



We are Beloved...

In November 2019, I found myself wading in the waters of the Jordan River. Whether it is the actual site where Jesus was baptized or not, it is how I imagined it to be in my mind. It was a beautiful day. I was surrounded by friends and people of faith. We remembered the promises made at our baptisms, said a prayer, and sang some songs. It was perfect. However, I did not see the heavens part or hear a divine voice thundering through the clouds. Though I've professed belief in a self-revealing God all my life, I have not experienced revelation in any of the ways the Bible describes this moment when John the Baptist (Jesus' cousin) and Jesus stood there in the river.

The word "epiphany" comes from the Greek, "epiphaneia," meaning "appearing" or "revealing."





Or to ask the question more pointedly; what do *we* find most impossible to believe for our *own* lives? That God appears by means so familiar, we often miss God's presence? That our baptisms bind us to all of humanity- not in theory, but in the flesh - such that you and I are kin, responsible for each other in ways we fail too often to honor? Or, that we are God's Beloved - not because we've done anything to earn it, but because God's very nature, inclination, and desire is to love? To embrace Epiphany is to embrace the core truth that we are deeply, *deeply* loved.

Here's maybe the real issue with this liturgical season: we always, *always* have a choice—and most of the time, we may not want that. God has not insulted humanity with so little agency; we get to choose. We *have* to choose. No matter how many times God shows up, we're free to ignore God. No matter how often we reaffirm our baptismal vows to seek and serve Christ in all persons, we're still at liberty to reject each other and walk away. The freedom in which we live, move, and have our being is so vast, so all-encompassing, and so generous, it can feel overwhelming. But this is love. It doesn't impose. It doesn't coerce. It doesn't assume. It descends quietly and speaks in a voice so gentle, we're free to ignore it.

As we begin another year, we need to *choose*. Choose those moments this year where we experience God's love with resolute intention and diligence. The challenge is always before us: look again. Look harder. See freshly. Stand in the place that looks utterly ordinary and cling to the possibility of a surprise that is God. Listen to the ordinary, and know that it is infused with divine mystery. Jesus is the one who stands in line with us at the water's edge, willing to immerse himself in this world and in our lives. Do we hear God's voice telling us *who* we are and *whose* we are? Listen. We are God's own. God's children. Even in the deepest, darkest water, we are beloved.

Hygge (pronounced Hue-guh) is a Danish concept that cannot be easily described in one English word, but instead encompasses a feeling of cozy contentment through enjoying the simple things in life. If you've ever sat and simply watched it snow while you read a book or sipped from a warm mug, you've experienced hygge without even knowing it. If I had to put the concept of hygge into one English word, I would probably use cozy.

This national obsession with all things cozy is credited as one of the reasons why Denmark is always at the top of the list of the world's happiest countries, despite their infamously miserable winters. And recently, the rest of the world has begun to catch on to this wonderful way of life.

So how does one go about creating hygge spaces? Things like candles or relaxing scents. No wonder candle sales are a huge gift giving item at Christmas leading into a long winter! It's fireplaces and cozy blankets. It's people. It's homemade sweets, or winter comfort foods and a warm drink. It's board games, puzzles, cards or that book you've been meaning to read but haven't had the time. It's about people gathered in small groups for a deeper connection. It's allowing yourself to be. It's about simple. It's a deep appreciation for the simple things that bring joy to your life. It's feeling cozy inside and out but also spiritually.

As we move into the stillness of the winter months in the aftermath of the hustle and bustle of the holidays, where is it that we can seek coziness of hygge for our spirit? As Epiphany comes and wisemen finally reach the house where the child was, I wonder if what they experienced when they arrived was a feeling of cozy contentment as they reveled in the miracle that is Christ. When they laid their gifts before the child, was there tea and a comfort meal after their long journey? Was there a retelling of their experiences of God and their call to this place? Was there scripture?



Sabbath and solitude. Time alone sounds refreshing! Or does it? We all function a little different. Some need plenty of time to rest and recoup through time alone. Others do this best in the company of others by letting our hair down and being silly. It can also be diving into a book that stirs your mind and emotions to dwell with God in a new way. And for others still, it is a time of quiet stillness of simply looking out the window with a warm mug to drink from or a walk with a friend where your hearts talk but not your mouths. Some need a little of all of these.

So what is Sabbath and is it different than solitude? By definition, solitude is the lack of input outside yourself. This is thinking or reflection in your own head or heart time. Anchoring Our Lives in a Larger Story of Meaning

David Brooks is an opinion columnist for the New York Times, and an author of several books. In his 2019 New York Times bestseller, *The Second Mountain: The Quest for a Moral Life*, Brooks proposes that our culture has been moving away from one unhealthy extreme only to end up at another, that of hyperindividualism. Brooks asserts the pathway back to well-being in making commitments to big-picture sources of meaning like belief systems, vocation/calling, family, and community.

Brooks writes: It is a stunning fact of our age that, despite all we have learned about the brain, mental health problems, including depression, are rising, not falling. And things seem to be deteriorating quickly. In 2012, 5.9 percent of young people suffered from severe depression. By 2015, it was 8.2 percent.

This is, in part, because of the smartphone, but also because so many people have lost a sense of purpose in their lives. When you take away a common moral order and tell everybody to find their own definition of the mystery of life, most people will come up empty. They will not have a compelling story that explains the meaning of their life in those moments when life gets hard. In a study for his book The Path to Purpose, William Damon found that only 20 percent of young adults have a fully realized sense of purpose.

Many people have lost faith in the great causes and institutions that earlier generations relied on to give life a sense of purpose and meaning. They have lost faith in faith. Actual church attendance has declined by almost half since the early 1960s. They have lost faith in country. In 2003, according to the Gallup organization, 70 percent of Americans said they were "extremely proud" to be Americans. By 2016, only 52 percent of Americans said that, and only 34 percent of millennials agree. All of these suggest people do not feel they are part of some larger story that they can believe in and dedicate their lives to.

As Christians, we believe Jesus calls us to dedicate ourselves to a larger story, God's story, and to commitments beyond ourselves. Jesus' intention is not to make us miserable by restricting our freedoms. Instead, Jesus knows his way—the road less traveled—is a pathway to well-being. I hope that in 2020 Holy Cross can help each of us grow in our engagement with that path.

Live Music

I have just returned from a stunning concert given by a Chicago musical organization called the Music of the Baroque, conducted by Nicholas Kraemer from the harpsichord. Pieces by Domenico Scarlatti, Antonio Vivaldi, Alessandro Marcello, and Francesco Geminiani were on the program, but the real stars of the evening were the Bach Concerto for 3 violins and the Bach Concerto for 2 Violins. Both pieces were amazing, to say the least. I am reminded of the absolute wonder of live music. For me, there is nothing that can beat it. This past summer, for example, I heard a very fine performance of a keyboard concerto by Carl Philipp Emmanuel Bach at the Nikolaikirche in Leipzig. The harpsichordist was someone I had never heard of named Kristian Bezuidenhout. He was born in South Africa, but grew up in Australia, and then went to the Eastman School of Music in New York. Now I have ordered the piece he played and am planning to play it next year on our concert series along with the Brandenburg #5.

Of course, it almost does not matter how fine any piece by Carl Philipp Emmanuel Bach is because there is no way he can ever surpass or even match his father. In terms of music history, C.P.E. Bach is regarded as an important bridge from his father to Mozart. So, either coming or going C.P.E. stands in the shadows of greatness. One of the reasons I enjoy going to Europe so much is because concerts of live music are a daily affair. That having been said, I will probably skip going to Europe this year so my sister and I can go to Ravinia and hear, for example, all six of the Brandenburgs on one concert. Carolyn pointed out to me recently that she had not been to Ravinia since I started going to Germany so I decided curtailing my travel was in order. I hasten to add that I am already hoping to be in Leipzig from May 13 to May 24, 2021 for a festival devoted to the music of Gustav Mahler.

Of course, one of the delightful aspects of being in the Holy Cross Choir is that its purpose for being is to present music live. (Believe it or not, some choral pieces come with their own "canned" accompaniment.) The singers realize the live music aspect of their purpose and depend on me to select the right music and prepare them accordingly in order to offer it successfully. The bonding that goes on between singers, with a section and between sections, in order to sing "live" together is incredible. Acapella singing really promotes this "all for one and one for all" sense of unity.

(By the way, if you want to witness two people communicating while making music in front of God and everybody else, come to the two piano program my friend Anca and I are giving this coming April 26.)

I will have had another birthday between the time I am writing this column and you are reading it. My goal is to make my every day as one-of-a-kind as was the concert I attended this evening. Music is usually my catalyst in that endeavor. May God help you find your key toward unlocking your own future so that your days, weeks, and months may be as "live" as they can be.

Happy New Year from Early Childhood Ministries! We are excited for the year ahead of us, but would like to reflect on some of the special ways that CrossWays Preschools and Celebration! Childcare made 2019 a little happier for many children and adults. During last year, our students and their families reached out beyond our four walls and shared love and support to others, most of whom we do not know! The two schools were joined by many members of Holy Cross, who also offered a helping hand.

During 2019, the students brought canned goods and staples to school to add to the food drives (two or three a year) for the COOL Food Pantry. Children counted cans and helped pack up the food to get it ready for delivery. Vegetables from the garden were also harvested and taken to the pantry. This past year, the children raised tomatoes and onions—and a few green peppers—for COOL and harvested enough for six deliveries. In the process, the children learned about how they were sharing with others who needed their help.

In addition to the food drives, the two schools participated in a diaper drive, organized by Catholic Charities. 125 packages of diapers were donated and distributed to families in the inner city. Church members participated as well to make the drive a success! The schools also collected toiletries for the military to be given to the men and women in our armed services.

Our students also experienced giving to others by donating books. With points earned from our Scholastic Book Fair, we were able to purchase 130 books which were sent to a small town in Mexico for their library. The children who received the books wrote thank you letters to our students, and our students wrote back to the children in Mexico. Scholastic also offered us another way to reach out to those in need by asking us to have a pajama drive. Through this drive, we collected 161 pairs of pajamas, donated by ECM and Holy Cross families. But it gets better! Scholastic added a book to each pair of pajamas and then distributed these gifts to two local childcare centers who were in need.

Near the end of 2019, advent calendars were given to children in the pediatric unit at Condell Hospital. Our students wrote personalized cards to include with the calendars. Each child in our two schools also received an advent calendar. The calendars were purchased with a stipend that was received from our school photographer when class pictures and holiday pictures were taken.

In 2019, the children of CrossWays Preschool and Celebration! Childcare reached out to others in many ways and experienced the acts of kindness and giving. Support from the ECM families and the Holy Cross families enhanced many of the activities and for this, we are very grateful. 2019 was a generous year and 2020 will be no different! Blessings to you and your family.

Early Childhood Ministry Announcement

It is with sadness that we have accepted the resignation of Kathy Pfister as Director of our Early Childhood Ministry (CrossWays Preschool & Celebration! Childcare). Kathy has made the decision to retire.

Kathy has been in a director position for fourteen years. She provided invaluable assistance beginning in March 2006 as the west wing construction project came to completion. Kathy was instrumental in establishing our protocols, curriculum development, hiring of staff and recruiting families. We opened Celebration in October 2006. Our early childhood ministries have thrived under her leadership. There have been many advancements within the everyday operations. However, the most amazing gift is her love for the children. She treats them, their parents, and her staff with respect and grace while encouraging each of the children to discover their unique gifts and become the individual God created them to be.

Snowbirds and Monarchs

Do you know any snowbirds? Snowbirds are the people who leave our frosty area for someplace much warmer, maybe Florida or Arizona or perhaps Mexico. While many people do that, it is actually also an apt description of monarch butterflies.

Monarchs leave our area to migrate to central Mexico, and they begin this journey in September. This migration can be as many as 3,000 miles depending on how far north they have chosen to live. There are a number of butterflies that live in Canada—we are not the northernmost area for the butterflies. They use the sun for directional cues as they travel.

As of late, their population has decreased, and this is because of the poisoning of the milkweed plant, which is the only plant monarchs will eat. However, people have realized the importance of protecting milkweed and creating a monarchfriendly habitat, so we are seeing results—monarch numbers are going up!

It took some time for the Mexican officials to realize the tourist potential of the fir forest where the monarchs have chosen to spend the winter. It is now protected as the Monarch Butterfly Biosphere Reserve. It is located about sixty miles north of Mexico City in Michoacan. There are guides for tours of the area and other tourist amenities. There have been big changes in yearly populations, but in 2019, the spring migration was very robust with about 140% larger numbers of insects heading north from Mexico. Now they are seeing a similar large amount of butterflies on their way south.

Normally, the migration hits about its peak numbers on All Saint's Day (November 1) or All Soul's Day (November 2). Folklore of this area teaches that these beautiful flying creatures are the souls of their ancestors, coming to check out the little altars set up on their grave sits in local cemeteries.

While monarch numbers are rising, they still need your help, and you can help right at your home! Butterfly and pollinator gardens are easy to build right in your own backyard. Visit fws.gov/savethemonarch/individual/html for more details.

We are starting our third rotation on January 12, and we will be learning about David & Goliath through art, drama, missions, and science!

Who or what are the Goliath's in your life? We all have things that we need to overcome in our lives that can be daunting or scary. What does God have to say about that?

The story of David and Goliath is a well-known Bible story. Even people without a religious background know the basic outline of the story. Painters, sculptors, musicians, poets, and videographers have used this story as subject matter. The tale of defeating David, a young shepherd boy, defeating Goliath, a mighty warrior, has become a metaphor for hope for the underdog. When people are faced with seemingly overwhelming opposition, this story is a reminder that there is a way to overcome.

David is the first Israelite who appears to be willing to fight Goliath. David is also the first one in the story to describe the situation in a theological context. To David's way of thinking, Goliath did more than simply challenge Israel's army; Goliath insulted God. It is this framing of the situation that gave David the courage to face Goliath. David was confident that God was on his side. David remembered God was with him. When we feel overwhelmed, we can remember God is with us, too.

No matter what we are faced with, just like David, God is always with us!




The 11th Annual Great Bedtime Story Pajama Drive for Pajama Project was a great success!
