
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Uncomfortable Truth...

Living the Christian life in social isolation, disconnected from others, is a contradiction in terms. I believe that our Christian faith is personal but not private. Without a doubt, our Christian faith needs to be rooted in our life moments. However, our Christian faith is diminished when we exclude our neighbor in the conversation of faith. I appreciate Maya Angelou's sentiment that "nobody, but nobody can make it out here alone." As we continue to navigate through the season of Pentecost and these uncertain times, the scriptures of the Pentecost season remind us weekly what it means to compose a life of faith... together.

When you consider Jesus' life, public ministry, death and even his resurrection, it is always about the relationships and our sense that we are not alone. Jesus' appearance to Peter—like all of the post-resurrection appearances the Gospels record—speaks volumes about God's priorities. In the days following the resurrection, Jesus doesn't waste a moment on revenge or retribution. He doesn't storm Pilate's house, or avenge himself on Rome, or punish the soldiers whose hands drove nails into his. Instead, he spends his remaining time on earth feeding, restoring, and strengthening his friends. He calls Mary Magdalene by name as she cries. He offers his wounds to the skeptical Thomas. He grills bread and fish for his hungry disciples.

In other words, Jesus focuses on relationship. On reconciliation. On love. He spends the last days before his ascension delivering people of faith from fear, despair, self-hatred, and paralysis. He wastes no time on triumphalism or smugness. Even at the height of his power, he chooses humility. He chooses to linger on a lonely beach till dawn, waiting for his hungry followers to realize how much they need him. He chooses to feed and tend his sheep.

I hope we notice that Jesus never ignored or dismissed the brokenness, imperfection, dishonor, and scandal of life. It appears that the realities and the messiness of the human situation create the perfect backdrop for Jesus' beautiful works of restoration, healing, hope, and second chances. There is much to ponder in the alternative narrative of the Gospel and much to consider about the surprising ways of God. Who brings salvation into the world via a young woman whose story was not believed? Via a well-meaning man who had to let go of righteousness in order to follow God? Via a cultural system obsessed with male honor and female purity? Via the flimsiness of dreams? Via a helpless baby?

No wonder that the angel Gabriel's first words to Mary and Joseph were, "Do not be afraid." No wonder that the narrative of fear and scarcity is a theme that Jesus challenged with a narrative of grace and abundance. Jesus offers us a bruised normal that is honest and authentic and invites us to enter into God's messy story. We still need to hear the uncomfortable truth... Do not be afraid. Do not be afraid when God's work in your life looks alarmingly different than you thought it would. Do not be afraid when God upends your cherished assumptions about righteousness. Do not be afraid when God asks you to stand alongside the scandalous, the defiled, the suspected, and the shamed. Do not be afraid when God asks you to love something or someone more than your sense of security and comfort. Do not be afraid of the precarious, the fragile, the vulnerable, and the impossible.

Do not be afraid of the messiness. The messiness is the place where God reminds us that we are never alone.

Update on The Cross Connection Newsletter



Vocation or vacation. Lent vs lint... these are often used theological words that become a part of our vocabulary, and if they are mixed up with everyday words, can create a moment of humor.

Vocation is in fact, not a vacation. It's work. Your vocation is that place where your gifts and talents intersect with your daily lived out faith. For many their vocation is their selected career path as an educator, working in finance, delivering the mail, or helping to wash cars. For others, their



vocation is a calling to be a parent or to not have children, but to be a mentor or be a part of another relationship of significance or influence. We each have a job to do, a hobby, or a passion that brings us a spark of excitement or a sense of accomplishment when we complete a task. No matter your vocation, there is honor in it.

Martin Luther sums it up by saying, "Every occupation has its own honor before God. Ordinary work is a divine vocation or calling. In our daily work, no matter how important or mundane, we serve God by serving the neighbor and we also participate in God's on-going providence for the human race."

Everyone's vocation is honorable, divine and needed. When each of us serve our neighbor in our daily life, we are also serving God. So take a moment and think, how have I served my neighbor today? This week? This month?

How might you be able to live into your vocation at home, in the community, at Holy Cross and in the world? There are a number of opportunities to share your gifts this fall at Holy Cross and beyond. In fact, within our new Confirmation system, we are looking for mentors or grandparents of the congregation who would be willing to have one-on-one conversations with our young people about their vocation, life experience, and the role of faith. We are also looking for people who might be willing to share their hobby or passion along with their faith in a small group learning session with a handful of youth who are interested in the same topic. Whether you fish, knit, sing, golf, or garden, we would love to have you share your gifts with our community.

If working with youth or young people is not your thing, I encourage you to identify your "thing" and consider putting your faith into action by sharing about your vocation or calling to be a person of faith in today's world. We need to keep hearing each others' stories as this helps us continue to shape our own, especially as it pertains to your vocation and calling as children of God.

Noticing Reality, and Responding by Steve Oelschlager

I was the last of four children in my family, the second boy, making me "even Steven." The next oldest from me was my brother Tom, who was challenged by learning disabilities, and more significantly, a whole range of emotional issues that plagued him to the end. Tom was institutionalized at various points in his life and never could get on his feet as a productive and fulfilled member of society. He passed away unexpectedly in his sleep in his mid-40s.

Whatever I am ultimately able to do in my life, what comes of choices I make, the hard work I invest in, it isn't lost on me that relative to my brother, I had advantages from day one that he never enjoyed. From the beginning, I was endowed with gifts he didn't know, and those benefits gave me a head start in life that he didn't have. I don't feel guilty or ashamed of who I am or how this played out. Instead, I think of Jesus' words my grandmother used to tell me as a child, "to whom much is given, much is expected."

If we pause to think about the difference between agency and fate, what we make happen with what we have been given, and what happens to us that is out of our control, we can recognize that we too have been given much. If we are born in the United States, if we arrive healthy with innate talents and intelligence, and if we have loving and competent parenting, relative to others, we have already won the lottery of life right from the start. That this is our only reality makes it easy to forgot or not notice. I can comfortably live my life not dwelling on my fortune relative to my brother, but the reality is always there.

Over the years, it has occurred to me that I have benefited in another way. To be a white male Christian in a culture that has favored these things has given me another advantage that many do not enjoy. My race and gender happened to me without my involvement as it has now happened to my son Andrew. I don't feel guilty or ashamed for either of us, but I still hear those words from my grandmother, "to whom much is given, much is expected." It makes me think about responsibility, level playing fields, and those left behind. It reminds me of my brother Tom, and all my other brothers and sisters in life.

As stewards and followers of Jesus, I invite us to think anew about our world's realities, the gifts we have, and the opportunities to make the world a better place for all people. This month Holy Cross will be setting the table for several thoughtful, yet challenging, conversations about racism (see page 6 - 7). I hope you will be able to participate and think about how the advantages you have enjoyed in life uniquely position you to make a difference.


AmazonSmile is the same Amazon you know—same products, same prices, same service. It just uses the money saved on advertising to help fund donations to charitable organizations.

Hope sits in the darkness—out-waiting torture, humiliation, crucifixion, and death—until finally a loving and grace filled God shows up and calls us by name.

We can live with this faith and hope—not because of our own worthiness, not because we claim a pre-ordained privilege or a connection to a religious tradition, not because we are good religious people, and, not because we are so strong and resilient. Rather, because of what God is able to do for us and through us, what God is able to do for you and through you. We discover the gift of hope in those moments when we realize we are known and still loved. Hope is powerful and life-giving.

A Life Well Lived

Mr. William C. Teague of Shreveport, Louisiana died this past July at the age of 97. He was my organ teacher at Centenary College of Louisiana where I earned my Bachelor of Music degree in Organ Performance. Bill Teague was also the organist/choirmaster at St. Mark's Episcopal Church of Shreveport for 39 years. If Miss Perry laid the foundation for my career, then Bill began the process of erecting its framework. Perhaps appropriately, this work was done at church as much as at school.

When Bill accepted me as one of his organ students at Centenary, Miss Perry told me that at the end of my freshman year he would ask me to be his assistant at his church. I discounted her contention totally, primarily because she had no knowledge of the other students and because she and Bill had never met. (They had heard of each other, however, because they had mutual acquaintances in Dallas where they both had attended SMU for a time.) When Bill did indeed ask me to be his assistant, Miss Perry never let me forget that she had predicted he would do so.

One significant result of my time at St. Mark's Church was that I learned how to manage a big organ. The instrument there is literally one of the finest organs in the world. Organ prodigy Nathan Laube has played it and can confirm my assertion. It has 105 ranks and four manuals and is simply a stunning instrument. There is nothing in Chicago that compares with it. The organ in Hill Auditorium in Ann Arbor, Michigan, where I got my master's degree, is comparable in size, but not really in quality.

In hindsight, I realize that I run a choir rehearsal like Bill did, i.e. fast and covering a lot of literature. One did not interrupt Bill during a rehearsal. I was actually in the St. Mark's choir for four years and learned much choral literature, for example, the Vaughan Williams Hodie that the choir has sung at Holy Cross. Of the many anthems I learned for the first time at St. Mark's was the Lutheran staple "E'en So, Lord Jesus, Quickly Come" by Paul Manz. And of course, I must not forget that I was introduced to the Benjamin Britten "Noye's Fludde" under Bill's direction. Long after I am dead and gone, there will be people who remember our doing "Noye's Fludde" at Holy Cross. Bill also had the St. Mark's Choir sing two major works per season, a practice I have set in place here, too.

Miss Perry shaped my approach to learning, encouraged my sightreading ability early on, introduced me to the organ, and taught me the liturgical year and the concept of a real service and service playing. Apparantly, she believed that "everything else," such as music history and theory, would come along in due course. Bill Teague was an early part of this "everything else." So, for example, as a collegiate organ student I played my first major organ works of Bach under Bill's direction, several of which I have played at Holy Cross on special occasions. I have also learned significant French organ works by composers such as Franck, Durufle, and Messiaen while working with Bill.

I would not want one to think that I appreciated at the time all that I learned from Bill Teague. I did not. He had a very colorful personality, and was sometimes more than I could handle. Nevertheless, we were in occasional contact through the years and recently talked on the phone once or twice annually. He was a big fan of my newsletter column and enjoyed keeping up with what I was doing at Holy Cross.

Many people look back on their times with Mr. William C. Teague as having been marvelous. My time with him was more productive than marvelous. He was not perfect, so on a scale of 1 to 100, I would have to give him a 97.

The majority of our in-person gatherings for small group and relational ministries remain canceled or are being held online. We encourage you to continue to be in contact with the members of your different groups or to explore new groups. It is important to still have community in these times. Celebrate Wonder

I wonder what Sunday School will look like this year... I wonder what school will look like.. I wonder if I'll be able to do all the fall things I love... I wonder if Christmas will look the same as it always does...

Here at Holy Cross, we celebrate wonder. This fall we group with the Deep Blue kids program we have been utilizing these last few years, as they grow into their virtual curriculum Celebrate Wonder. Celebrate Wonder offers online Sunday School and will be available most Sunday mornings via Zoom. These meetings are open to all students age 3 through 5th grade, and will be hosted by Mrs. Mack and other adult or youth helpers.

Each session will begin with conversation and peer engagement facilitated by Mrs. Mack, followed by music with Mrs. Mack. After this part of the session, a video will be shared featuring the Bible story of the day, videos of the story, and a teacher teaching the lesson. The session will conclude with Mrs. Mack bringing the children together for final comments and prayer. We anticipate these virtual sessions lasting 30 to 40 minutes.

If you miss a virtual session, the teaching video will be available for the next week on the Holy Cross Sunday School Google Classroom. A link to the Google Classroom was shared with parents over the summer and will be shared again with all current Sunday School families before the first Sunday School Zoom session in September.

Think Local



It's hard to believe that fall is almost here. Schools are back in session, albeit in ways different than what we are used to. 2020 has been a year full of disruptions that require us to pivot and evaluate our choices. The pandemic and social unrest are not too different from the ecological changes taking place around, but maybe less obvious.

With the past 150 years of development in Lake County, we have changed the ecosystems by introducing alien and invasive plant species. Birds and butterflies depend on the tree, shrub, and perennial plant species that have adapted and lived with for millennia. We each can do something to make a difference for wildlife and the fall is a great time to do it.

If you are considering planting new trees or shrubs, look for native tree and shrub species. These plants can make a huge difference for beneficial insects that birds feed on. For example, an English Oak tree is capable of hosting only a handful of insect species, and not really the most beneficial ones. But an American Oak, like the Burr oaks we have behind the parsonage can host literally 100s of insect species that provide valuable food for birds.

We hope you consider planting species that support our local Lake County ecosystems. Look to the Lake County Forest Preserves website at *lcfpd.org* for more information about what species work great and where you can find them in our forest preserves!

In Celebration Of A Wonderful Summer


Summer Camp at Celebration! Childcare has come to an end, and our school year is officially beginning!




