I wonder sometimes what it takes for us to become discouraged. How do we sort through what lies in the shadows of our own souls, our society, and our world? How do we listen for the voice of God and receive the revelations that Christ has for us there? How do we bring to light what we find in the shadows? Who or what helps us navigate the connections between the inner and outer realms? How does God call us to bear witness to, "tell in the light," what we find there? Are we ever tempted to lose heart?

The world and our experience of living within it, gives us all sorts of causes and reasons to be discouraged and disillusioned. We experience the temptation to 'lose heart' in our lives, in our communities, large and small. Our world view is altered when that which we see; that which we have come to rely on; that which has guided and governed our living; yes, that which the world says matters most, begins to erode. It becomes easier to despair and begin to believe the headlines. When the reality comes home to us whenever and wherever there is decay, corruption, or 'wasting away,' we may move into the habit of losing heart.



Dietrich Bonhoeffer, 1906 - 1945

"I hope to be a Christian..." Dietrich Bonhoeffer wrote these words in a letter from a prison cell. He lamented the situation and the atrocities taking place in Germany. He questioned where was the Christian witness and why wasn't it using its prophetic voice. Dietrich Bonhoeffer was a Lutheran pastor who attempted to speak a hopeful word during WWII to the people of Germany and the world. When the world was falling apart at the seams, Bonhoeffer used his voice and his pen to proclaim 'good news' into the brokenness of his day. The authorities did everything possible to silence him and prevent him from lifting up the themes of God's presence and the work of Christ for the sake of the world. Bonhoeffer was one of the early architects for the ecumenical movement bringing different Christian structures together in one voice to address the atrocities of their day.

I have always appreciated Bonhoeffer for his clarity and curiosity about who Jesus Christ is for us in our world. He wrote the words above in a letter later in his life. They capture the idea that it is not so much what we have done in the past but what we are willing to pursue in the present moments that we live in. Bonhoeffer was executed at the concentration camp near Flossenburg, Germany on April 9, 1945 several weeks before WWII ended on May 8, 1945. Bonhoeffer questioned..."How do we resist the evil forces of fate while submitting to the good providence of God?" Bonhoeffer's voice reminds us that the cause for our 'not losing heart' cannot be in what was. And at the same time, I can't imagine Jesus giving up on us or on this world either.

I was invited into a conversation through a mutual acquaintance to talk with their friend who was struggling with a recent development involving their daughter. The daughter was diagnosed with an eating disorder. This person admitted they had no church involvement or religious experience. During the worst of her daughter's illness, she had to be hospitalized for both her physical and mental health. On the morning of her admission, she shared that after the doctors explained that she would not be able to see her depressed, malnourished child for several days, she walked out of the hospital, got into her car, and started driving without aim or purpose. She ended up in the parking lot of a religious gift shop. Shaking, she walked in and wandered the aisles until a person with a kind face approached. "Can I help you find anything?" she asked. The mom burst into tears and said nothing. The store person gave the mom a hug and said, "Wait here." After disappearing for a minute, she returned with a small velvet box. Inside it was a tiny silver cross on a chain. Pressing the necklace into the mother's hands she said, "Hold this. Keep it with you. Only a suffering God can help." This mom wanted to know where in the Bible that is written. I explained it isn't. I told her that those are words from Dietrich Bonhoeffer that I have never forgotten.

Considering all that we have been through, I don't see the world going back to what it was. Nor do we need it to. At the same time, I don't see Jesus giving up on us or on this world either. On the cross, Jesus bears the violence, the contempt, the pain, and the humiliation of the entire world and absorbs it into his own body. He declares solidarity for all time with those who feel lost, abandoned, colonized, oppressed, accused, imprisoned, beaten, mocked, and murdered. He bursts open like a seed so that new life can grow and replenish the earth. He takes an instrument of torture and turns it into a bizarre vehicle of hospitality and communion for all people, everywhere. Jesus was and is many things: teacher, healer, companion, and Lord, and it is essential that we experience him in all of these ways. But the center, the *heart* of who he is, is revealed at the cross. Only a suffering God can help us bear our own burdens. Only a suffering God can show us the Way and lead us home. Only a suffering God can teach us how to love and not to lose heart.

You're Invited To Worship With Us

Through August 2021 our plan is to continue offering an in-person sanctuary worship, drive-in worship and virtual worship on Sundays. All three of these worship options will feature the same sermon message each week.

Please note the following changes to Covid-19 protocols that reflect CDC, IDPH and LCPH guidance, effective July 1.

As we begin to host more in-person events at church during the week, we will follow guidelines and check in with each group as to their comfort level regarding masks. If participants are fully vaccinated, then masks will be optional. We recognize that vaccines are not currently available for our youngest members and guests and encourage you to consider their safety as well in making your mask choices.

The 8 am in-person sanctuary worship opportunity no longer requires you to RSVP. We will continue to offer social distance seating. Anyone who is fully vaccinated is no longer required to wear a mask but may do so. If you are not vaccinated, we require you to wear a mask. We will still ask attendees to sign-in. We are utilizing liturgy and hymnody as part of this service.

The 10 am drive-in worship service is outdoors and masks will no longer be required. Again, if a mask is your choice we respect that decision. You may remain in your vehicle or bring a lawn chair and enjoy the outdoors. We are utilizing liturgy and hymnody as part of this service. When Holy Communion is offered we will continue with the individual communion kits. Holy Communion is being offered on the first and third Sundays of each month. Offerings may be made in person, through traditional mail delivery, or on-line at the church's website.

Knowing God Through Nature and the Cosmos

Before the Bible existed, nature was the original Bible, or the only source of revelation of God and the mysteries of the Divine. It's no wonder then that the connection between creation and its Creator permeates our sacred scriptures. In her book Grounded: Finding God in the World, Diana Butler Bass writes:

"Since human history began, people have wondered how the world came to be—and how we came to be on it. Our ancestors told stories about creation, the ground under our feet, and the animals, birds, and humans that make their home upon the earth. These stories cross all cultural boundaries, and they share similar characteristics and themes. One of the dominant motifs is the relationship between soil and our souls. Whether it is the Maori tale of shaping a woman from the scarlet soil, the Navajo story of man and woman journeying through the worlds to find a home on the land, or a dedicated humanist's case that life crawled out of the sea to the shore, through the centuries we human beings have tried to make spiritual sense of the obvious link between the ground and our very existence.

Jews, Christians, and Muslims share a creation story from the Bible, found in the early chapters of the book of Genesis. Like many such stories, it begins with sky and earth intertwined in darkness. God first brings forth light, then separates what is above from what is below, thus making oceans, land, and sky. Although some people insist that Genesis 1 is a literal scientific account, it is best understood as what Old Testament scholar Walter Brueggemann calls a 'liturgical poem,' a form for use in worship that invites a community 'to confess and celebrate the world as God has intended it.' In the opening pages of the Bible, a cosmic vision of creation unfolds with the making of plants and forests, the stars and suns and moons beyond, all the fishes and birds and animals, and finally human beings. At each juncture, God proclaims blessing on what has been made, declaring it good, and with the creation of humankind the whole of the universe is pronounced 'very good.' At the end of the poem, God sends human beings out to till and keep the soil and to work on behalf of the earth, delighting in all its gifts."

Even today amid modernity, nature remains a profound way to see and understand God at work, but we have to make an effort to notice. Holy Cross has two new opportunities to explore this sacred connection between God and creation, including the myriad implications. We hope you can join us starting in mid-July (see pages 4 and 7.)



Antiracism Roundtable

Antiracism Roundtable & Work Group

I'd like to thank everyone who has made time and space to be a part of the past few months' discussions of this new group at Holy Cross. Whether you've attended one or all of the sessions we've had so far, your presence has been tremendously inspiring to me as we discover personal and collective ways to put our Christian faith into both words and actions and as we find renewed purpose in loving all of our neighbors as ourselves.

For anyone who hasn't attended a session yet, but who might be curious about what we are doing, please drop in – you are welcome to join us any time. If you are curious, you might be wondering what this roundtable idea is all about, or you might wonder, if I spend some of my time on this, will it leave me feeling frustrated and powerless?

For me, the answer is no, completely the opposite. Our discussions leave me feeling positive, having had open dialogue about difficult topics, and powerful, by talking through new ideas and resources. I sense that those of us who are meeting have gained a great deal of energy, making us think and allowing us to strategize about how we can influence others and share what we are learning and unlearning with others at Holy Cross.

Since we began meeting in March, we've covered a number of topics that inspired meaningful and productive conversations about how to create a faith-based, action-oriented group to bring awareness, resources and action to Holy Cross.

We generally start with a specific theme, but the conversations take a life of their own and extend beyond antiracism, although the principle of being antiracist (that is, acting against racism) is what anchors all our discussions. We've shared a bit of our personal race histories, discussed what's in the news (racism against black and brown people, anti-Asian hate, fair housing and policing issues), clarified definitions (intersectionality, equality, equity, diversity, inclusion), talked about imagery used (or not used) in scripture and worship, and reviewed Holy Cross' work and collaborative efforts toward achieving social justice in our community.

Each month we've prayed for victims of racism and prejudice. We've prayed for the strength to examine our own biases, privileges, experiences, words, and actions. We've listened to each other, and we've gained new perspectives.

All of this sharing has led us to want to reach out to you. As a place to begin, here are some suggestions to consider adding to your reading list this summer. We'll offer new resources each month.

From here on out, write a story worth telling. Write a story you're proud to tell. If you're in the middle of making a decision right now, stop and ask yourself: Of the available options, which one do I want as a permanent part of the story of my life?"





Grounded in Grace is an opportunity for women of faith to gather together in fun, fellowship, and learning.







Baptism


Summer months often allow for frequent opportunities to get wet and play in water. From running through a sprinkler or watering a garden, to spending the day at the beach or a water park or a water day at daycare or summer camp, we are much more likely to walk around wet during these hotter months.

July's focus for us (and our kids) to connect faith with everyday life is baptism. While the day of baptism is an important event, we can explore our faith more deeply by regularly remembering the promises that God makes to us, and the promises that we adults make for a child's development as a child of God. Some refer to this as "walking wet."

There are a lot of possible opportunities for helping kids remember God's promise of new life for them (and us) and what it means to be baptized.

- When we're rinsing sand off our feet after a day at the beach, or wiping a face after a delicious ice cream cone, we might note how baptism washes away our sin. Baptism helps us know that even when we make messes of things, God forgives us.
- As we travel or see people we haven't seen for a while we can talk about how through baptism we know we are part of God's family. We sometimes refer to God as a parent—and that means that we are connected as siblings in Christ to people all around the world. And, even when we can't be with people for a while, we know that God is with them, loving them, just as God is with us, loving us.
- As we explain why we need to turn off the sprinkler or hear about changing weather patterns, we might also discuss how we are given responsibility to care for the earth. (In the baptismal liturgy, those who bring a child to baptism are entrusted with teaching the newly baptized to do many things, including "care for others and the world God made.")

Walking Wet

It's summer—time for spending time in the water at the pool, the beach, the river, the sprinkler, or the bathtub. Take some time to remember your baptism when you are playing in the water.

Needed

Permanent marker or gel pen, colorful washable markers, spray bottle with plain water, poster board, glue stick

Activity Plan

- 1. Offer this prayer as the family gathers for a water moment: We give you thanks, O God, for the wonders of water and are ever grateful you have claimed us as your children in the waters of Baptism. Bless our fun today in the water you continue to give us. Amen.
- 2. Invite family members to tell something they remember about the baptism of another family member and/or about their own baptisms.
- 3. Encourage children to splash and play in the water. As they pour water over their own heads, invite them to shout, "I am a child of God!"
- 4. Invite the children to pour water over the heads of the adults as they shout, "I am a child of God!"
- 5. Tell how church leader Martin Luther once said, "When you wash your face, remember your baptism." After spending time in the water, use a permanent marker to write this quote on a piece of plain paper.
- 6. Invite family members to work together to draw around the words with washable markers. Lightly spray the paper with water and watch the colors run together.
- After your artwork dries, glue it to a piece of poster board.
 Display it near a sink in your home, to serve as a reminder of your baptism.



During Difficult Days by Randy Casey

Listeners of WFMT learned from Carl Grapentine this morning that today was the birthday anniversary of Dietrich Fischer-Diskeau (1925-2012), the most acclaimed male singer of German Lieder during the second half of the 20th century. Carl also remarked that Fischer-Diskeau served in the German Army during World War II, was captured, and sang for two years to homesick German troops in an American prison camp. Probably the most famous story of a musician in a prison camp during World War II is that of the French composer Olivier Messiaen (1908-1992). He was captured by the Germans and while incarcerated composed probably the most distinctive piece of chamber music of the 20th century. Entitled "Quartet for the End of Time," the piece is scored for piano, violin, cello, and clarinet because Messiaen's compatriots with him played those specific instruments. Perhaps most remarkably the piece was premiered in the prison camp, supposedly with some 4,000 soldiers as the audience. I have heard the work live three times and to term it "haunting" is a huge understatement. Knowing the circumstances of its first performance adds dramatically to the aura of Messiaen's composition.

I do not claim to know more about what has been happening throughout the world during the past 18 months than anyone reading these words. However, I would contend that the arts have done their fair share of helping people cope with the challenges before them. Of course, thousands of musical performances were cancelled, but I am thinking of more intimate endeavors. Surely within families, for example, stories were written and told, paintings were created and shared, instruments were played and heard, clothes were sewn and worn, games were contrived and played, dances were imagined and performed. The panorama of human accomplishment easily exceeds my ability to even imagine its scope.

I feel almost guilty about what I have done during the pandemic for I have hardly missed a day of practice the whole time. When people were supposed to be homebound, I drove to church where I was alone and played the piano for many an hour. I felt better than otherwise for having done so. To be sure I put together a program and even memorized it, but at this point I do not know that I will give a concert, if only because I am ready to move on to other pieces. To try to compensate for this focus on self I have followed other pursuits which I shall not enumerate here.

Being an accompanist has been the foundation of my musical career. One helpful trait for a good accompanist is to set aside one's ego and think along, for example, with a singer like Dietrich Fischer-Diskeau. In a musical sense this is almost the epitome of considering someone else. I take consolation in this necessary quality for my profession and hope post-pandemic that I will leave behind a thing or two that I do not enjoy seeing when I look in the mirror.

When I am driving down the road I recite the 23rd Psalm, the King James version, more often than you can imagine. Whoever composed the original had an amazing mind and whoever translated it into the English language of 1611 was brilliant and sensitive, too. The human spirit is a marvel of God's creation that throughout time has helped us meet many challenges. I sincerely wish everyone well who has lost loved ones during the pandemic. And I ask God's blessing upon all of us as we face the different days ahead.

Of course, we know that the Bible tells us, "Do not worry about anything but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be known to God." (Philippians 4:6) So turning this problem over to God is what we are to do, but surely God expects us to exercise whatever control we can have over not wasting the resources of our marvelous planet.
