We are called to live from our deepest strength - the strength to love.

The readings for the Sundays of Pentecost are often about the struggles to love one another. People of faith are not exempt from this struggle and encounter it in their everyday lives. We begin the month of July celebrating "freedom." Over Memorial Day weekend I was afforded the opportunity to visit Monticello, VA, the home of Thomas Jefferson. Thomas Jefferson wished to be remembered in a particular way: as author of the Declaration of Independence (political freedom), as author of the religious statute for Virginia (religious freedom) and as founder of University of Virginia (intellectual freedom). Jefferson wondered how do we ever discover the substance and stature of freedom if it isn't through our struggle for it.

Spiritual freedom, like political and intellectual freedom, is never sufficient unto itself. Spiritual freedom, like political and intellectual freedom, exists only to allow us the pursuit of what freedom allows: love of God, respect for self, and, concern and love for our neighbor.

During the Sundays of Pentecost, we have the opportunity to discover in our ordinary experiences and in the course of our lives from day to day, the mystery of composing a life that celebrates these basic values of freedom within the deeper context of love. So, what do we take away from this? Never doubt the power of love, but, never assume that love comes easy. If you love, you get hurt. But, if you never love, you never live.





Over the last few months, the women's discussion group has been reading the book, *With: Reimagining the Way You Relate to God* by Skye Jethani. It has inspired fruitful conversation about how we see God active in our lives. What has really stuck with me this time in reading this book, one I come back to over and over again, is the role of hope.

Hope has been a constant idea that is connected with our faith for a very long time. We hear the psalmists cry for hope amidst their laments. We hear Tamar cry for hope in the desert. We hear the disciples cry of hope to calm the storm while at sea. The sea, a place of chaos, is one that can churn our lives both physically and metaphorically. Hope is a community cry that we do not do in isolation.

In thinking about the boat of disciples with Jesus asleep during the storm, it was never what the people did that gave them hope – no amount of nautical skills were helping them – it was God's presence with them that gave them hope. As Jethani puts it, "Hope does not depend on what's happening around your boat. Hope depends on who is in your boat."

So where, in the heat of summer, do you find hope? Are you able to steal away a few moments from the chaos of the world to reconnect with God's promises of hope? These moments, big or small, are moments where we are reminded of our life and relationship with God, not around or near God, but with. A partnership of love and grace. We are called and claimed as God's children and our hope rests in these promises. Now and forever.



Living Life with Gratitude

Excerpt from **Grateful: The Transformative Power of Giving Thanks** by Diana Butler Bass

"Gratitude is not a psychological or political panacea, like a secular prosperity gospel, one that denies pain or overlooks injustice, because being grateful does not 'fix' anything. Pain, suffering, and injustice - these things are all real. They do not go away. Gratitude, however, invalidates the false narrative that these things are the sum total of human existence, that despair is the last word. Gratitude gives us a new story. It opens our eyes to see that every life is, in unique and dignified ways, graced: the lives of the poor, the castoffs, the sick, the jailed, the exiles, the abused, the forgotten as well as those in more comfortable physical circumstances. Your life. My life. We all share in the ultimate gift - life itself. Together. Right now.

Gratitude evens the score, none are better than others; instead, we are all beneficiaries and, in turn, we are all benefactors to each other. The first act of being human is receiving the gift of breath, and as we go through life we continually receive. We sit at a table of gifts; we pass gifts on to others. Those gifts should not indenture others to 'our' largess, for ultimately we own nothing. Death reminds us of that. But to pass on gifts, to live gratefully, is to liberate ourselves and humanity from the slavery of payback and debt, of entitlement, privilege, and superiority.

Gratitude calls us to sit together, to imagine the world as a table of hospitality. To feed one another. To feast, to dance in the streets. To know and celebrate abundance.


Gifts and gratefulness.

Gratitude empowers us. It makes joy and love possible. It rearranges the way we see and experience what is all around us. Gratitude makes all things new. It transforms how we understand what is broken and gives us the ability to act more joyfully and with hope. That is why gratitude is central to all the world's religions. As a practice, it embodies the wisdom of humanity's greatest spiritual teachers: the love of neighbor. Gratitude takes us from abstract belief to living compassion in the world. Gratitude is strongest, clearest, most robust, and radical when things are really hard. Really hard. All-is-lost hard "


Mission Endowment Fund

The Holy Cross Lutheran Church Mission Endowment Fund was established in 1999. Additional assets were contributed to the Mission Endowment Fund in 2016 and 2017 for housing ministries.

The Mission Endowment Fund provides resources to enhance the Ministry of Holy Cross, apart from the general operations of the congregation. These resources, divided equally three ways, are allocated annually in the following areas: music ministry opportunities within the congregation; ministry opportunities beyond the congregation/pastoral discretionary fund; and in scholarship support for members of Holy Cross.

The assets of the Holy Cross Mission Endowment Fund are invested through the ELCA Foundation. An amount approximately equal to 5% of the market value of the fund will be available annually to allocate to extend the ministry of Holy Cross. The Fund Committee will make announcements in the first quarter of the year regarding applications for scholarship and ministry support. Award decisions will be announced in the second quarter.





A Random Thought or Two

Before too long I will have been at Holy Cross for as long as Johann Sebastian Bach was the chief town musician in Leipzig. My time here, no matter what lies ahead, will not have been as historic or as distinctive as that of the great man himself, but it will have been at times memorable. Bach's tenure ended with his death at age 65 when he was blind and most likely an overweight diabetic. I am already one year past that age and have fought the weight challenge with success. About 18 months ago I lost 47 pounds and have kept the weight off.

A primary way I can control my weight is not frequenting the ubiquitous gelato stands in Germany to which I go seemingly every summer. It also helps that I hardly drink beer at all and heavy food has disappeared from my diet. I do, however, enjoy a glass of red wine, which I have heard can be medicinal.

So, while I do not share dietary habits with J. S. Bach, he did have other characteristics to which I can only aspire. He was a great composer, an outstanding improviser, an authority on acoustics, one familiar with the construction of an organ, a frequent teacher, and a renowned player of whatever instrument, organ, clavichord or harpsichord, at which he happened to be sitting.

A quality I do share with J. S. Bach is that we were/are both dinosaurs. By that I mean we both had/have old-fashioned, traditional tastes, and were/are proud to be that way. Bach was largely self-taught, but was a product of a rich musical tradition passed down from his family. Moreover, he was still writing fugues while his contemporaries were composing works in anticipation of Haydn and Mozart. (By the way, it is interesting to note that Haydn was born in 1732 so was already 18 when Bach died.) Never mind that Miss Perry (my childhood piano teacher and mentor) was profoundly old-fashioned and endowed me with her way of thinking. What is most telling is that two of the three institutions that awarded me degrees in music no longer offer those degree programs because, there is not a sufficient number of interested students around to warrant the continued existence of those course offerings.

Another quality I like to think I share with J. S. Bach is persistence. Bach composed five cycles of cantatas and larger works such as passions early in his time in Leipzig, then recycled and reworked those pieces as the years went on, doubtless supplementing his own music by compositions of people like Telemann, Vivaldi, and Handel. Bach was contemporary with all three of those men, but never met Handel or Vivaldi. Famously, Bach did study scores from all over Europe. This past season at Holy Cross we presented a Vivaldi "Magnificat" in December and a Telemann "Missa brevis" on Pentecost. In between we presented many anthems, including a set of "evening" anthems early in Lent

and another collection of anthems on Good Friday. Next season we will present the Vaughan Williams "Fantasia on Christmas Carols," a "Missa Jubilate Deo" during Epiphany by a contemporary Austrian named Josef Sulz, six more anthems on Good Friday, and a "Little Jazz Mass" by Bob Chilcott in May. This last piece will by my only claim to being even remotely up with the times.

I am ever uplifted in my work at Holy Cross by the continued commitment of the fine singers who make up the Holy Cross Choir. My only way to thank those saints is by continuing to find the "right" music to be put into their folders. I am also looking forward at the end of the upcoming choral season to taking members, friends, and family of the Holy Cross Choir to Germany in June of 2019.

Praise God my health is good these days. Thus, I may continue to travel to Germany and other places in Europe once my German has improved. I would even move to Germany, but there are several obstacles to that happening, one of which is the German government. It is not welcoming foreign musicians, at least to serve in churches in their country which has no separation of church and state.

I don't think Johann Sebastian Bach had any idea of the overwhelming figure that he would become in music history. My goal is to continue to make a positive musical impression in this postage stamp of a place called Holy Cross Lutheran Church. I sincerely hope you have hopes and dreams of your own.

"More"


When I think of the word "more?" My mind tends to drift toward the image of a young child, asking for additional amounts of something they desire. This image is seemingly simple and ordinary, but in reality, lays the foundation for children of a critical skill - math. We use math every day in our lives, all the time, often without thinking about it. We sort clothes when doing laundry, make a schedule for our day, and get out a step stool when something is out of our reach. We couldn't accomplish these mundane everyday tasks without having learned some basic mathematical skills.

Learning these skills is obviously an important part of any young child's growth and development, and one we take seriously at CrossWays. As Jan Greenberg explains in her article "More, All Gone, Empty, Full: Math Talk Every Day in Every Way" from Young Children, May, 2012, "An important role for teachers and other caregivers is to make math that occurs in daily life concrete and visible to children." We can do this by being intentional in how we talk to the young people in our lives about mathematical concepts and exposing them to math related vocabulary. Greenberg calls this "math talk." Taking the time to introduce math concepts throughout daily verbal interactions with young children goes a long way in helping them understand these ideas. In fact, the concept of "more," is one of the first they learn! I encourage you to be thoughtful in how you speak to the young children in your lives, and try to be intentionally speaking in "math talk." You will be serving those children well to help them develop understanding of these concepts from an early age.

At CrossWays, our space is often noisy, filled with echoes of teachers and children talking to each other, often about what you might characterize as mundane or ordinary. Listening closer, you will hear this intentional "math talk" occurring, as we foster and develop our students' mathematical skills, even at the very young age of two! If you are interested in learning more about our programming or have questions about how your child can benefit from an experience at CrossWays, please reach out. I would love to show you around and help you build a program that suits your child's needs.

This month brings our Little Sprouts and Seedlings summer camps to a successful close for the fourth consecutive year. Our students had a blast learning all about trees through songs, games, books, crafts, dramatic play, and exploring Holy Cross' extensive campus. We look ahead to the 2018-2019 school year starting next month!
