, Rob Bell writes this about God's life-giving power at work:

"There is an energy in the world, a spark, an electricity that everything is plugged into. The Greeks called it 'Zoe,' the mystics call it 'Spirit,' and Obi-Wan called it 'the Force.'

How does the sun give off that much energy and yet still regenerate itself at the same time? How do bees know to take that pollen from that flower over there and put it over here in this one? Why does my lawn have brown patches where I can't get the grass to grow, while five feet away grass grows through the cracks in the concrete in the driveway, grass much like the grass I wish would grow in those brown patches?

This energy, spark, and electricity that pulses through all of creation sustains it, fuels it, and keeps it going. Growing, evolving, reproducing, making more.

In many traditions, this energy is understood to be impersonal. Much like the Force in Star Wars, it has no name or face or personality. It's assumed to be indifferent to us. Our joy, meaning, and happiness are simply irrelevant. It does its thing; we do ours.

This is not, however, how things are explained in the creation poem that begins the Bible. In this poem, the energy that gives life to everything is called the "Word of God," and it is for us. God speaks... and it happens. God says it... and it comes into being. Before, it's chaotic and empty and dark. But then God speaks into that dark disorder radiant, pulsating life with all of its wonder and diversity and creativity. Order out of chaos. Life and light out of darkness and emptiness."

May we be ever aware of God's life-giving force, God with us, this Christmas, in the new year, and throughout our lives.

Beware of Online Fraud (Phishing)!

We have recently become aware that scammers have again reached out to some of our members representing themselves as Holy Cross staff. This is a reminder that neither the pastors nor any other Holy Cross staff members will contact you via email or text to ask for your help to purchase gift cards or send money to any third parties.

Whenever there is any question about whether a request you have received is authentic, please call the church office first at (847) 367-4060 to verify the authenticity. Never reply to a suspicious email or click on any link in an email or text you receive unless you are certain where it has come from, even if it appears to have been sent by someone you know. It is always a safer practice to take the extra time to verify that any messages you receive are legitimate than to fall victim to cyber criminals attempting to take advantage of us, especially during the busy holiday season.

Although the whole event is condensed into about one hour, the memories made will last a lifetime.

Thanksgiving is more than just a holiday; it's a reminder to be thankful every day for the simple things in life. Whether it's a warm meal, a roof over our heads, or the love of family and friends, we all have something to be grateful for. This Thanksgiving, take a moment to express your gratitude to those around you. 
We need shepherds for the next leg of our journey!




