- The Serenity Prayer, penned by theologian Reinhold Niebuhr

Worry may be the signature human condition, and its attendant anxiety the characteristic mark of our time. Current estimates reveal there is a significant percent of the American population who suffer from some form of debilitating anxiety.

In the gospel narrative, Jesus admonishes us not to worry about our life. How does that help? Doesn't reading these words heap guilt on those who are worried for worrying? Aren't Jesus' words the romantic musings of a young idealist, insensitive to the poor, the unemployed and especially to the worrywarts? At first glance, his advice does not seem very practical or doable.

Or does it? Protestant theologian Paul Tillich characterized the most predominant modern anxiety as spiritual; that is, we suffer from emptiness or meaninglessness. If Tillich is the diagnostician, then perhaps the Jesuit theologian Anthony de Mello, following Jesus' advice, offers the cure. De Mello said, "You sanctify whatever you are grateful for." In other words, instead of nursing our worries, change the focus. Look elsewhere, beyond self-absorption. Cultivate a grateful heart.

The ease of this cure is what makes it seem unrealistic. Do you remember the Old Testament story of Naaman, the commander of the army of the king of Aram, found in Second Kings? He sought out the prophet Elisha to heal him of his leprosy but when Elisha instructed Naaman to wash in the Jordan seven times, Naaman became angry. The cure was too easy! When at last Naaman followed Elisha's instructions, his flesh was restored to that of a young man.

Gratitude does not come easily, especially when we are caught in the grip of anxiety. Nor does gratitude come in a sudden conversion. It comes through a slow turning away from worry by intentionally stopping to find something, anything, for which to thank God. In the midst of worry, it can be a real stretch. Jesus understood this. Take something simple and common, Jesus says, for which to give thanks: a bird, a flower, a blade of grass. Anything will do: a breath of air, a dog's loyalty, a glass of water. It is the small step of moving out of self to notice something or someone beyond the self that matters.

This small step leads to huge results. It leads to finally getting what Jesus is trying to tell us: everything is God's, and God is eagerly waiting to give us more and more – if only we would allow it. Jesus wants us to notice what is in front of us, to believe that God is present and to be thankful. Change the subject, Jesus admonishes. There is a lot of stuff in life we are powerless to change, but changing the subject is always in our power.

By adopting gratitude, we can discover God's abundance. It's a funny thing, but gratitude takes math out of the equation. When gratitude replaces anxiety, even when we find we have less than we had during our worry days, gratitude reveals that we have far more than we need. Look at the birds of the air, consider the lilies of the field. Jesus wasn't being idealistic; he was being practical. Medical science has shown that by not worrying, we can add to our life span. We don't have to worry about our lives day to day – what we are going to eat or drink or wear? Nor do we have to worry about our children's needs.

The shift is to say thank you, knowing that what needs to happen will, and the rest is not all that important. Gratitude is the key.

Be Still...

This fall I was in a corn maze. The stalks up over your head. Hardly able to see between the rows. Have you ever just stopped to listen to the corn talking? The way corn rustles in the wind reminds me of the murmurings of the head, heart and spirit. When I am able to notice these kinds of noises of nature, I find that my body immediately relaxes. As if the wind or the voice of God is calling me to pause, be still, listen and maybe even rest.

Rest is important. We've been told this for years. But what does that really mean? It is something that I am constantly trying to figure out. I know that rest is a physical thing, to be able to care for your body through enough sleep or even slow your pace down enough to see the smaller moments in life. Rest I am convinced, is far more than that because no matter how much I sleep or create time to just be, I don't always feel rested.

If we look at the idea of wellness in different areas of our being - physical, emotional, spiritual, intellectual and relational, I wonder if our idea of rest changes. How is it that we can decompress and restore in all of these areas of our lives? Is it truly possible to feel rested in each of these areas simultaneously?

We are constantly bombarded with information, media, opinions, reschedules, plans, events, commitments, news, invitations... It seems like it never ends. Don't get me wrong, these aren't bad things, but they also keep us from truly resting. Resting is a form of restoration. A chance for your brain to reduce its cortisol – the stress hormones, rebalance your body, calm the breath, the heart and the mind alongside the body and take time for reflection. As humans in order to fully restore and fully recharge, we need time to reflect and process what we've observed, learned and experienced. How are things connected with each other in our lives? Without making these connections, we can feel lost and unsettled unable to rest.

These connections come when we are able to create Sabbath. A time of holy rest that is designed to fully restore us in mind, body and soul. How are you creating Sabbath? Are you hearing the rustling of nature calling you to rest as creation begins to take upon its own seasonal rest?

Where are you finding rest in all areas of your life? What is restoring you? I look forward to hearing from you what "rest" looks like in your ever-changing world.

Building Bridges of Hospitality and Generosity With People of Other Faiths

An Excerpt from Sacred Ground: Pluralism, Prejudice, and the **Promise of America** by Eboo Patel

"America is among the most religiously diverse countries in human history and by far the most religiously devout nation in the West. How are we doing when it comes to bridging our religiously diverse social capital?

Social scientists measure America's religious diversity in three basic ways. The first and most common category is attitudes. This is a broad category, and there are many ways to ask questions about attitudes, but it generally comes down to a pretty basic sentiment: 'Do you like Muslims/Jews/evangelicals/humanists?' The second category - relationships - is illustrated by questions like, 'Do you know/work with/have a friend of a different religion?' The final category is knowledge, exemplified by questions such as, 'What religion is Shabbat associated with? In what faith do adherents fast from dawn to dusk for one month of the year?'

I knew this data well. I used it in my speeches and writings, and it helped me paint a picture of how bad the problem of religious prejudice is in our society. What I had failed to notice was that the data isn't just useful in presenting the problem; it actually shapes up to suggest a solution. The three measures - attitudes, relationships, knowledge - are actually deeply related. A 2007 Pew study found that 44 percent of people who did not know a Mormon had a positive attitude toward the Mormon community. Of people who did know a Mormon personally, 60 percent had favorable views. That's a 16-point difference. When the same question was asked regarding Muslims, the difference was even starker: only 32 percent of people who did not know a Muslim expressed favorable views toward the community, but of those who did know a Muslim, 56 percent had positive attitudes. That's nearly a 25-point difference - huge, really.

In his recent book, American Grace, written with David Campbell, Putnam calls this the My Friend Al Principle, which he explains like this: Say you are a beekeeper and your friend Al is a beekeeper. Apiculture brings you together, and through this shared activity, you learn that Al is an Evangelical Christian. Prior to meeting Al, you harbored a host of prejudices about Evangelicals, but if Al is a beekeeper and a good guy and an Evangelical, then maybe other Evangelicals aren't so bad. Putnam and Campbell actually show strong statistical evidence for this principle - that people's regard for entire religious groups improves through a positive, meaningful relationship with even one member of that group, often formed through a common activity. Putnam and Campbell discovered that their data suggested something else: by becoming friends with Al the beekeeping Evangelical, not only did your attitude toward Evangelicals improve, so did your attitude toward Mormons and Muslims. They conclude, 'We have reasonably firm evidence that as people build more religious bridges they become warmer toward people of many different religions, not just those religions represented within their social network."

Carl C. Hansen, Jr.

(October 1, 1949 - September 27, 2018) by Randy Casey

The passing of our dear friend Carl Hansen is the end of an era at Holy Cross. With Carl's departure his care, love and passion for the fine organ in our sanctuary has ceased, and the rest of us, particularly yours truly, are left to merely do what we can to come close to Carl's stewardship.



The following is not an exaggeration:

- Carl was largely responsible for Holy Cross even having a pipe organ at all.
- Carl was responsible for the placement of the organ console and the pipes in the old sanctuary.
- Carl supervised the movement of the organ pipes from the old sanctuary into the new sanctuary.
- Carl was responsible for the location of the organ chamber in the new sanctuary.
- Carl was responsible for having the organ console we possess.
- Carl was on the committee that arranged for the acquisition of the striking, flaming copper display of organ pipes you see every single time you walk into our sanctuary.
- Carl took upon himself to see that the organ was properly maintained.

With regard to this last item: It was nothing short of theatrical to be around church when the organ was being tuned. Carl would linger all day in the sanctuary to monitor the process and then try out the organ when the tuner thought he was finished. Carl would then play the organ and declare the job totally unsatisfactory. Carl would then have the man return for another day to "spot-tune" for another few hours until Carl was somewhat pleased with his work.

In short, every person who walks into the Holy Cross sanctuary is indirectly effected by Carl's passion for the organ, and in particular the instrument in our midst.

Carl practiced on the organ in our sanctuary usually six days a week in the early morning before anybody else arrived. His choice of literature was varied and he used the many sounds the instrument has to offer. Nobody utilized the "bells and whistles" of the Holy Cross organ more than Carl. The 23 ranks of pipes have been digitally enhanced, something for which Carl can also be given credit, and Carl knew where all the buttons and knobs were to achieve the digitally-enhanced sounds. NOBODY will ever know more about how the Holy Cross organ works, inside and out, than did Carl.

Carl's standard for organ playing was Nathan Laube. Suffice it to say that Nathan skipped his final two years of high school in Gurnee to become an organ student at the Curtis Institute of Music in Philadelphia and is today on the faculty of the Eastman School of Music in Rochester, New York. Nathan has played all over the world and is the closest musical persona to Mozart I have ever met. Nathan was a friend to Carl, and Carl can also be credited for getting Nathan to give a concert on our instrument. Carl listened to CDs of Nathan's playing constantly and was not shy about reminding the rest of us about Nathan's musical stature. I understand that Carl's lovely wife, Beth, played CDs of Nathan's playing during Carl's final hours in the hospital. However, for all of Nathan's accomplishments, Nathan

knows he has lost a big supporter with Carl's passing. Nathan flew into Chicago on very short notice and played for Carl's funeral. Nathan has stated that he will return to Holy Cross and be pleased to play a concert in memory of Carl.

Carl had strong opinions and was outspoken about offering them. But behind his assertiveness was a passion not only for good music, but for Holy Cross in general. Nobody loved Holy Cross more than Carl, something which those of us who saw him during the week could observe. On Sundays Carl would visit other churches, sometimes to play and sometimes just to observe, but would always return on Monday just as opinionated about the proceedings of other churches as he was of Holy Cross. Carl also usually attended our Wednesday evening services during Lent. Carl was a student of liturgy, of hymn playing, and of the composition of the service as a whole. His comments on all of those subjects were sharp and salient. By the way, I have no recollection of Carl every complimenting me on anything I ever did either as an organist, a pianist, or a choir director. He kept me honest, and if I were wanting platitudes, I could look elsewhere.

I will miss Carl Hansen greatly, and, in fact, I already do. If you did not know Carl and have visited the sanctuary of Holy Cross, you have witnessed Carl's handiwork. If you knew Carl, then you experienced the distinctiveness of his personality. He was one of a kind. He loved his dear wife, Beth, and their two children, Jay (Rebecca) Hansen and Lindsey (Jeff) Miska, and he loved his grandchildren, Connor Hansen and Madison & Johnny Miska. But Carl was also boundlessly passionate about that thing called the organ. May all of us find a cause or a purpose in our own lives toward which we can be as enthusiastic and devoted as was Carl Hansen.



The Value of Friendship

If you think back to your childhood, chances are you will think very fondly about some friendships that you had that made a positive impact on you. These foundational connections with people outside your family helped you become a compassionate, communicative, and empathetic human being. You think of them as just something that was a highlight of your growing up, but those experiences were serious business for your development. Lena Derhally writes "Preschool friendships are helpful in developing social and emotional skills, increasing a sense of belonging and decreasing stress" in her article The Importance of Childhood Friendships and How to Nurture Them in the Washington Post. In addition, Paul Schwartz, a professor of psychology and child behavior, explains in the same article that early childhood friendships help build skills in seeing others' point of view, help children learn communication rules and what behaviors are age appropriate. As adults, we can help the young children in our lives cultivate friendships with their peers and give them a model of what good friendship is through our own friendships. At CrossWays Preschool, we use the peer-to-peer interaction between students as teachable moments, and help develop these relationships between our students. We encourage highly complex dramatic play in groups of 2 to 5 children as a way to create and build friendships. We know what the experts are saying is the truth, and how important these foundational connections are to our students, for now and for their future. Stop by in see it in action sometime!






