Is God's Gift of Grace Enough?

The concept of grace is central to the Christian faith. However, if you were to count up the number of times Jesus used the word "grace" compared to the amount of times grace is used in the rest of the New Testament, you might be surprised. What would you guess? Actually, there is not one time in any of the four gospels that record Jesus using the word "grace" in his earthly ministry. Surprised? The whole idea of "grace" appears multiple times in the other New Testament writings and it is there that we begin to flesh out the concept of grace. In fairness, Jesus did use the word "love" which is the foundation for living into the gift of grace.

Anne Lamott wrote: "Grace...is the help you receive when you have no bright ideas left, when you are empty and desperate and have discovered that your best thinking has failed you. Grace is the light or electricity or juice or breeze that takes you from that isolated place and puts you with others who are as startled and embarrassed and grateful as you are to be there."

Father Greg Boyle suggests: "God is so busy loving us that God doesn't have time to be disappointed in us." Grace is not quid pro quo. The good news about grace is that it finds us in those moments when we are the way we are and as messy as we are. The hard part of grace is the part about loving which is also the challenging part of life.



I wonder, what will it take for us to wake up and actually be about believing or trusting this gift of God's grace in our lives and world? Where does the gift of grace fit into a conversation that moves us from a perspective that demonizes others and obliterates the illusion that somehow we are on our own? What is the answer to these questions?

I think we are constantly choosing between being open to a new possibility or satisfied with the status quo. In every moment, we are choosing to close our heart or to open it. There's no once and for all here. It is exhausting. That's part of being awake and being aware that we somehow want to truly know and be aware of what afflicts us. Otherwise, we will be ruled by our afflictions. However, the more we can open our heart to grace, the more it may become the connective tissue. It's the thing that keeps judgment at bay. It's the choice that keeps our hearts opened to what people are really going through, to the brokenness and the damage, rather than dismissing them.

It is critical that when it comes to grace, we need to choose it and then practice it. The challenge is always before all of us: look again. Look harder. See freshly. Stand in the place that looks utterly ordinary, and regardless of how scared or jaded we may feel, cling to the possibility of a surprise that is God. Listen to the ordinary, and know that it is infused with divine mystery. Stand with the people you'd rather not stand next to, skin to skin, fates knitted together—because grace is in the spaces you'll create together. There is *one* gift of grace and *one* common hope for all of us. Listen. We are God's chosen. God's children. God's own. Even in the deepest, darkest moments God's grace is enough.

A Path Forward Update

On Sunday, April 24 Holy Cross took another step forward in the pastoral transition initiative. A special congregational meeting was called by the church council according to the congregational constitution. The purpose of the special meeting was to vote on extending a letter of call to Rev. Chris Neptun to become the church's new senior pastor. 66.66% affirmative votes are needed to pass the resolution. The meeting was held in accordance with synodical guidelines. A quorum of 228 voting members (15% of confirmed membership as of 12/31/21) is required. We had 250 voting members in attendance. Following the formal resolution, presentations were provided by Jen Christensen, chair of the call committee and Harold Sargent, a member of the staff support team. An opportunity for discussion and questions was provided. A written private ballot was handed out. The result of the vote is: 247 Yes and 3 No. The resolution passed. A word of appreciation and gratitude to the members and leadership involved in this process. There was engagement on many different levels through a congregational survey, listening sessions, the staff support team, the call committee and the church council. We are very blessed with wonderful lay leadership at Holy Cross who represented the membership's thoughts throughout this journey.

Call paperwork is with the Bishop's office of the Metropolitan Chicago Synod. The current hope is that Rev. Neptun will begin responsibilities at Holy Cross on June 1, 2022. He and Pastor Bob will co-pastor for a period of time during the transition that will be mutually agreed upon. This period of transition is part of the larger vision of the "Path Forward" succession plan that was shared with the congregation. This is a journey that began with conversations initiated by Pastor Bob in 2019. We celebrate with Rev. Neptun and his family as Holy Cross moves into a new chapter of ministry. This is an exciting time and we offer prayers and support in the time ahead as we enter into the next phase of the transition plan "A Path Forward".

Keeping the Lights On by Steve Oelschlager

Within Christian spirituality, you may have noticed that the metaphor of light regularly suggests the positive implications of Jesus and faith. For example, John's Gospel proclaims that Jesus illuminates God's truth, and therefore Jesus is a light to the world who overcomes darkness. In turn, the Gospel of Matthew records Jesus saying that his followers are the light of the world and that we should let our light shine like a city on the hill as a way to glorify God. Another example is in Luke's Gospel, where Jesus says we will be bright when we are full of his light, and we will radiate that light outwards.

I like the use of light as an analogy for goodness, truth, and wellbeing connected to faith in Jesus. Lately, however, I've been a little curious about how all of this works. In particular, I'm wondering about the relationship between generating light and the fuel required to produce light in the first place.

We know from experience that light needs energy, and the longer the light shines, and the brighter it shines, the greater the power required. Another way to say this is that being a light source is "draining." It isn't easy to live into Jesus' call to be a light to the world; following Jesus can be exhausting. Have you noticed that? I point this out because I guess we should fully expect to need a strategy for reenergizing ourselves before our light grows dim or even flickers out. When Jesus nudges us to love, forgive, be selfless, generous, hospitable, work for justice, practice kindness and humility, get ready to feel our internal meters record some outbound power spikes.

It's helpful to recall then all the times Jesus went off to pray for hours on end, which seems to me was his way of plugging into a more significant energy source. Most likely, Jesus also renewed himself through relationships with his disciples and their efforts to do ministry together. I think Jesus is an excellent example that all of us need strategies to recharge if we want to help Jesus illuminate a bit of the darkness in our world.

At Holy Cross, we try to bring all these ideas together. We want the community of Holy Cross to keep us all inspired to be the brightest lights we can be, to be a force for good in the world as individuals and a congregation. But, we also hope to aid in the process of recharging and renewal, through prayer and relationships and following Jesus, so we can all stay effective in Jesus' lighting ministry. Thank you for sharing your light here and in the world.



Please join us as we finish the last two sessions of our study series begun during the Lenten season.

In her book and video series titled *Witness at the Cross*, author Amy-Jill Levine shows how the people at the cross each have distinct roles to play. Each Evangelist presents a distinct picture of the death of Jesus. Each portrays different individuals and groups of people at the cross, each offers different images and dialogues, and so from each, we learn how those meanings and messages cross the centuries to any who would come to the cross today. Each Gospel has its own story to tell, all the witnesses have their own memories, and every reader comes away with a new insight. The story of Jesus's death is not something we just read: we think about it, and we experience it; we hear the taunts of the soldiers, the priests, and the passersby even as we hear the famous "seven last words" from the cross. The witnesses at the Crucifixion watch Jesus die, and we watch with them, and we watch them. And we come away transformed.

Experience Holy Friday from the perspective of those who watched Jesus die: Mary his mother; the Beloved Disciple from the Gospel of John; Mary Magdalene and the other women from Galilee; the two men, usually identified as thieves, crucified with Jesus; the centurion and the soldiers; Joseph of Arimathea and Nicodemus. Jews and Romans, friends and strangers, the powerful and the powerless, the hopeful and the despairing.

Sunday School: Faith Formation

Sometime this month, the ground will be warm enough to begin planting most vegetable and flower seeds. Some of us may know when to plant what, how to prepare the soil, and care for seedlings, when to prune, when to harvest—producing wonderful results. Others of us (ahem—like this writer), rely on others' wisdom and expertise through books, family and friends or online, and then through trial and error try the best we can (which may only produce 2 meals worth of green beans at 10x the cost of what beans would cost at the grocery store).

One of the beloved parables we hear Jesus tell in three of our Gospels is the parable of the sower—in which a farmer scatters seed everywhere, whether or not the farmer is assured the environment is perfect for it. I read this as a promise that our generous God is always planting seeds of faith and love—with the hope that something will catch and take root.

When we think about our own faith lives, we may be able to think about the events and people who have helped enrich the soil in which our faith has taken root. Some may have offered their experience, a consistent practice or some structure to learn. Some may have given us community to practice faith, or opportunities to ask questions. Some events and people may have made us feel a little uprooted, but we can now see we were replanted into more nourishing soil.

As adults fostering the faith of kids, I wonder if our goal can be imagined as that novice gardener—sometimes knowing how to best tend the seeds, and at other times needing to rely on others and prayer. Helping others grow in faith may mean practicing certain aspects differently than you first attempt. As I seek to nurture faith in my own family, one of my consistent faith practices—bedtime prayer—has not been helpful (yet) for my kids. So, we pray at other times during the day. And, sometimes I'll sing "He's Got the Whole World..." with verses with our loved ones names and events for which we pray.

My point—each little seedling of faith, which is planted by God, may be best nurtured with different nutrients. Some kids do well with listening to stories or prayer. Others may best connect through serving others. Some may love singing or asking questions or even rebelling as a method of learning about God's love (or, perhaps that's what I tell myself to then try to communicate God's love and grace even as I set boundaries). There is not one right way to nurture a child's faith.

As we look forward to summer months, I pray for the ways God is blessing your work of tending to and nourishing the faith of kids, so that those seeds of faith may grow in love.

We continue to celebrate Christ's resurrection with our final two Sunday School gatherings on May 1 and May 8. Please join us! See page 8 for summer camp opportunities.

Bees and other pollinators, such as butterflies, bats and hummingbirds, are increasingly under threat from human activities. Their decline impacts the global food supply and world hunger.

How can we do more? Be Part of The Pollinator Pathway.

- Buy raw honey from local farmers
- Protect wild bee colonies and biodiversity
