#### It's Called Maturity...

We seem to forget a fundamental truth these days... learning to live in relationship with difference is called maturity. This is not a new insight. The Bible offers us a helpful perspective on the subject. St. Paul in his letter to the Ephesians believes that living into a spiritual maturity requires making plenty of room for all of God's children and their different views. It is part of God's vision for the whole human family that we learn



to live together in love and charity, with all of our differences, holding onto our integrities, and yet being able to be in relationship with one another as children of God, made in God's image and likeness while celebrating the variety of our thoughts.

There is no denying that we find ourselves living in a tender spiritual moment in history. There is a tension between feeling our need for re-grounding and healing on both a personal and a communal level. We are living in a reality that calls for social repair and unity that is viewed with suspicion and an understandable wariness. Recent years have been bruising all around.

I have people ask what will bring healing to the situations that we find ourselves in and create transformational moments in the way we treat each other. Jesus used a particular approach to go around the defenses that people often put in the way of breaking through disagreements about really important and significant matters. He would tell a parable. Often in the telling of a parable Jesus would assist people to engage in conversation without suggesting that every point of disagreement necessarily needs to be weaponized.

I remember a quote attributed to Booker T. Washington... "Never let any person drag you so low as to hate them." And, Dr. King once said, "We will either learn to live together as sisters and brothers, or we will perish together as fools." Both of these thoughts stand upon the truth that Jesus of Nazareth believed in the kind of love that actually can change personal life and social life. I think it is interesting that when one speaks of love, there is this sense that we are talking about something soft. But in fact, what we know about the kind of love that Jesus is encouraging us to practice is that it may be one of the most difficult things of all. It turns out that loving one another is about learning how to disagree and still stay in relationship.

We have more in common than what we may initially consider. What if we reimagine the purpose of our conversations? What if we actually took the time to come together, and not with the purpose of debating the merits of a particular issue? What if we invited each other to engage the issue not from trying to convince the other, but, rather, by telling each other the story of your life that brought you to the conclusion that you happen to hold? This approach shifts everything. It creates common ground, because everyone has a story. Whenever someone reveals the story of their life, we come to appreciate that ground that they are standing on as holy ground. The same holy ground that informs our beliefs and ideas.

I believe that the scriptures call us to both hold on to our convictions while not ignoring our differences. We may be tempted to lose sight of the fact that we are not to pretend but be honest and authentic with one another. Scripture reminds us to practice kindness and active love even towards those individuals who disagree with us completely. The prophet Micah (Old Testament) reveals to us the idea that justice without mercy and justice without love often turns into revenge. Revenge is not the way God intends for us to honor our relationships. This type of behavior is not the transformation that we long for and does not reflect the vision of what God dreams for all of us.

I believe we all want to be better people. Being a better person requires effort and living into something we call maturity.

#### Traveling the Way of Love: Practices for a Jesus Centered Life


You're invited to join with other people of faith during Lent 2021 to explore and discover insights into seven spiritual practices: Turn-Learn-Play-Worship-Bless-Go-Rest.

Our midweek Lenten worship services consist of scripture, prayer, music, an inspirational video and a message via Zoom sessions and are approximately 30-35 minutes in length. Following each midweek Lenten service there is an optional opportunity to participate in an informal conversation group. Holy Cross promotes the idea that while our faith is personal, it is not private. We offer a variety of opportunities for discernment and reflection that builds off of the hope that greater clarity is achieved through group conversation and sharing. If you desire to participate in the optional small group discussion following the midweek worship service there will be break out groups assigned for approximately 30 minutes. These groups will discuss the theme that was presented during the midweek Lenten worship service.

#### **REST**

Receive the gift of God's grace, peace, and restoration

Peace I leave with you; my peace I give you. I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled and do not be afraid.

– John 14:27

From the beginning of creation, God has established the sacred pattern of going and returning, labor and rest. Especially today, God invites us to dedicate time for restoration and wholeness - within our bodies, minds, and souls, and within our communities and institutions. By resting we place our trust in God, the primary actor who brings all things to their fullness.

#### WORSHIP

Gather in community to thank, praise, and dwell with God

When he was at the table with them, he took bread, blessed and broke it, and gave it to them. Then their eyes were opened, and they recognized him – Luke 24:30-31a

When we worship, we gather with others before God. We hear the Good News of Jesus Christ, give thanks, confess, and offer the brokenness of the world to God. As we break bread, our eyes are opened to the presence of Christ. By the power of the Holy Spirit, we are made one body, the body of Christ sent forth to live the Way of Love.

#### TURN

Pause, listen, and choose to follow Jesus

As Jesus was walking along, he saw Levi son of Alphaeus sitting at the tax booth, and he said to him "Follow me." And he got up and followed him.

– Mark 2:14

Like the disciples, we are called by Jesus to follow the Way of Love. With God's help, we can turn from the powers of sin, hatred, fear, injustice, and

oppression toward the way of truth, love, hope, justice, and freedom. In turning, we reorient our lives to Jesus Christ, falling in love again, again, and again.

#### **PRAY**

Dwell intentionally with God each day

He was praying in a certain place, and after he had finished, one of his disciples said to him, "Lord, teach us to pray, as John taught his disciples." – Luke 11:1

Jesus teaches us to come before God with humble hearts, boldly offering our thanksgivings and concerns to God or simply listening for God's voice in our lives and in the world. Whether in thought, word or deed, individually or corporately, when we pray we invite and dwell in God's loving presence.

#### GO

Cross boundaries, listen deeply and live like Jesus

Jesus said to them again, "Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I send you." – John 20:21

As Jesus went to the highways and byways, he sends us beyond our circles and comfort, to witness to the love, justice, and truth of God with our lips and with our lives. We go to listen with humility and to join God in healing a hurting world. We go to become Beloved Community, a people reconciled in love with God and one another.

#### **LEARN**

Reflect daily on Scripture, especially on Jesus' life and teachings

"Those who love me will keep my word, and my Father will love them, and we will come to them and make our home with them." — John 14:23

By reading and reflecting on Scripture, especially the life and teachings of Jesus, we draw near to God and God's word dwells in us. When we open our minds and hearts to Scripture, we learn to see God's story and God's activity in everyday life.

On January 31 we held our annual meeting virtually. We had a wonderful turnout considering the circumstances of these pandemic times. We conducted the necessary business that we needed to accomplish. Holy Cross' leadership works throughout the year to provide information and transparency that makes it possible for everyone to be engaged in the ministries of the congregation.



On a personal note, at the annual meeting I shared some transitional news about my role at Holy Cross. In 2021 I will celebrate 41 years of ordained ministry and service to the Evangelical Lutheran Church. It is my privilege and honor to have served 30 of those years at Holy Cross. In 2020 I initiated a conversation with our Staff Support team and the Church Council about continuing to be thoughtful and attentive to the staffing needs of Holy Cross. My hope is to position our congregation in a way that provides for continuity and stability moving forward. We have come to an initial agreement that over the next 24 months we would begin a journey that results in the transition of my role from full time to part time. Our current pastoral vacancy will take on a new focus as we begin the search for an individual who would serve as a co-pastor for a period of time and then assume senior pastor responsibilities. I am excited and grateful for this moment and opportunity to continue to add value to the ministry of Holy Cross and its path forward.

You play a critical role in discerning 'a path forward.' 2020 was the 40<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Holy Cross. The congregation officially organized in April 1980. Throughout these 40 years Holy Cross has grown into our vision of "providing strength for the faith journey" by being relevant and imaginative in our various ministries. Our generative culture as a congregation has set us on a strategic path that relies on us being honest about the opportunities and challenges facing us as people of faith. As always, we value your thoughts and input on what is essential to the health of our life together.

We are facilitating opportunities for conversations to take place through virtual 'focus groups' through March 15. If needed we will add additional dates. We are providing another opportunity to participate in an online survey beginning March 1. See details about both of these opportunities in the next column. Please be involved in these opportunities as your voice matters. Be aware that these are time sensitive opportunities.

Prior to the pandemic I had a **BACHFEST** planned for Sunday, March 21, 2021 because the great man's birthday was falling yet again on a Sunday. Alas, this column will now have to suffice as our current celebration, the world situation notwithstanding. Thus, I shall now dare to offer a rather subjective listing of the six greatest works of J. S. Bach, not in any particular order.

**Passacaglia & Fugue in C Minor -** This is not only Bach's greatest piece for organ, it is the greatest piece of organ music ever written by anyone. A passacaglia is a type of theme and variations. Bach opens his passacaglia with a simple, yet rich, 8-bar theme, proceeds to compose 20 variations on his subject, and then follows it with a double fugue. There are ebbs and flows throughout the entire work. Toward the end of the fugue, however, occurs a cadence that must have sounded almost earth-shattering to his 18th century listeners. This moment is still effective today.

Chaconne in D Minor - This piece is actually part of a larger work called a partita, or suite of movements, and is the final movement of Bach's second of six partitas for solo violin. This is another theme and variations monument, but this time with 64 variations. "In these works Bach demonstrated his ability to create the illusion of a full harmonic and contrapuntal texture by means of multiple stops and single melodic lines which outline or suggest an interplay of independent voices." (Grout, *A History of Western Music*, page 391) Stop and think about it: A theme followed by 64 variations for solo violin.

Cello Suite #6 - Bach wrote six suites for cello, each with six movements, and they are quite simply the "Bible" of cello literature. They are technically challenging and were for a long time thought to be unplayable. However, Pablo Casals learned them, opening the door for every worthy player since to try to follow suit. I cannot intelligently select one over the others, but Holy Cross resident cellist Barb Cannon tells me that #6 is the one she prefers.

Passion According to St. Matthew - The St. Matthew Passion received its first performance at St. Thomas Church, Leipzig, on Good Friday of 1727 and is simply unmatched in all of music history in its presentation of the Passion story. It demonstrates a pantheon of moods in its mixture of recitatives, arias, and choruses as in an opera. Indeed, the work is musical drama of the highest order and one is hard pressed to name a choral work of any age to equal it. Listening to the opening chorus alone is a moving experience.

Brandenburg Concertos - The six Brandenburg Concertos are chamber music at its finest. Each one has its own combination of instruments presented in a most distinctive manner. I cannot name a favorite because they are all wonderful. However, the second concerto offers an opportunity for a solo violinist, a solo oboist, and a solo trumpeter to demonstrate fully their craft. The fifth one is said to be the first keyboard concerto ever written. They are called the "Brandenburgs" because Bach dedicated them to the margrave of Brandenburg, who paid Bach nothing for the pieces, while Bach immortalized the man's name forever.

Goldberg Variations - More properly known as the "Aria with 30 Variations," this work is actually Book IV of what Bach termed *Clavierubung*, or keyboard exercise. The aria is presented as the opening and closing section with the 30 movements in between. An unsubstantiated story claims that Bach composed this piece on behalf of a Russian count who said he was having trouble sleeping. So Bach wrote this piece to be played by the count's resident harpsichordist, whose name was Goldberg, to play when the count was going to bed. The nobleman rewarded Bach with a goblet filled

with 100 gold coins.

I selected six pieces because Bach somewhat regularly composed pieces in groups of six. However, other works that someone else could have easily included in their own list would be the B-Minor Mass, the St. John Passion, and the solo cantata *Ich habe genug*.

Although Bach himself never stepped foot outside of Germany, his music has traversed borders worldwide. He composed, by the way, sitting at a desk with a goose quill and an inkwell. There also may have been a few of the 20 children he fathered underfoot. I like to just stand on the chancel steps in St. Thomas Church, Leipzig, and look upon his burial place between where I am standing and the altar. I won't say that I feel His presence, but I will say that I leave wanting to be a better musician for dwelling a while where the great man trod.

#### Morality and Why We Need It


Jonathan Sacks was an author, philosopher, and former Chief Rabbi of the United Kingdom. Unfortunately, he passed away in November of last year, but a few months prior, he gifted the world with one last book, *Morality: Restoring the Common Good in Divided Times*. Holy Cross will be using this book from Sacks for group conversation in April and May (stay tuned for details.)

Here is an excerpt: "Likewise, divisive politics, inequitable economics, the loss of openness in universities, and the growth of depression and drug abuse are the result of what I call cultural climate change. They are the long-term consequences of the unprecedented experiment embarked on throughout the West a half-century ago: the move from "We" to "I."

All countries and cultures have three basic institutions. There is the *economy*, which is about the creation and distribution of wealth. There is the *state*, which is about the legitimization and distribution of power. And there is the *moral system*, which is the voice of society within the self; the "We" within the "I"; the common good that limits and directs our pursuit of private gain. It is the voice that says No to the individual "Me" for the sake of the collective "Us." Some call it conscience. Freud called it the superego. Others speak of it as custom and tradition. Yet others call it natural law. Many people in the West speak of it as the will and word of God.

Whatever its source, morality is what allows us to get on with one another, without endless recourse to economics or politics. There are times when we seek to get other people to do something we want or need them to do. We can pay them to do so: that is economics. We can force them to do so: that is politics. Or we can persuade them to do so because they and we are part of the same framework of virtues and values, rules and responsibilities, codes and customs, conventions and constraints: that is morality."

We look forward to setting the table for this important conversation and hope that you can join.


- Newspaper (They go through 100 a day!)

  - Friskie's and Sheba (canned cat food) and Fancy Feast






#### The Crossroads Purpose & Vision

#### The Plastics Problem

Do you faithfully separate the hard plastic bottles such as for water or laundry detergent and put them in the recycling container? Good for you! Materials scientists are working on ways to make it easier and more cost effective to recycle all plastics, even Styrofoam, but there are many obstacles. The plastics we use today were meant for a one-time use with no real thought of how they could be reused. Last year CrossWays Preschool and Celebration! Childcare had a recycling project to use the caps and lids from household plastics, and the resulting furniture was a true success story of recycling! However, we weren't really concerned about the color of the benches or table, and that rather dark shade is what you get from recycling the kind of plastic in caps, no problem for the use of outdoor furniture, but maybe not too appealing for some other use.

The goal of scientists today is to design a future where any plastic that ends up in the recycling bin can have a second and third life as a new product. One of the problems, though, is that many plastic products are really a combination of different materials, and each segment needs its own method to recover. The process developed by George Huber of the University of Wisconsin, Madison, uses a series of liquid solvents to dissolve individual plastic components of the product. If more solvents can be found to dissolve more types of plastics, there is the real potential to reduce plastic in the landfills.

Hopefully, though, ultimately we will develop plastics that are designed to be broken down and reassembled into new, needed items, right from the beginning.

# Flowers make great gifts for Mother's Day

#### Your Contributions at Work!

In calendar year 2020, Holy Cross donated over \$19,600 to COOL Ministries, as well as 775 pounds of food and items for veterans. In late November, the Holy Cross quilting group donated 10 quilts to be given to families in their Transitional Housing Program, and in December, the virtual Giving Tree provided 75 gifts for families in that program.

We recently received a thank you from Mindy Lindholm, the Executive Director of COOL Ministries, in which she stated that with our help, COOL was able to provide food for 43,456 individuals in Fiscal Year 2020. That amounts to food for about 524,760 balanced meals. They also assisted 13 homeless families to become self-sufficient through COOL family housing. That program provided transitional housing and a new beginning to a total of 14 adults and 32 children last year. They also serve between 50 to 125 veterans each month with toiletries and extras through their Veteran's Program.

Mindy also shared with us that she visited one of the housing families' units for a quick repair right after Christmas and the kids ran out and told her that they had the "best Christmas ever." They showed her some of their new toys and the joy in their eyes was a miracle to see. Their mother could not say thank you enough and repeated how blessed she felt. This picture shows the happy, smiling faces of just one of the families that benefited from the Giving Tree program last Christmas!



Mindy said, "I hope your congregation feels the joy that they help to spread. Also, I wanted to say that thanks to your donations and those of the community COOL has been able to remain open and serving the community each and every day throughout this entire pandemic (nearly a year now) and we are so proud and grateful of the fact that when the community needed it most, COOL was able to answer the call for help and we could not have done so without the support of Holy Cross. COOL is seeing more new faces than ever before and thanks to the donations from Holy Cross we were able to serve over 38,000 pounds of food last month alone."
