Here, Now, Today

"The youth are the future of the church..." But what if there is no church for the youth to inherit? Growing up my mother used to love going to Sears, and my grandmother used to collect the Big Book catalogs. Do you remember them? When I opened and flipped through the pages it was like stepping into a time machine and veering into the past. Brick-and-mortar stores were a hoot for decades but then they went away. They used to be the talk of the town, but now all that remains are empty stores and parking lots and collector's items. Sears couldn't keep up with the times. The department store became more and more something of the past, not the future. It was popular back then but not



today. I tell you about the brick-and-mortar stores and catalogs because for a growing number of people in our modern world, especially young people, God is a bit like the Sears catalog. The world has changed. It may have worked for our parents, but it's not relevant anymore.

In my previous ministry position, one of our youth had her parents pass away tragically in a car accident. She lost both parents, and her world was turned upside down. In the weeks that followed, she continued to attend church but became withdrawn from the group. One of those Sundays we explored the story of Lazarus. Jesus didn't make it in time to heal him and he passed away, but then Lazarus was raised from the dead. The youth threw her Bible and shouted, 'This story isn't real. If this story was real, my parents would be here!' I didn't say a thing. I wept just like Jesus wept. As I listened to them, I learned that it is not beneath God to feel or care for us when we hurt and cry. If you want to be more like Jesus, learn to weep when others weep. If you want to be more like Jesus, learn to listen to our young people instead of dismissing them. Learn to take them seriously now, not when they become adults.

As a youth pastor what I have seen again and again is young people with a growing sense that their faith is in some vital and yet mysterious way central to who they are as a person. They have many questions, but their doubt is a sign that their faith has a pulse. During my time at Holy Cross, young people have shared with me that the dominant ideas of God they've encountered along the way are not working anymore and are failing them.

I believe there are other ways, better ways of talking about God. Salvation is a holistic experience. Sunday is a dress rehearsal for the week. When we leave the building our worship continues, it doesn't end with worship service. Our lives can be a reflection of worship (Romans 12:1). To be a Christian means more than checking boxes and being confirmed. Being a person of faith means that Jesus wants to heal and transform us and the world. Here and now. I believe God is with us and for us and I believe God is ahead of us calling us and drawing us and inviting and pulling us all every one of us into a better future than we could ever imagine. But the effort requires everyone, young and old, and everyone in between. The future of our church doesn't fall on the youth pastor, Deaconess Katie, or Pastor Chris. One of my favorite proverbs reads, 'If you want to go fast, go alone, if you want to go far, go together.' Let's go together as a community, shall we?

As we are fundraising for the ELCA Youth Gathering 2024, I hear the Spirit saying, 'It's not just an event'. It is a time and space for young people to re-imagine our faith and what church can be, not just tomorrow but today. Our Lutheran tradition is a reforming one, not a reformed one. We are not supposed to be looking in the rearview mirror. I believe that our best days are ahead of us, not behind us. Our youth are not going to have the same experience as we did, instead, we need to listen so that they may have an encounter with God. Not just at the Gathering, but also in our community at Holy Cross Lutheran Church.

On November 12, 2023, ten twin-sized bed quilts were displayed in the sanctuary and dedicated at the worship services prior to their delivery to the COOL Ministries offices in Waukegan on December 6. The quilts were given to families residing in the Family/Transitional Housing program.

During the summer, two smaller quilts were made for the organization Quilts Beyond Borders, a charity providing quilts to children in underserved areas of the world. It's a nice break from making large quilts when we have the opportunity to make smaller quilts using kid-friendly prints.

The quilting group meets on most Wednesday mornings from 9 am to noon in the resource center in the basement of the west wing. New participants are welcome to join. Cutting fabric and pressing seams are some of the nonsewing tasks that contribute to the group effort.

If you have quilt tops that you no longer want or need, or have sewn a quilt top that you would like to be donated to a good cause, consider giving it to the quilting group. One of the quilts this year was made by a quilting friend who donated it to be given to COOL Ministries. Donations of 100% cotton quilting fabric, either pieces or yardage, are always welcome.

Finding God in the Faith of Others

An Excerpt from Holy Envy by Barbara Brown Taylor

"The supreme religious challenge," says Jonathan Sacks, "is to see God's image in one who is not in our image." If he is right, then the stranger—the one who does not look, think, or act like the rest of us—may offer us our best chance at seeing past our own reflections in the mirror to the God we did not make up.

I think it is no mistake that the New Testament never offers a physical description of Jesus. Although most Christians imagine him as the perfect specimen of their own physiognomy, there is nothing in scripture to support that. He might have been short, balding, or bow-legged, more Danny DeVito than Denzel Washington. He almost certainly had bad teeth. Of course, there is nothing in scripture to support that either. All scripture says is that when he appeared to his disciples after his resurrection, few of them recognized him at first. One thought he was the gardener. Others thought he was a fisherman. A couple thought he was a stranger on the road. Even when most of his disciples recognized him, a few still doubted.

That seems just right to me. How wonderful of him to come back undercover, so that even the people who knew him best had to look, then look again, before they got the crawly feeling that they had seen him somewhere before. It was the perfect setup for people who wanted to know what made him different from anyone else they had met: his ability to reflect their humanity back to them, both familiar and strange, so that they never got tired of searching each other's faces for some sign of him. The Son of Man is coming at an unexpected hour, he had told them earlier, so be ready. Little did they know how many hours there were in his day, or that he never rang the bell.


HELP TURN HUNGER INTO HOPE BY PACKING MEALS



New PADS Needs for a Happy 2024!

The new PADS hotel model is wonderful for the clients because it removes housing insecurity. With this new model come new challenges, one of the largest being stocking PADS client rooms with shelf stable, high protein meals and snacks. First Presbyterian Church in Libertyville, has graciously offered their basement as a food pantry for all of us to use as stock storage. These items can then be distributed to the various hotels as necessary. Keeping food in the pantry has been a challenge as we all adjust to the new needs.

High protein, shelf stable, microwavable meals are requested including meals by Hormel such as Dinty Moore and Completes. These are usually found in the same aisle as the boxed mac and cheese. Other



items include macaroni and noodle cups (not the ramen packets) that can be microwaved, soup that is microwaveable (not condensed), granola bars, fruit cups, canned meats, snack mixes, tuna, a variety of crackers, non-refrigerated yogurt, drink boxes, juice bags, baby food and cases of water. Canned vegetables do not go over well, but any other kid friendly items would be welcome. In my last meeting with PADS Lake County, they have 382 clients living in hotels. Half of this population is minors under the age of 18. If you could take a moment to add a couple items to your next shopping trip they would be greatly appreciated. The PADS donation bin is located near the church office and clearly marked for PADS, next to the bins for COOL Ministries.

We will be taking donated food items to First Presbyterian Church (219 W Maple Ave) as we fill the PADS donation bin. However, if you prefer to drop food items off yourself at First Presbyterian, they are taking donations Wednesday evenings from 4 - 7 pm. Simply drive thru by their narthex door (on Douglas Ave) and your car will be met by their volunteers.

All of that being said, the Holy Cross PADS Ministry team will continue to prepare, package and deliver 50 warm meals to the hotel in Mundelein every 2nd and 5th Mondays. We would love to include you! Thank you to the dedicated volunteers that have kept this important delivery going. The hotel only gets warm meals on Mondays and Thursdays.


