Meeting the Other with Hospitality by Pastor Chris Neptun

He looked up and saw three men standing near him. When he saw them, he ran from the tent entrance to meet them, and bowed down to the ground. – Genesis 18:2

Anthony Bourdain once said, "If you had a good experience in a restaurant, you tell two people. If you have a bad experience, you tell 10." The point is experience matters. Service is one of the most important aspects of eating out if not the most important. The food served can be amazing but if you aren't made to feel welcome, it doesn't matter.

Hospitality or serving others was about survival in the ancient world. In some of the more remote parts of our world it is more prominent. I watch a few shows that feature homestead lifestyle and the same is true. Helping a stranger isn't about doing something nice for them. Instead, it often involves life or death and realizes that, at any given moment in the wilderness, you may depend on the help of a stranger to survive.

The verse from Genesis above tells of Abraham's hospitality to what he believes to be three strangers when they arrive at the heat of the day unexpectedly in his camp. He meets them at a place called the Oaks of Mamre, which is believed to be in present day Hebron. It's hot. It's dry. They look like travelers who need rest, food, and water to survive the journey ahead of them. Abraham's posture reveals humility to provide what these strangers need.

I was recently reminded how well Holy Cross shares the gift of hospitality. We hosted a memorial service where many were strangers to Holy Cross or hadn't visited in a long time. Throughout the visitation and after the service I heard many express how welcomed they felt and how much it helped them at a time when they were grieving the loss of a friend, a family member, a loved one. There was plenty of food, drink, and people serving them. Serving food and drink is often what we think of when we hear the word hospitality. This is part of it but there is so much more.

Allow me to be a "word nerd" here. The word "hospitality" we use today has its roots in the French word *ospitalité* and the Latin word *hospitalitem* meaning, "friendliness to guests". The related word, host (a person who receives guests), also comes from the Old French *hoste* (modern *hôte*) and the Latin *hospitem*. Hospital, hotel, hostel, and even hostile find their roots in this etymological idea of providing for the needs of a guest, stranger, or foreigner.¹

The Dutch priest Henri Nouwen described hospitality in this way, "Hospitality, therefore, means primarily the creation of a free space where the stranger can enter and become a friend instead of an enemy. Hospitality is not to change people, but to offer them space where change can take place."²

True hospitality requires a certain mindset of risk and humility. Holy Cross does hospitality well but there are opportunities for us to understand and engage it more deeply. Doing so may allow us to live a life of faith that receives and shares the gifts of God more completely and deeply. The gift of a few experiencing God's love through us is better than 10 that don't.

This topic has been at the heart of many conversations at Holy Cross over the years. Congregational leadership discusses this as does the church staff. It is an important distinction because it shapes and informs our life together as a community of believers. The idea of what we want 'for' people who we are in relationship with and not just what we want 'from' people with whom we are in relationship influences our congregational culture.

I believe it matters in the conversations that we have with each other. These conversations build upon wise and graceful lives as we make spiritual inquiries about a relationship with science, social healing, the arts and our faith values. It matters as we explore humanity's ancient questions in the 21st century about topics like: *What does it mean to be human? How do we want to live? And who will we be to each other?*

I understand that the opportunities we provide at Holy Cross are intended to offer an adventure in the mystery and art of composing a life rich with faith. I personally find it satisfying to have companions who also think deeply about our lives in a tumultuous world and find strength through the presence of being with others as we write the generative story of our times.

Over the next three months I will miss all of this. I begin my sabbatical leave on March 1. I will return to a part-time role at Holy Cross as Pastor Emeritus beginning June 1. While away, I will not be available for pastoral responsibilities. All pastoral care requests need to be directed to Pastor Chris. During my time away I will be more attentive to the rhythm and pace in my personal life, time with loved ones and friends, study and reflection through some courses I will be taking and conversations with other people of faith in other faith contexts. I look forward to returning and sharing those moments that occurred while we were apart. I hope you know that even though I may not be physically present with you, you all will remain in my prayers.

Pastor Bob's Sabbatical Leave

Pastor Bob will be on a three month sabbatical leave beginning March 1 and concluding on May 31. What is a sabbatical? It is not a vacation. A sabbatical is an extended period of time away from work that allows for a different pace/rhythm from work responsibilities and a time for study and reflection. During this time, the individual is still employed and paid. While Pastor Bob is on his sabbatical leave, he will not be available for pastoral responsibilities. He will return on June 1, 2023 and move into a parttime role as Pastor Emeritus at Holy Cross through May 31, 2024.

A Year of Holy Days: Jewish Festival of Purim & Feast Day of Saint Oscar Romero by Deaconess Katie Freund

This month we're wading through purple. It's Lent, all week, every week. For the purpose of this year's series, *A Year of Holy Days*, I'd rather not try to reiterate what Lent is (yet again). We already go through that enough each year.

So this March, I'm lifting up two days that center around the value of standing up for others. The teachings of Christ essentialize our responsibility to care for "the least of these", a scriptural value since the time of the patriarchs and matriarchs of the Hebrew Bible (aka the Old Testament). The law that is driven home over and over again throughout different books and by different writers in the Hebrew Bible is the responsibility of the people of God to care for widows, orphans, and the sojourners (analogous to today's refuges). The people of God have long been expected to stand up for others.

This year, March 6-7 is the Jewish festival of Purim, focused on when Queen Esther saved the Jewish people from an attempted genocide at the risk of her own life. If it's been a while since you've read this story, I highly recommend it. In Christian Bibles it's in the "Old Testament", you guessed it, in the book of Esther. Throughout the entire account, you'll see prayer and God at work but God is never specifically mentioned. The driving force of this story is how our faith shapes the very way we live our lives.

Later in the month, March 24, is the feast day of Oscar Romero. This day was chosen because in 1980 it was the day this Catholic priest was assassinated. In the middle of a church service, Father Romero had finished preaching and moved to stand in front of the altar to begin the eucharist; and there, in front of the assembly he was shot. For years he was maligned and intimidated for his message that we must care for the poor. Honestly, it's hard for us to understand that such a simple conviction would inspire a violent response. At the time the Salvadorian civil war was raging, and when this conservative Catholic priest found his faith in opposition to those pursuing power he became a globally known political target.

I lift both of these stories up, a happy ending and a tragic one. The common thread is how caring what happens to others is essential to our own "personal" faith. There are consequences to having different priorities than the rest of the world. May we love our neighbor boldly.

Feeding Our Hungry Hearts by Steve Oelschlager

When it comes to physical hunger, we all have routines and strategies for supplying our bodies with needed calories. From getting groceries, packing lunches, making meals, and eating out, most of us in the developed world do quite well satisfying our appetites for food.

I wonder if "everybody has a hungry heart," how we go about satisfying that kind of existential hunger, for ourselves and our world? How do we understand that feeling that something is missing, not right, that there is disconnection from what we need, moments of emptiness to life? And, given our framework for making sense of those feelings, where do we turn for the nourishment and sustenance that will feed us?

Unfortunately, our world is quick to serve up what amounts to junk food for the soul, alluring options that provide shortlived relief without long-term satisfaction. More stuff, more success, more pleasure, more building up of our egos, it all feels good until soon it doesn't, and we need more. Is it any wonder that statistics measuring our well-being suggest that we are both satiated yet holistically starving to death?

I'm grateful for my faith and what Jesus has to say about hungry hearts, including his suggestion that following him is the pathway to hungering and thirsting no more. Jesus' wisdom points us in a different direction than the junk food for the soul served up by the conventional wisdom of our world. Jesus lays out a package of values for us to live by: love, hospitality, compassion, generosity, empathy, care, concern, service to the other, inclusion, and forgiveness, to name a few. It seems to me Jesus has a better story about how to satisfy hungry hearts, and it involves shifting our focus to something bigger than ourselves. That, Jesus says, is the way, the truth, and the life.

Hopefully, our community at Holy Cross can keep all of us inspired to take Jesus at his word and follow him.

Lutheran School of Theology at Chicago....Community Learning

Members from Holy Cross joined with others from around the country in the Fall 2022 for a class on ecumenical and interfaith relationships led by Dr. Mark Swanson. Another session is being offered beginning in February 2023. There is no cost involved.

The next offering is: **Martin Luther on the Holy Spirit and the Christian Life** by Dr. Candace Kohli, Assistant Professor of Systematic Theology at the Lutheran School of Theology at Chicago.

Do Lutherans shout justification and whisper sanctification? This question suggests an over emphasis on Christ and justification in Luther's theology and its reception in modern Lutheranism. Luther actually had much to say in the final decade of his career about the third Person of the Trinity, the Holy Spirit, and the Spirit's role in the Christian life. In many ways, in fact, Luther's late "discovery" of the Spirit helped him to answer unresolved questions inherent in his doctrine of justification alone by faith alone, such as the ongoing role of the law in the Christian life, ethical and moral foundations for a life lived in community, and what really happens to the soul in justification. For Luther the Christian life was a life lived in and with the Spirit in thought, word, and deed?.

Week 1: A Trinitarian Pneumatology: The Spirit as divine agent of the law and gift of the gospel

Week 2: Did you say "sanctification"? The Spirit as Christ's healing medicine for the soul

Week 3: Fanning Spiritual Flames: The role of prayer in the Spirit-soul relation

Week 4: Christians Do Good Works! The role of the Spirit in supporting the Christian life


